

# Department 47 Open Floriculture

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- Pre-entry is required for all department 47 exhibits
- You must enter all items that you plan on bringing even if you do not bring them on entry day
- Youth, you must pre-enter any divisions exhibits that you might bring to receive premiums.
- Exhibitors are limited to one entry per class unless the class allows for more.
- All exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor or in their care for the past 3 months.
- All exhibits should be named and labeled correctly.
- All exhibits should be presented as quality finished products, all showing the best representation of its class.
- Judges will dismiss exhibits with deformed or damaged flowers caused by but not limited to bugs, spray, or disease.
- Judging is by the Danish system; each exhibit will be judged as a single entry, not against the others.
- The judge's decisions are final.
- Containers will be furnished for cut flowers only.
- Fresh Flower Preparation: Allow yourself plenty of time to get your exhibit ready. All flowers and containers should be clean. Flowers should be picked in the early morning when it is cooler. Stems should be cut under water and placed in a preservative solution. If possible, allow flowers to harden in a cool spot for at least 2 hours before bringing them to the fair.
- Thursday, Friday, Saturday & Sunday demonstrations will begin around 1 p.m. (time is subject to change)

## Division

### A - Cut Flowers - Rose, Dahlia & Zinnias – Up to 10 Entries

- One exhibit per class. Pre-enter the division even if you are not sure what you plan to bring to the fair. Choose a flower that is just beginning to bloom. You want your flower to just begin to open so it is at its finest stage when the judge views it.
- Cut your flowers at night or early morning when it is cool. Recut them under water as soon as the stem hits air after it is cut and it seals off. Use a flower preservative there are many recipes online.
- Make sure each flower is secure for transport in their own vase
- At the flower building choose the right size of bottle for the flower; not too big and not too small.
- Remove any leaves or petals with blemishes; you want to present your flower in its best possible light.
- Fill your bottle with fresh water and preservatives if you choose. Make a fresh cut and put it right into the bottle.
- Complete your entry tag making sure the name of the flower and the variety are listed.
- We want to showcase our best work. We want to show the Walla Walla Valley what we have grown and take pride in presenting the best possible cut flowers.

(Single variety, gathered into a vase – no store-bought flowers allowed) Must have more than one color, five stems or more.

### C - Shrub or Vine potted or cut.

Must be labeled with name and variety.

### D - Potted Plants

- Clean your pot. Make it presentable to the judge and for public display.
- Check for bugs! Buggy plants will be turned away. We do not want to pass them on to other plants.
- A plant with firm leaves like a hoya, fig, etc. should be dusted. A tip I learned from a past judge is to wipe the leaves with a soft rag dipped in a little bit of milk.
- Make sure you remove all leaves that are dead or torn.
- Add some moss, decorative rock, or new potting soil to the top of your pot. It makes a neat presentation.
- Make sure your plant is secure for transport.
- After your plant is placed do a once over and make sure your whole exhibit is as clean and presentable as possible. We want to showcase our best work. We want to show the public what we have grown.

### E - Decorative Fresh Floral Arrangements

All exhibits must be presented as quality finished products. All exhibits show the best representation of its class. All arrangements should have mechanics hidden (i.e.: oasis, wire, floral pins, etc.). Artificial fruit, flowers or foliage not allowed, nor dyed or painted florals and foliage's. Principles and Elements of floral design are encouraged. They include composition, unity, proportion, accent, balance, harmony, rhythm, line, form, space, texture, and color. (Not all principles and elements are required for each arrangement.)

#### Class

1. Mirrored arrangements-two arrangements that are opposite of each other
2. Natural landscape arrangement

7. All Rose arrangement
8. Mixed arrangement using at least three or more varieties of flowers. Including at least one type of major flower (i.e.: Rose, Dahlia, Sunflower). Including at least one type of minor flower (i.e.: Daisy, Dianthus, Cosmos). Including at least one type of line flower (i.e.: Iris, Gladiolus, Liatris) Filler flowers and greens are at designer's discretion. Designer's choice of container.

### I - Creature Feature

(Ribbons only) To be constructed of all natural products nothing artificial should be added. Can use (but not limited to): Fruits, nuts, seed, grasses, vegetables. Use of processed food should be limited (candy, marshmallows.) Parents are discouraged from helping youth entries! Judges may disqualify or mark an entry down if it is felt that the age listed does not represent the creature made. If creatures spoil before the end of the fair, they may be disposed of.
