FEES

The All-Pay Policy will continue for the 2022 Fair. All persons entering the grounds must pay an admission fee; everyone will be treated alike. This applies to all exhibitors, concessionaires, and Fair visitors. Specific admission prices are stated in the following paragraphs. No refund or replacement of any ticket or entry fees.

TYPES OF JUDGING:

Danish Judging: This is the traditional system; in which all exhibits of the same division are presented simultaneously to the judge. The judge evaluates each exhibit, but is permitted to give a maximum of 25% ribbons within each color group in each division. This style is used primarily in the animal departments and open division entries

Face-to-Face Judging: This form of judging allows more flexibility for judge and exhibitor. Youth bring their projects to the judge within the allotted time, and talk to the judge about their exhibit. Based on the variables from the "face-to-face" discussion, the judge awards the ribbon and premium which he/she believes in appropriate. This style is used in junior departments.

Premiums awarded by the Society:

1st Premium – Blue Ribbon or sticker

2nd Premium – Red Ribbon or sticker

3rd Premium – White Ribbon or sticker

4th Premium – Pink Ribbon or sticker

Champion Ribbons – Royal Purple

ADVERTISING

The distribution of handbills or other advertising matter is strictly prohibited, and no tacking or posting of advertising bills, cards, etc. will be permitted on any of the buildings, telephone poles or elsewhere. Exhibitors must have clearance from the Superintendent of Privileges. Rules and regulations governing commercial exhibits are available at the fair office.

LAW ENFORCEMENT REGULATIONS

Law Enforcement will be on the grounds day and night to preserve order and property. Law Enforcement will be properly identified.

All illegal drugs and carry-in alcoholic beverages are prohibited on the grounds of the Society. If an individual is found to be in possession of carry-in alcoholic beverages and/or illegal drugs he/she will be subject to the following:

1. An adult will be immediately escorted from the grounds.
2. A Junior Exhibitor
 - a. Will be escorted from the grounds after parents/guardian have been contacted.
 - b. Will not receive current year premium checks.
 - c. Will be prohibited from exhibiting the following year.
 - d. A livestock exhibitor will be prohibited from participation in the Meat Animal Sale and check withheld if animal is already sold.

ALL OFFENDERS ARE SUBJECT TO ARREST AND/OR FINE BY LOCAL POLICE.

REGULATIONS

- **No gambling institution, gift sales or games of chance as described by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture will be allowed on the Fairgrounds.**
- **Any affray or riotous proceedings, or resistance to the regulations of the Fairgrounds will be visited by the severity of the law. The public is notified that the law gives the Society "full jurisdiction and control of the Fairgrounds."**
- All persons renting horse stalls, or leasing grounds for shows or booths or special privileges, will be required to pay for same in advance.
- No vehicles permitted on the concession and exhibit areas later than 9:00 a.m. each day of the fair.
- No non-service animals allowed on the fairgrounds without permission.
- **No smoking or vaping in barns, buildings, grandstands and bleacher areas, and in other designated areas on the Fairgrounds.**

GOLF CART OPERATION POLICY

The safety of patrons is of the utmost importance to the Fair Board and is the main purpose of this policy. Maintenance personnel, Office and Board personnel, Treasurer's Office personnel, Rescue Squad, Fire Department, Security personnel, Vendors, Carnival employees, livestock exhibitors, campers (with approved applications and paid permits from the Walworth County Fair Office) are the only individuals allowed to operate golf carts/ATV/UTV, etc. during scheduled Walworth County Fairground Events. Authorized personnel are allowed to operate golf carts/ATV/UTV, etc. during defined times and areas only. NO Mini Motorbikes, hover boards, Segways or motorized scooters are to be operated by fair guests, with the exception of a motorized scooter or other power-driven mobility device used by a disabled person. Policy amended and approved on February 10, 2016.

WALWORTH COUNTY FAIR VETERINARY SERVICES

The fair veterinarians are provided by the Rock Valley Veterinary Association. They are available on Sunday for the beef weigh-in, all day Monday and Tuesday, and from 8:00 until 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 until 5:00 p.m. Wednesday through Monday. If non-emergency veterinary service is desired, exhibitors can sign up on a service list available in the UW-Extension office and the veterinarian on duty will stop by during the morning and evening regular hours. For emergency or after hour calls, exhibitors should contact the species superintendent, the extension office, or the fair office for the designated fair veterinarian or call another vet at the exhibitor's own expense. A service visit by the fair vet is not charged if it takes place during normal hours scheduled for fair veterinarians, however, any treatment or medications will be charged to the exhibitor and must be paid at the time of treatment or by personal arrangement with the vet. No animal will be released for sale or another destination unless the incurred charges are paid in full. Any early release of animals for medical reasons must be signed by a vet employed by the Walworth County Fair and the species superintendent.

