IMPORTANT DATES FOR FFA EXHIBITS

Entry Deadline: Friday, September 19. All entries must be submitted online. Tags will be printed and available for pick up upon arrival.

Arrival: Monday, September 22. Central Park Hall will open for entries at 9:30 am. All FFA Exhibits must be in place by 6pm. Those schools exhibiting at the Arkansas – Oklahoma Fair in Fort Smith, AR may be granted special permission to bring only Ag Mechanics exhibits on Tuesday, September 23. Contact Hanna Brown for approval before September 19.

Judging: Tuesday, September 23 and Wednesday, September 24.

Placement of Exhibits: Thursday, September 25

ACADEMIC ELIGIBILITY

1. Youth who have been declared ineligible to participate in extracurricular activities by their local school administration will be declared ineligible to participate in this show.
2. Youth who are eligible on the first day of the Fair will be considered eligible through the duration of the Fair. Youth who are ineligible on the first day of the Fair will be considered ineligible through the duration of the Fair.
3. If an exhibitor is ineligible to participate in the Fair for any reason, including rules of the Oklahoma Secondary Schools Activity Association, the animals and other exhibits owned by the exhibitor are also ineligible for the Fair.
4. Ineligible youth who participate in the Fair will forfeit all Fair awards and will be subject to disciplinary action as provided by the local school policies.
5. It will be the responsibility of the local school administration to notify Fair Officials if a particular student is ineligible to participate.

1. Purpose: FFA Educational Booths are designed to showcase the benefits of Agricultural Education and FFA membership. These displays can be used in various settings, including FFA Week events, local fairs, or community gatherings. The focus is on presenting engaging, professional booths that reflect FFA's values and inspire interest in Agricultural Education and FFA.
2. Size and Structure: Booths should be tabletop displays using a 6' or 8' table (provided by each chapter) that is 28" to 32" in height and width. Display boards should measure 4' x 8' and be constructed of 1/2" or 5/8" material. Boards should have two 2' wings and a 4' center back panel for easy setup. Back of Display Board: Painted in dark blue or black to maintain a clean, professional look.
3. Table Covering: Chapters should provide their own table cover and skirting to cover the entire table down to the floor.
4. Electrical Access: Outlets will be available for booths needing power.
5. Booths should focus on FFA's three Program of Activities (POA) divisions:
 - a. **Growing Leaders** – Highlight leadership and career development activities. Include visuals or interactive elements that show how FFA builds future leaders in agriculture.
 - b. **Building Communities** – Showcase community involvement and service. Examples might include chapter outreach projects, volunteer activities, or partnerships with local organizations.
 - c. **Strengthening Agriculture** – Emphasize agricultural education, industry connections, and sustainability efforts. Demonstrations, visuals, or interactive elements should illustrate FFA's impact on the agriculture industry. Each booth should clearly display the local chapter name and highlight all three divisions.

6. Design Standards:
7. Brand Alignment: Follow FFA Brand Guidelines for colors, fonts, and logos to ensure consistency.
8. Booths should highlight activities and impacts relevant to the three POA divisions: Growing Leaders, Building Communities, and Strengthening Agriculture.
9. Booths are encouraged to include engaging features such as videos, QR codes linking to online resources, or interactive components relevant to each POA division.
10. Booths will be divided into two categories:
 - **Mechanical Division:** Booths that incorporate powered displays, such as moving parts, fans, lights, or electronic devices.
 - **Non-Mechanical Division** includes booths with no powered displays. Flashing or rotating lights are not permitted in this category. Each chapter may enter in one division only.

SECTION 401 - FFA PHOTOGRAPHY SERIES

1. Oklahoma FFA members are required to include photographs as a part of their State FFA Degree scrapbooks, State Proficiency Award applications, Reporter Contest scrapbooks, as well as assisting with many chapter award applications which also require photographs. The purpose of the photography contest is to provide an opportunity for individual FFA members to showcase their talent in photography while preparing for these state award applications.
2. Entry must contain **five**, 5" x 7" or 4" x 6" color prints that **were taken by the member**. Only one entry per exhibitor.
3. The series must be mounted on **half** sheet poster board (approximate finished size 22" x 14"), or **half** sheet of foam or mat board (approximate finished size 20" x 15") to be displayed for landscape view.
4. Pictures on newsprint or those that have been mechanically altered will not be accepted.
5. **Subject must relate to the member's Supervised Agricultural Experience program (SAE) or to FFA activities within their local chapter.**
6. Captions may be used with each picture. Captions are to be in 12-point font and not exceed 50 words per caption.
7. Entries will be judged on subject matter, effectiveness, photo quality and composition. The top 5 placing may be displayed.

