

4-H / FFA / Independent INDUSTRIAL & VOCATIONAL SKILL PROJECTS

(Intended for Auction)

Entry Information:

- Entry Fee: \$25.00
- ENTRY DEADLINE: Thursday, June 26, 2025. No Late entries will be accepted.
- Entry Limit: One entry per exhibitor for the Live Auction Division
- Danish System of Judging
- Entries are to be delivered to the Fairgrounds, auction ready by 4:00 pm on Wednesday, September 3, 2025. No work can be done on a project once it arrives at the fairgrounds.
- If an entry cannot be transported in an auction ready state, an exemption request must be made to the board 15 days prior to the August or September board meeting.

Rules:

- The sale of student-built projects during the livestock auction is open to all 4-H, FFA and independent exhibitors in good standing within the D10A District.
- Only projects constructed or fabricated in school or under the supervision of a 4-H leader or skilled/industry professional will be acceptable. Proof of this requirement must be included on the entry form.
- Exhibitors are required to submit documentation (FFA, 4-H or independent record book) with their entries to assist during the judging process. The record book must document all stages of construction from beginning through completion to be considered as "auction ready".
- Only projects started on or after the first day of the current school year for 2024-2025 are eligible for entry in the 2025 Livestock/Vocational Auction.
- Every project must include a display consisting of:
 - A minimum of 2 photos, maximum of 8 photos showing the student working on their project or skills related to their project.
 - A receipt for or an expense list and/or Bill of Materials.
 - A list of skills learned or used in the creation of their project.
- Exhibitors are required to be present at the time of judging (see judging schedule

posted during fair) for interviews and the taking of pictures for sales placards. Exhibitors must be in official show uniform (see Livestock Dept. for Show Uniform Guidelines) for these pictures and for the auction sale.

- The person whose name is on the entry form, showing the exhibit, and selling at the auction, must have made the entry. Premium is to be paid
- All entries must be constructed in a manner safe for public viewing.
- Exhibitor must set a valuation on his/her entry. This value should be represented on the record budget page and may be a part of the display.
- Submission of entry to this competition implies acceptance of all rules and conditions as stated in the Tulelake-Butte Valley Guidebook and State Rules.
- 8% Commission will be withheld on all Industrial/Vocational Skill Live Auction items as it is with the market animals. 4% will go to the Tulelake Rotary Club and 4% to the fairgrounds.
- Exhibitor must be present and sale their own Industrial/Vocational Skill Live Auction Project at the auction.

General Judging Guidelines as follows:

• General Appearance	25 points
• Function/Practicality	25 points
• Technical Quality	25 points
• Workmanship/General Finish	<u>25 points</u>
Total	100 points

Only projects scoring 70 points or higher by the judges, will go to auction.