Animal Health Regulations for Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin

2022 Season

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions only. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so you should always check our website or contact us for current information. Fairs or exhibitions may have additional requirements. Exhibitors should contact the event organizers for more information. Ref. s. ATCP 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code

General Requirements for Show Organizers

All fairs or exhibitions of any length must obtain, review, and keep for five years all required records and test results:

- Exhibitor's name and address
- Animal identification (number, type, description, and, when required, official identification (see requirements for different animals below))
- Documents showing compliance with disease testing, identification and other health requirements
- Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated
- Documentation showing legal importation to the event (if applicable) and, when required, movement to the event (see requirements for different animals below)
- For swine, a record of any swine transported directly to a slaughtering establishment
- For swine, a record of any swine transported to an animal market where all animals sold at the market sale for that day were shipped directly to a slaughtering establishment

Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all animals daily.

Please note: Except in specific circumstances, if an animal already bears an official 840 eartag, that eartag must not be removed and additional official eartags must not be applied. Instead the existing eartag must be read and recorded when a record of that animal is required. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.045, Wis. Admin. Code)

These regulations apply to all fairs and exhibitions, including additional events (like rodeos, shows, or other organized events) that occur in conjunction with the fair.

Diseases

Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition. Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving, or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease.

Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.

Cattle and Bison

Cattle from within Wisconsin have no requirements for tests or health documents.

Cattle from outside Wisconsin must:

- Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) documenting official animal identification ID and all required tests and certifications
- Have at least one form of official individual ID (including steers)
- Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see http://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/CattleBison.aspx)

Acceptable animal IDs for all cattle from outside Wisconsin

- USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES) (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag); this includes the orange brucellosis vaccination tag
- 15-digit "840" tags (visual or RFID)
- Valid only if applied before March 11, 2015:
 - Manufacturer-coded RFID tag - 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s
 - American ID tag - 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA"

Brucellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin

No cattle from outside Wisconsin are currently required to be brucellosis tested or vaccinated to come to fairs and shows in Wisconsin

Tuberculosis (TB) requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin

Cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone (for cattle from Michigan's TB Free Zone, see requirements by state above) also need:

- Import permit
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin
- To return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so

Cattle from Canada must meet current federal requirements to enter the United States. (See <https://www.aphis.usda.gov/regulations/vs/iregs/animals/downloads/ca-protocol-imp-cattle-bison.pdf>)

Swine

Swine from within Wisconsin need a Wisconsin intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate):

Note: *Herd of origin means the herd in which the pigs currently reside, likely the exhibitor's herd. When pigs are purchased from a herd, the herd from which they originate is the herd of origin for the seller. Once the purchased pigs are added into the buyer's herd (even if the buyer's herd only consists of one or just a few animals), the buyer's herd becomes the new herd of origin and that herd must meet testing requirements to move pigs again.*

- Stating that the entire herd of origin was inspected on the farm within 30 days before the show and showed no signs of disease.
- **Non-terminal Exhibitions:** All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and PEDv (Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the exhibition. Include test date, type, and results on the CVI. For swine originating from herds with positive tests, include the herd plan number on the CVI.
- **Terminal Exhibitions:** No testing requirements.

Note: *Terminal Exhibitions are those at which the swine go directly from the fair/show to the slaughtering establishment OR to a slaughter only market sale. If going to a slaughter only market sale, contact the Division of Animal Health fair inspector for required information to collect.*

Note: *If the fair intends to use a load-out facility, contact the Division of Animal Health in advance to discuss requirements that must be met.*

Swine from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection that includes the following:

- The negative results of the PRRS test from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- The negative results of the PEDv test from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- A statement that the veterinarian has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days and that no clinical signs of PRRS and PEDv or any other apparent disease was present at the time of inspection
- Official individual identification (ID)
- If the herd of origin tests positive for PRRS and/or PEDv, contact the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection at 608-224-4872 for options.

Acceptable methods of ID for swine are:

- USDA silver ear tag
 - USDA 840 ear tag, either visual or RFID
 - Breed association tattoo if the pig is a purebred and the tattoo is registered
 - An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier
 - Ear notch if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered
- Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant.

Sheep and Goats

Note: *These rules do not apply to non-domestic sheep and goats. For these animals see the section on Exotic ruminants below.*

Sheep and goats from within Wisconsin need:

- If sexually intact, need official individual identification (ID) at any age
- If not sexually intact, need official individual ID if they are 12 months or older.
- See below for Official ID options.
- Cannot be under restriction for movement to fairs and shows
- Sheep and goats that go to a market or slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the market/slaughter establishment.

Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) and official individual ID for all animals.
- See below for Official ID options
- See below for additional requirements for goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis Modified Accredited Zone.
- Sheep and goats that go to a market or slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the market/slaughter establishment.

Official Identification includes:

- Scrapie eartags (including tags on neckstraps for animals with absent/injured ears or with official tattoos – see DATCP Website*)
- USDA 840 ear tags
- Legible breed tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Legible scrapie tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Approved microchips (Electronic Identification/EID) – There are many requirements that need to be met to use microchips including a requirement for accompanying tattoos. See DATCP Website* and NOTE below.
- **NOTE:** *All sheep and goats that go through a market or to slaughter and require Official Identification must be eartagged with Official ID. Official ID in the form of a tattoo or Electronic Implantable Identification (EID) is no longer sufficient when moving through a market or going to slaughter.*
- **NOTE:** *If a Wisconsin origin animal is neutered, less than 12 months of age, and moving through a market after the fair, the market may require Official ID in the form of an ear tag.*

Goats from Michigan's TB Modified Accredited Zone also need:

- Import permit
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin
- To return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so

Equine

Equine animals from within Wisconsin need documentation of a negative EIA test done within the previous 12 months, which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip (if a reader is available). No test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams. Documentation may be:

- Official test report VS 10-11, or
- USDA-approved electronic test form, or
- Global Vet Link EIA electronic form, or
- Certificate of veterinary inspection with the test results listed

Equine animals from outside Wisconsin need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip
- Negative EIA test done within previous 12 months that is reported on the CVI
- No EIA test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams

Equines from Minnesota are exempt from the CVI requirement if:

- Ownership does not change while the animal is in Wisconsin
- The animal remains in Wisconsin no longer than 7 days
- Proof of a negative EIA test in previous 12 months accompanies the animal

Poultry and Waterfowl (Pigeons are not considered poultry for fairs and shows)

Poultry and waterfowl from within Wisconsin need:

- A NPIP certificate stating that the birds originate from a US. pullorum-typhoid clean or NPIP affiliate flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum
- A DATCP-issued certificate stating they are from a Wisconsin Tested or Associate Flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum or
- Individually test sexually mature birds within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band identification (ID). All birds must test negative for pullorum-typhoid, and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum.

Poultry and waterfowl from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection or equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) that states:

- They originate from a flock classified pullorum-typhoid clean under NPIP or an equivalent state program flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, or
- If they are sexually mature, that they have tested negative for pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID.

Not required:

- Import permit number

Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/PoultryMovement.aspx.

Exotic Ruminants

Note: Exotic ruminants are ruminants that are not native to Wisconsin, and are not cervids – for example, Old World camels, yaks, water buffalo, pronghorn antelope, giraffes, and non-domestic sheep and goats. In addition, please contact your county and local municipality for any restrictions.

Exotic ruminants from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Exotic ruminants from outside Wisconsin must have

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)
- Official individual identification ID as required for tuberculosis and brucellosis testing
- Import permit
- Proof written on the CVI that they meet requirements for:
 - Tuberculosis (TB) – negative test required within 60 days before entry

South American Camelids: Llamas, Alpacas, Guanacos, Vicunas

South American camelids from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

South American camelids from outside Wisconsin must have a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) and official individual ID. Official ID may be:

- Approved USDA ear tag number
- Microchip number
- Breed association registration number
- Breed association tattoo

Small Animals: Dogs, domestic cats, and other household pets

(ferrets, pet birds, rabbits, gerbils, guinea pigs, hamsters, domestic mice and rats)

Note: For animals that are part of menageries, see also rules below for menageries. Pot-bellied and miniature pigs fall under rules for swine. Dog hybrids, domestic cat hybrids, or exotic small cat species such as servals fall under rules for Exotic small animals. Native wild animals and birds, including raptors, and captive wild animals such as raccoons, opossums, and skunks fall under rules for wild animals.

Dogs from within Wisconsin that are 5 months or older need proof of current rabies vaccination.

Cats and other household pets from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Dogs and cats from outside Wisconsin that are 5 months or older need to be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed veterinarian, and regardless of age, need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) stating the age of the animal and for animals 5 months and older the date of last rabies vaccination and revaccination due date. **Other household pets from outside Wisconsin** need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) but have no testing or vaccination requirements.

Small animals from other nations need to meet requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (608-662-0600) and Centers for Disease Control (1-800-232-4636).

Exotic small animals (any species not covered by "small animals" above) exotic large animals, and other wild animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals from within Wisconsin do not have any requirements as long as they are legally possessed in Wisconsin.