SECTION 402 - FFA NEWS REPORTING

1. FFA members are encouraged to submit newsworthy articles and pictures about outstanding accomplishments of individual FFA members and/or their local chapter to all forms of print and broadcast media. The purpose of the News Reporting contest is to recognize individual FFA members for their talent and accomplishment in this area.
2. The news story must be in manuscript form with not more than three double-spaced typewritten pages. One, and not more than one, 4" X 6" or 5" x 7" color or black and white photograph must accompany the story. Each page of the story and the photograph must be mounted on **one full sheet** (22" x 28") **black** poster or **black** foam/matte board (22"x30"). Posters are to be displayed horizontally.
3. Subject must relate to Agricultural Education and/or FFA.
4. Entries will be judged based on news value, readability and organization.

SECTION 403 - AGRISCIENCE PROJECT DISPLAY

- The purpose of the Agriscience Project Display is to provide an opportunity for individual FFA members to compete in a science fair related to agriculture. Members who have developed a project based on the application of scientific principles and emerging technologies in agriculture are eligible. It is also designed to educate parents, school officials, and the public about career opportunities available for Agriscience students.
- Categories are Animal Systems, Environmental Services/Natural Resource Systems, Food Products and Processing Systems, Plant Systems, Agricultural Power, Structural and Technical Systems and Social Systems. Tulsa State Fair will not separate into divisions for ages or teams.
- The Agriscience Project Display must meet size requirements for the National FFA Agriscience Fair.
- Booth space will be assigned by the Superintendent upon arrival. Booths not meeting requirements nor following guidelines may be disqualified from the competition and/or removed from display area. Due to space limitations only the top 6 Agriscience Projects may be displayed.
- Judging criteria for the Agriscience Project Display:
Creative ability/originality: 25 points, Scientific thought/goal: 25 points, Supporting evidence: 25 points, Booth appearance: 25 points,
TOTAL: 100 points
- Ribbons awarded to 1st-5th in each category: Animal Systems, Plant Systems, Food Products & Processing, Environmental Science/Natural Resources, Power, Structural and Technical Systems, Social Science. Rosettes will be awarded to the Overall Champion & Reserve Champion Agriscience Project Display.

AGRONOMY: SECTIONS 405 - 417

- Any exhibits not displayed will be released at the completion of judging, Tuesday afternoon.
- Exhibitor's name and chapter must be on entry tag. All entries must be listed in entry book and exhibit tagged.
- Entries are for individual FFA members only, must be a product of their own Supervised Agricultural Experience program and should be a product of their own production; not purchased, borrowed, leased or received through gift.**

SECTION 405 – AGRONOMIC CROP DISPLAY

An FFA member may exhibit one entry in this division. Crops used in this display should be common agronomic crops grown in Oklahoma. Display can be corn ears (10 ears), grain sorghum (10 heads), sunflower heads (2 heads), cotton (20 open bolls) or threshed grain (approximately one peck). All exhibits must be in a box with a sturdy, see through cover. **The display box is part of the exhibit and will be a part of the judging process.** Each display should be identified with the common name of the agronomic crop displayed. The student's name, chapter and grade must be included on the entry card. It is suggested that exhibitors use a display box that is similar to the blueprint provided on at <http://okffa.org/page.aspx?ID=13> "grain box blueprints". Must include a cover. Top 5-10 may be displayed. Only one exhibit allowed per individual.

SECTION 406 - FFA HAY SHOW

1. Limited to 5 entries per school per class and only one entry per student per class
2. Classes of hay will include legume and non-legume. One small square bale will constitute an entry. The bale may be broken by the judge for evaluation purposes.
3. Bales may be displayed outside for the duration of fair, or sprayed with fire retardant.
4. Protein analysis will not be used as criteria for judging.
5. Factors considered by the judge will include maturity, texture, leafiness, freedom from foreign material, color, size and shape of bales, odor and freedom from mold.

