The Monday — Friday morning shows were filled with students from 30 different schools from all over the Texas Panhandle. Exposition board members, junior board members and volunteers escorted the groups to the shows and handed out materials provided by Texas Farm Bureau, Texas Department of Agriculture and Joyce Rice, the Thank a Farmer Ag Magician.

Eagle Scout Project at Xcel Energy Park

Colin Caverly of Amarillo Boy Scout Troop 80 has designed and planted three flower beds in the Xcel Energy Park as his Eagle Scout project. Colin and his troop members and leaders completed this project just before the Fair. They set the borders, removed old grass, tilled in planting soil, added a drip irrigation system and planted 55 various flowering perennial plants. Once established, these heavily mulched plants will need very little water.

This project is part of the development of this park, which will eventually contain more xeriscape plantings, fruit trees and berry bushes. Megan Eikner, the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agriculture and natural resources agent for Potter County, is helping with the park design project. She is adding an educational component to complement the demonstration gardens at the Rex Baxter Building, where students and adults can learn about urban gardening.