Animals from outside Wisconsin generally have no testing or vaccination requirements, but do need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)
- Import permit number

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice.

Some animals may require permits from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. See <http://dnr.wi.gov>.

Circus, rodeo, racing and menagerie animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals from within Wisconsin must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

Animals from outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) and vaccinations, identifications, and tests required for their species.

See these requirements earlier in this document.

They also need import permit numbers if they are:

- Circuses and individual circus acts
- Rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses
- Multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition)
- Petting zoos

They do not need import permit numbers if they are:

- Rodeo horses owned by individual participants
- Single-species groups

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Guidelines for housing and managing animals

The State Veterinarian recommends that exhibitors:

- Vaccinate breeding cattle against bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) at least 30 days before the event
- Test cattle for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Test cattle for John's disease test results by ELISA test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport animals to and from the show, and vehicles used on the grounds before, during, and after the show
- Isolate exhibited animals returning to their farms or animals purchased at the show for 21 days before mingling them with other stock

The State Veterinarian recommends that show organizers:

- House cattle separately from South American camelids and other exotic ruminants
- House cattle separately from small ruminants, especially sheep
- House ostriches, emus, rheas and cassowaries separately from domestic poultry
- House swine separately from any other mammals
- Include a space for the premises registration code on livestock entry forms
- Provide hand-washing stations near all livestock facilities • Provide individual watering and feeding troughs rather than common ones

INSTRUCTIONS TO JUDGES AND SUPERINTENDENTS

No Judge or Superintendent will be allowed to exhibit in his or her department, nor shall any Superintendent appoint an assistant unless such appointment or appointments shall be approved by the Fair Board, and such appointments must be requested to the Administration office. Fair Board members are not allowed to exhibit in any department. The Superintendent will receive the judges' books at the Administration office. They are requested to give attention to the general regulations and requirements in the Premium List.

- 1st** - No person excepting the Judges, Superintendents, and Office Staff or his assistants will be allowed to examine the entry books until after the awards are made.
- 2nd** - The judges are instructed in all cases of attempted interference on the part of exhibitors with their deliberations and decisions, to exclude the party so offending from competition in that particular class.
- 3rd** - Premiums will not be awarded when articles are not worthy, even though there be no competition.
- 4th** - No Open Class article will be excluded on account of having taken premiums at previous fairs.
- 5th** - No premium will be awarded to barren females shown in the breeding classes. And no premiums will be paid on purebred animals without the person exhibiting the same presents the pedigree of the animals exhibited.
- 6th** - The judge's book shall be returned every evening to the Administration Office for safekeeping; and it is especially enjoined that the Judge(s) make their final report of awards at the earliest possible moment after competition.

- 7th - Each award must be written in plain and careful manner on the blank page opposite the entry. Before delivering up the Judge's books the Judges should sign them.
- 8th - Not more than two prizes shall be awarded to an Open Class exhibitor and Junior Market animal class under one class number, and only one prize in the group or herd classes may be awarded to one exhibitor.
- 9th - The Fair Board reserves the right to assign or alter space in buildings as deemed necessary.

REGULATIONS FOR STATE AID

FOR COUNTY AND DISTRICT FAIR

ATCP 160.02 Premium requirements.

(1) GENERAL.

- (a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a county or district fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health provisions under ch. ATCP 10 that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.
- (b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify action taken by a local fair.
- (c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.
- (d) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.
- (e) No county or district fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same county or district fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.
- (f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

(2) PREMIUM LISTS.

- (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (c).
- (b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.
- (c) Sections ATCP 160.01 through 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.

(3) ENTRY FEES.

- (a) A county or district fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee. The entry fee may not exceed 10% of the sum of all premiums offered to exhibitors in the same class for which the entry fee is charged. In lieu of an entry fee, a county or district fair may charge stall rents for horses, cattle, sheep, goats, swine, poultry, rabbits or pets.
- (b) Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

(4) SPLIT FAIR DATES.

- (a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.
- (b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split fair dates only if the fair organization justifies the split dates based on extreme hardship. If the department approves split dates, all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.
- (c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates, regardless of whether the department approves those split dates in advance:

1. Clothing revue.
2. Demonstrations.
3. Favorite foods revue.
4. Dogs.
5. Small animals.
6. Rocketry.
7. Shooting sports.
8. Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subds. 1. to 7.

ATCP 160.03 Exhibition requirements. A county or district fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

- (1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a county or district fair shall require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor shall the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.
- (2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.
- (3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.04 (8).
- (4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fair grounds before 4 p.m. of the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the local fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The local fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animals on the grounds.

ATCP 160.04 Junior fair division; general.