SECTION 407 - AGRONOMIC HERBARIUM COLLECTION

This collection shall consist of dried and pressed specimens of flowers, stems, leaves and other specified parts of native and/or cultivated agronomic crops. Each complete specimen should be mounted on a separate 8½" X 11" agronomy herbarium card available by printing on card stock from www.okffa.org (under the "Participate" link). All information areas should be completed and enclosed in a notebook or binder. Each specimen should be covered with a transparent plastic or similar covering to protect it from damage. Quality of exhibits, including spelling will be considered. CARDS MUST BE DATED AND NUMBERED. NAME, CHAPTER AND GRADE must be included ON INSIDE BACK COVER. Required Table of Contents in the front of the book. Everything (cover, table of contents can be computer generated EXCEPT the information on the herbarium cards. The information on the Herbarium Cards must be hand written in ink.

The top 5 books in each class will be displayed. Only one Agronomic Collection allowed per individual. Exhibit cards in a plain one-inch (1") size hardback notebook for classes 1 & 2 or a plain (2") size hardback notebook for classes 3 & 4 with one (1) FFA emblem and the lettering "FFA Agronomic Herbarium Collection" on the front only.

Additional stages of growth may be displayed if it adds to the exhibit. Each stage of growth should be indicated. Colors should be as near as possible to natural colors. Special characteristics for identification should also be labeled. **Drawing must include the title "Life Cycle of the Cotton Plant." Use a half sheet of white poster board (finished size approx. 22" x 14"), or half sheet of white foam or mat board (finished size approx. 20" x15") to be displayed for landscape. The student's name, chapter and grade must be included on the backside of the poster.** Only one exhibit allowed per individual.

SECTION 409 – AGRONOMIC ENTOMOLOGICAL LIFE CYCLE DRAWING

This drawing should show all different stages of an insect life cycle. (egg, larvae, nymph, adult, pupae, chrysalis, etc.) Each stage should be indicated. Colors should be as near as possible to natural colors. Special characteristics for identification should also be labeled. **Drawing must include the title "Life Cycle of a Lady Beetle (aka Lady Bug)". Use a half sheet of white poster board (finished size approx. 22" x 14") or half sheet of white foam or mat board (finished size approx. 20" x 15") to be displayed for landscape view. The student's name, chapter and grade must be included on the backside of the poster.** Only one exhibit allowed per individual. The top 3-5 drawings will be displayed.

Special characteristics and definitions for identification should also be labeled. **Drawing must include the title “Average Soil Horizons”. Use a half sheet of white poster board (finished size approx. 22” x 14”) or half sheet of white foam or mat board (finished size approx. 20” x 15”) to be displayed for landscape view. The student’s name, chapter and grade must be included on the backside of the poster.** Only one exhibit allowed per individual. The top 3-5 drawings will be displayed.

SECTION 411 – FFA “Agronomic History” DISPLAY

Historical Events that Shaped Crop Production

The purpose of the contest is for FFA members to research and build a display to educate the public about historical events that have affected crop production in Oklahoma and the U.S. The topic for 2025 is the Norman Borlaug and the Green Revolution. FFA members must write a brief description of the event and how it has changed agriculture then and now. The story must be in manuscript form with not more than two double-spaced typewritten pages. In addition, one, and not more than one, 4” x 6” or 5” x 7” color or black and white photograph must accompany the story depicting the event. Each page of the story and the photograph must be mounted on one full sheet (22” x 28”) black poster or foam/matte board (22” x 30”). Posters are to be displayed horizontally. **The student’s name, chapter and grade must be included on the back of the poster.** Only one exhibit allowed per individual.

