The 2009 fair survey showed that visitors wanted more live music. Therefore, the entertainment committee outdid themselves for the 2010 concert series. Restless Heart, The Band Perry, Bomshel and Emerson Drive all drew terrific crowds.

The preliminary round for Mutton Bustinø was held Monday, September 20. Seventy eight kids under 7 and under 65 pounds vied for the top 10 spots each night at the rodeo performances. The seating was packed and the kids were pumped and prepped in their protective vest and helmet as they did their best to hold onto their sheep.



Rounding out the 87th run of the fair and rodeo was the PRCA Rodeo. Larger than normal crowds on Thursday and Friday nights crowded into the

Amarillo National Center to watch the top cowboys compete. In the end it was Cade Swor of Crafton who left Amarillo as the All-Around Cowboy.

Nearly 4,000 Panhandle students visited the Ag Magician-Joyce Rice, the Texas Farm Bureau Mobile Learning Barn and agricultural exhibits, Southwest Dairy Farmers Mobile Milking Demonstration and WTAMU® Barn Talk 101.

Education is indeed a large part of the Amarillo Tri-State Exposition mission. Without education and specifically agricultural education a part of our heritage is forgotten. The fairgrounds is the logical place to learn about agriculture, after all it is where the general public intersects with agriculture.

Everyone learned the magic words at the Ag Magician show are õThank A Farmer.ö Participants also learned that their clothing and things they use or eat on a daily basis dongt come from the store but from the family farm where hard work, good weather and good growing conditions for crops put clothes on

their back, food on their tables and fuel in the car to get them to the next soccer game where even that ball was made from animal by-products.

The Texas Farm Bureau Mobile Learning Barn tells the story of Agriculture, each commodity and their by-products. This exhibit showcases the actual product and gives the students a hands on learning approach.

Milk doesnot come from the grocery store was the message that Southwest Dairy Farmers brought to the students. There are still a large number of kids in Amarillo who have never seen where milk comes from so the mobile dairy set out to change their way of thinking.




The coloring mural was a popular stop for everyone during the fair. Washable markers ensured that everyone got to leave their mark at the fair.

# Community...

Whatøs your favorite fair food? Area nonprofits brought their specialties to the fair this year. Several nonprofits greeted hungry fair visitors with everything from enchiladas, tacos, calf fries, the traditional corn dog, Texas taters and the stuffed sopapilla offered by St. Matthew United Methodist Church. Saint Matthewøs served over 2,300 sopapillaøs by 27 dedicated volunteers. St. Matthewøs is coordinated by E.C. Padilla for the past ten years.

During the nine day fair over 8,500 pounds of potatoes were used, over 21,000 corn dogs were fried, 9,000 plus ears of corn were shucked, 7,000 funnel cakes served and over 10,000 turkey legs smoked. These numbers show only a small percentage of the food that was served at the fair. With that being said lets think about where these food vendors purchased their food-locally. How about the workers that worked in their booths? Many of them were also local citizens of Amarillo.

Other nonprofits participating in the fair include: High Plains Food Bank-2,737 pounds of food donated, Eveline Rivers Coat Project-808 coats donated, Arden Road Baptist Church, Panhandle Plains Chapter Mothers Against Meth, Catholic Diocese of Amarillo, Amarillo Right to Life, Southwest Optimists, Holy Cross Catholic Academy and Phillips Hall Foster Care.

The Randall County Master Gardeners, part of the Texas AgriLife Extension Service, handed out material highlighting plants, trees and vegetables that grow well in the Texas Panhandle. Along with the literature, they also demonstrated how the new õRainwater Harvesting Systemö installed by the Exposition will work when fully operational. A collection simulator from Texas AgriLife Extension Service and information provided by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District 1 were used to emphasize the importance of water conservation.