- (1) In the junior fair division, the department may pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are under 20 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year. A county or district fair board may establish subgroups within a junior fair entry class based on the exhibitor's grade in school. The department may not pay state aid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or a project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.
 - (2) All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of 4-H, FFA, a scouting program, a breed group, or another recognized youth organization under adult leadership that has an education program appropriate to that organization and is approved by the fair board.
 - (3) Exhibits in the junior fair shall be the product of the exhibitor's own labor. An exhibit may include a study project, merit project or other special project, a skill area, or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled, provided that the fair board approves the project, skill area, or supervised occupational experience as an exhibit.
 - (4) State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to any exhibitor in any department in the junior fair division, except that:
 - (a) A premium may be awarded to each member of a group that collectively owns and enters a livestock exhibit in departments one to 5 of subch. IV.
 - (b) An exhibitor may receive a separate premium for showmanship where authorized under subch. IV.
 - (c) An exhibitor may receive more than one premium in a department for which additional premiums are specifically authorized under subch. IV.
 - (5) Under subch. IV, within each of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, and 20 to 29, a fair board may establish one or more entry classes for self-determined projects that are related to that department. The fair board may establish class entry criteria, including student grade level criteria. Entry classes are open to 4-H members enrolled in a designated 4-H project or an alternative project that follows 4-H project guidelines, and to members of other youth organizations that do equivalent work and apply equivalent guidelines. Exhibits may be judged using the regular or Danish judging system. For each entry class, a fair board may pay first-place to fourth-place premiums at any of the following levels designated by the board:
 - (a) Premium level one: \$2.00, \$1.75, \$1.50, \$1.25.
 - (b) Premium level 2: \$2.50, \$2.25, \$2.00, \$1.75.
 - (c) Premium level 3: \$3.00, \$2.75, \$2.50, \$2.25.
 - (6) If 16 or more animals, items or articles are entered in any junior fair class, the class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal groups according to weight, age or other identifying characteristic and each group judged as a class.
 - (7) Special educational exhibits may [be] established if the proposal is presented to the Wisconsin association of fairs before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department.
 - (8) Within any junior fair department under subch. IV, a county or district fair may establish special classes where none are specified under subch. IV. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under subch. IV.

ATCP 160.05 Open division; general requirements.

- (1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for last place in the class.
 - (2) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.

ATCP 160.06 Senior citizens division; general requirements.

- (1) The age of exhibitors in the senior citizens division is limited to persons 62 years of age or over.
- (2) Exhibitors in the senior citizens division may not enter identical items or articles in both the senior citizens division and the corresponding classes of the regular open division.

ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements.

- (1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.
 - (2)
 - (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no county or district fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered purebreds. Registered purebred status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.
 - (b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a county or district fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.
 - (3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.
 - (4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.
 - (5) The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS for OPEN CLASS EXHIBITORS

NO SMOKING ALLOWED IN BARNs OR BUILDINGS.

1. All entries for the Open Class must be entered in advance, on or before the **first Friday in August by 5:00 p.m.** Check or money order for the total amount of all entry fees and season pass must accompany the entry blank. **NO REFUNDS.** Late entries or entries without the full payment will not be accepted.
2. Fair Board reserves the right to reject entries.
3. The Fair Board reserves the right to assign or alter space in buildings as deemed necessary.
4. All exhibits must be accompanied by the party or an agent of the party making the entry. Shipped-in exhibits will not be cared for by the Society.
5. The department Superintendent managing committee will take every precaution for the safekeeping of all stock or articles on exhibition, after their arrival and arrangement.
6. All exhibitors in the Junior Departments must purchase an open class season pass permitting them to exhibit in Open Class.
7. The Association will not be responsible for loss or damage that may occur. They desire exhibitors to give personal attention to the animals or articles and at the close of the Fair to attend to their removal.
8. Youth Open Class Exhibitor only has to pay \$15.00 if only entering in Youth Open Class divisions.
9. List each entry as it is in the book, stating department number, division letter, class number and wording as stated. If the entry blank contained in this book is not sufficient, please make copies of the form.
10. When an entry is made the Administration Office will give the party an entry tag containing the department number and the class number which entry tag will be attached to the animal or article and remain until the close of the fair.
11. No person except the Secretary and his assistants will be allowed to examine the entry books until after the awards are made.