SECTION 412 – AGRONOMIC CROP IMPORTANCE DISPLAY

The purpose of the contest is for FFA members to research and build a display to educate the public about the importance of different agronomic crops in Oklahoma and the U.S. The topic for 2025 is the use of Global Positioning System (GPS) in Agriculture. The information may be displayed creatively or in manuscript form. In addition, each classification must be identified by an actual sample or an image/drawing attached to the display. **Use a half sheet of white poster board (finished size approx. 22” x 14”) or half sheet of white foam or mat board (finished size approx. 20” x 15”) to be displayed for landscape view (horizontally).** **The student’s name, chapter and grade must be included on the backside of the poster.** Only one exhibit allowed per individual.

SECTION 413 - FFA TAME FORAGE GRASS EXHIBIT

Bundle must be not less than 3 inches but no more than 5 inches at center band when cut near the ground. Should be cured (dry) before forming bundle. Will be judged on feeding value (green color, leafiness, fineness of stem, and best stage of maturity for each kind) and preparation of bundle, including neatness, cleanliness, uniformity and overall appearance. Undersized bundles, and wet or moldy bundles, will be disqualified. If Superintendent or judge deems that any bundle is old, from previous years, or is masked (New leaves over old) the Supt. has the right to disqualify the bundle. Only one exhibit allowed per class per individual.

Undersized bundles, and wet or moldy bundles, will be disqualified. If Superintendent or judge deems that any bundle is old, from previous years, or is masked (New leaves over old) the Supt. has the right to disqualify the bundle. Should be headed but not ripe enough to shatter, and shown full length (cut near the ground). Bundle should be not less than 3 inches or more than 5 inches at center band. Should be cured (dried) before forming bundle. Each bundle will be considered on basis of early stage of maturity, leafiness, and green color; and on preparation and appearance of bundle. Undersized and oversized bundles and wet or moldy bundles will be disqualified. If Superintendent or judge deems that any bundle is old, from previous years, or is masked (New leaves over old) the Supt. has the right to disqualify the bundle. Only one exhibit allowed per class per individual.

SECTION 416 - PASTURE AND RANGE PLANT DISPLAY EXHIBIT

These displays consist of ten representative plants mounted on LIGHTWEIGHT boards, measuring 3 feet square, strong enough to stand upright. Any other size will result in disqualification. The plants should be cut to prevent any part of the plant from extending beyond the edge of the board. Grasses and other fine-stemmed plants may be shown as bundles not to exceed one inch in diameter, and single plants that are heavy-stemmed or bushy may be used. Plants should be headed and in bloom or seed stage but not ripe enough to shatter. Label with common name. **The exhibitor's Name, Chapter and Grade must indicated on the back of the board.** Displays will be judged on choice of species; quality of samples (green, color, leafiness, dryness and stage maturity); neatness and arrangement of samples in general appearance of display; and correctness and readability of labels. Entries which are found to be misidentified or identical as a result of group preparation will be disqualified. The top 5 in each class may be displayed. Only one Tame and one Native Display allowed per individual.

SECTION 423 - AGRICULTURAL MECHANICS EXHIBIT

1. **Articles exhibited must have been constructed by FFA members in the Agriculture Education school shop.**
2. Entries may be individually or chapter constructed.
3. An article can be shown only once at the Tulsa State Fair and must have been constructed during the previous two school years.
4. All articles must be clean and in a presentable condition even though they may have been used during the year.
5. Pictures showing operation of the project may be displayed with the exhibit.
6. Each exhibit shall have a sign showing chapter, ownership, a detailed bill of materials with cost, and a suggested retail price. (These signs will be provided by State Office.)
7. Entries will be judged on the basis of workmanship, structure and design, practicability, safety, and materials used.
8. Exhibits in Class 7, "Reconditioned Machinery & Equipment," must be factory manufactured equipment that has been reconditioned in the Ag Shop. (It is recommended 1 to 3 photographs of the project before start of restoration is included with the material's list.)
9. Exhibits in Class 13 and 14 "Small Projects," should be less than 2 ft. in length or less than 20 lbs. in weight.
10. Exhibits in Class 17, Forged Agricultural Use Projects, should be the direct work of the student submitting the entry.
11. Where an exhibit is entered in the wrong class the Superintendent will make the determination and transfer it to the proper class.
12. The judge will not award premiums or points for entries in any class that do not meet acceptable standards of quality.
13. All exhibits to be displayed in a safe manner. Absolutely no knives, or anything resembling a weapon, will be accepted.