12. Entry tags will be mailed to the exhibitor. Please examine your entry tags, they should correspond with the entry you have made and you have the right amount of entry tags.
13. **ONLY ONE LIVESTOCK PARKING PASS per family will be issued for Departments 1 – 5. All Livestock Parking Permits will be distributed by the Administration Office.**
14. Consult each Department heading for specific time entries must be in place.
15. No entries excepting livestock to be removed before 3:00 p.m. on Tuesday following the close of the fair. No livestock to be removed until 4 p.m. Monday. All bills must be paid before leaving.
16. Make all group entries. Only first prize winners are eligible to enter in championships or sweepstakes. It is not necessary to make championship or sweepstake entries.
17. All male animals one year or over competing in the department for purebred cattle, sheep and swine shall show certificates of registry in the government recognized studs, herds or flock books of their respective breeds, and all other purebred animals must be shown to be eligible in the registry books above specified.
18. No animal or article shall be allowed to be entered in more than one class, nor will any animal or article be awarded more than one premium except to make up collections, or when especially provided for in the premium list.
19. Persons entering stock to be exhibited in the ring will be expected to have it in readiness when called.
20. Judges have the final decision.
21. Protests on judging must be made out in writing on the same day in which such protested action is taken and given to the Superintendent of the department to which it applies, who shall at once deliver such protest to the President or Secretary of the Association, and it will be presented within a reasonable time to the proper Board of Committee for consideration and adjustment.
22. All protest must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00 which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protests must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, stating at length the facts relied upon or the rule(s) violated, the witnesses and their addresses must be named.
23. All protests or appeals must be presented in writing to the Administration Office prior to the close of the Fair.
24. 1099's will be issued to exhibitors according to the IRS.
25. Exhibitors must comply with any additional state mandated requirement.

SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who complete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition the "IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1) All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2) Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3) Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4) Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of, consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person to show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.
If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5) Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substances or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6) The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7) Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8) No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

- 9) The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10) The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expos and any special notices to members.
- 11) The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Show Ring Code of Ethics

Believing it is in the best interest of all breeders of all livestock to maintain a reputation of integrity and to continue to present a wholesome and progressive image in the show ring, the following list of practices are considered unacceptable in the presentation of livestock. The use of such practices or procedures is, therefore, considered a violation of the Rules and Regulations governing this show.

1. Misrepresenting the age of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
2. Treating or massaging any part of the body internally or externally with an irritant, counter-irritant, or other substance to temporarily straighten a weak back or loin or to produce unnatural animation.
3. Minimizing the effects of crampiness by feeding or injecting drugs, depressants or applying packs or using any artificial contrivance or therapeutic treatment excepting normal exercise.
4. Striking the animal to cause swelling. Blocking the nerves to prevent limping or tail switching.
5. Surgery, injection, administration of any product or material, or any other procedure performed to change the natural process of growth, maturation, contour or appearance of any animal, to include teeth, is prohibited. Not included is removal of teats or horns, clipping and dressing of hair and trimming hooves.
6. Injection or inserting of foreign material under the skin. The use of diuretics.
7. Any attempt to change natural color of an animal, either purebred or crossbred, by changing the color or adding false hair, fleece or skin at any point, spot or area of the animal's body.
8. The use of alcoholic beverages in the feed or administered as a drench.
9. The practice of artificial filling by pumping or any other device is prohibited.
10. Administration of a drug of any kind or description, internally or externally, prior to entering the show ring, except upon prior written notice to the Walworth County Fair as stated hereinafter in this paragraph and except for treating a recognized disease or injury and for tranquilizing bulls that may otherwise be dangerous or females in heat. The use of any performance enhancing drug or drug/medication/treatment which gives an animal an unfair competitive advantage is prohibited. For the purpose of these rules, the term "legal drug" shall mean any substance, the sale, possession or use of which is controlled by license under federal, state or local laws or regulations and any substance commonly used by the medical or veterinary professions. The use of any chemical and/or compound that is not approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use in meat producing animals, or which is not labeled by the FDA for use by that breed of animal, or which exceeds the FDA/EPA/USDA established tolerances for any foreign substances and the illegal use of approved chemicals and/or compounds are prohibited. All animals shall be subject to test for foreign substances that exceed the acceptable levels established by the United States Department of Agriculture, Food and Drug Administration or the Environmental Protection Agency. A positive test will result in disqualification, forfeiture of any premiums and/or awards and will exclude the exhibitor from future competition at the Walworth County Fair. All medications will be administered by licensed veterinarians only. If medications, drugs or chemicals are administered during the Walworth County Fair, such shall be administered ONLY by a licensed Veterinarian and personally witnessed by the Walworth County Fair Livestock Manager or their designated employees. If administered due to such a medical emergency, then the Exhibitor shall also provide written notice promptly and immediately to the Walworth County Fair Livestock Manager. The written notice described hereinabove shall include the particulars of the administration of the medication, drug, or chemical, including the injury or condition for which the product is administered, the name of product administered or given to the animal, the dosages given, the veterinarian who administered such and the days/dates when such medications, drug or chemical was administered. Be aware that the administration of any medications, drugs or chemicals may result in disqualification of the Exhibitor and his/her animal from the Show and the Auction, from eligibility for premiums or awards, and other penalties at the sole discretion of the Walworth County Fair.
11. Balancing the udder by any abnormal means including the use of mechanical contrivance or the injection of fluid or drugs. Setting the teats and/or occluding (sealing the ends) with a mechanical contrivance or with the use of a chemical preparation. Treating or massaging the udder or its attachments with an irritant or counter-irritant. The use of common products such as fly spray, ointment or liniment in excess to the extent that it is irritating is included as an irritant unless required to reduce edema at the time of calving.
12. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during or after the event may result in an individual or group being expelled, placed on probation, declared ineligible and/or barred from exhibiting at the event.
13. The showing of unethically fitted livestock, the showing of livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, or the misrepresentation of breeding or milking status is prohibited. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of changing the normal conformation of any part of the animal's body or using drugs, including over the counter and/or extra label, or mechanical devices to alter the physical makeup and/or performance of the animal.
14. All owners or persons in charge of property or livestock shall care for, guard, protect, and preserve same, as the Walworth County Fair does not undertake to do so, and it shall not be held responsible for any loss, shrinkage, or damage to said property or livestock or the owners or exhibitors thereof. The Walworth County Fair is not responsible for the acts of third parties.

Any violation of the Rules and Regulations specifically designed for the individual shows or the "Show Ring Code of Ethics" may result in forfeiture of all premiums and awards, disqualification, expulsion or probation of the exhibitor, organized group, and individual or livestock involved. Probation, disqualification, expulsion or other disciplinary action of the Management will be final. Such action will require application for readmission under such terms as the Management may prescribe before the group or individual is allowed to exhibit at future events.

The Walworth County Fair is a member of the following show support organizations: The Wisconsin Association of Fairs; The International Association of Fairs and Expositions. Violations at this show may affect the eligibility of the individual group, or sponsoring organization for participation at other shows who are also members of these organizations. The names of anyone in violation will be released to these other Fairs and Expositions.

2022 Walworth County Fair Livestock Equipment Rules

Equipment:

- A) **Fans:** The use of one (1) fan no larger than 24" in diameter is allowed per animal. No other air movement device is allowed. Fans must be hung from the front wall, on either side of the animal. All fans must conform to the manufacture's recommendations and the Walworth County Fair safety regulations. No butt fans allowed. All fans must be plugged directly into provided outlets – no extension cords on fans. All fans must blow air south to north.
- B) **Generators:** The use of portable power sources is permitted during show hours only. Generators must be kept outside the barns. Generators may not be used to power fans
- C) **Extension Cords:** All cords must meet Walworth County Fair and manufacture's recommendations for safety. Extension cords cannot be longer than 25' and must be a 12-gauge cord. One appliance per cord. No cords are permitted to be in the aisles or in public areas both above and on the surface without being properly secured. Walworth County Fair retains the authority to determine what is acceptable. Cords may not be used on fans.
- D) **Grooming Chutes:** Exhibitors using grooming chutes must store them out of the public walkways, in tack areas or in designated areas outside of the barn when not in use for fitting.
- E) **Stalling Equipment:** The use of stall dividers for the purpose of separating cattle and designating tack areas is permitted. No equipment is approved for use behind the animals or in the aisles.
- F) **Tack:** Show boxes, feed, bedding and other show equipment which is used for the care of the livestock must be kept neatly in the exhibitor's designated area and out of the public aisles. It is important to keep all livestock and livestock housing areas orderly and safe to demonstrate a positive image of animal agriculture to the public.

1. NOTICE – All non-lactating animals to be in place by Tuesday, 8:00 pm. Lactating animals to be in place by Thursday, 8:00 pm. Enter the fairgrounds via the North Gate.
2. No open class cattle will be allowed on the grounds before Monday morning unless arrangements are made with the superintendent.
3. Animal Health Certificates and Registration Papers must be available at the Fair.
4. Only first and second place winners in the open class may compete for Championship. Only Champion and Reserve Champion winners may compete for Grand Championships. All open class Red & Whites must be registered in either one or both associations.
5. Make All Group entries (Classes 16-19). Do not make entries for championships.
6. Fall Yearling that has calved will be shown in the 2 yr. old Cow Division.

16. No display set-up can be more than 6 feet wide and no display item can protrude into the paved walkway aisle. Large furniture (i.e. Couches, recliners, etc.) will NOT be allowed. The Fair Board reserves the right to assign or alter space in buildings as deemed necessary.
17. To be eligible for junior owned open class recognition, exhibitor can be from any Wisconsin county or any state. 1. Youth organization leaders must supply a membership roll by June 1 to the Fair Administration Office. Premiums will not be paid to exhibitor unless reported as a member of the County Youth Organizations by June 1st.
2. **All Junior class entries must be completed online at www.walworthcountyfair.com by the 3rd Friday in June. NO ENTRIES ACCEPTED AFTER THE THIRD FRIDAY IN JUNE.**
3. **The Fair Board reserves the right to reject entries.**
4. **Junior Exhibitors must be under 20 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year. Exception: 4-Her's may show one year beyond high school graduation and not to extend beyond the age of 19 at the time of enrollment.**
5. **Each Junior Exhibitor must purchase a Junior Exhibitor's ticket for \$15.00 at the time entry tags are secured from the Administration Office. If you are a Junior Exhibitor and are planning on entering Open Class, you must purchase an open class exhibitor pass instead of a junior pass. Please inform your general leader or advisor that you are entering open class. Club leaders will submit one club payment for the club and handle reimbursement as determined by the club.**
6. All entries must be in place by 8:00 p.m. the Tuesday before fair unless otherwise noted by departments.
7. Livestock exhibits will be allowed to leave the Fairgrounds after 4:00 p.m. Monday, Labor Day. **All other Junior exhibits will be released on Tuesday after the Fair from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.**
8. This department is open to any member of 4-H, FFA, FACE, other associations, organizations approved by Walworth County Fair Board. These organizations must have adult leadership in Walworth County or Burlington FFA and an approved educational program. Associate or honorary members will not be permitted to show in any class. Adult leadership must be a bonafide and recorded county leader.
9. **Junior Exhibitors must meet their organization's minimum fair eligibility requirements, as well as minimum show eligibility requirements set by their Project Committees.**
10. Any exhibitor violating fair rules will be unable to exhibit the following year and will forfeit premiums. Violators must be reported to a Jr. Division Advisor who will refer them to the proper committee to be acted upon at their discretion. Any Wisconsin State Fair participant in violation of State Fair or County rules, as determined by State Fair personnel, will be dismissed immediately from the State Fair at parental expense. The participant will also forfeit all premiums. Further, the participant will not be allowed to exhibit at the Walworth County Fair in the Junior Division the same year in which the violation occurred.
11. Any junior exhibitor that has been disqualified from any county fair for a project and/or behavioral violation will not be eligible to enter at the Walworth County Fair for three (3) years from the time the violation has taken place.
12. **NO EXHIBITOR WILL BE ALLOWED MORE THAN ONE ENTRY UNDER EACH CLASS NUMBER**, except heavyweight classes of steers, barrows and wethers or unless otherwise stated.
13. Any entry that does not meet the entry requirements or that is entered in the wrong class will be judged. The exhibitor will receive the appropriate rating ribbon, but will be ineligible for premium money and special awards. For livestock please view Livestock Rules and Regulations.
14. Any exhibitor exhibiting purchased articles made by someone else or gardening produce not raised by the exhibitor during the club year, or exhibiting any kind of livestock not taken care of as a club project by the exhibitor during this club year or any former years, as the project may call for, will forfeit any and all premium monies. Exhibits must have been completed during the past year. Excluding animal exhibits, no exhibit can be entered if previously exhibited at the Fair.
15. Exhibits in the junior department must be a result of the exhibitors' project or projects in which he or she is regularly enrolled, and must be the result of the exhibitor's own labor for the current year.
16. The Association will not be responsible for any personal injury or accident sustained to the exhibitor or the damage to any animals or property of any exhibitor.
17. Exhibitors must be present for pre-fair judging unless prior arrangements are made by calling the Extension office at 262-723-4951.
18. Department superintendents or aides working under their direction have authority to place exhibits in a manner deemed by that superintendent to be in the best interest of the Junior Department. The Fair Board reserves the right to assign or alter space in buildings as deemed necessary.
19. Superintendents or persons acting under their direction have authority to make inspections of any junior exhibit in their department at any time the articles or animals are on the fairgrounds.
20. **NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES PERMITTED. * SEE LAW ENFORCEMENT REGULATIONS.**
21. The night security, employed by the Fair Association, has authority to remove any Junior exhibitor and his or her exhibits from the fairgrounds with loss of premium if the exhibitor's conduct is not in accord with ideals of youth programs. All Junior departments have a 12:00 a.m. midnight curfew.
22. Each entry must be clearly labeled with a Walworth County Fair Entry Tag stating the exhibitors name, number, name of local club or organization and entry number.
23. All classes shall be judged according to the Danish system unless otherwise specified.
24. **PROTESTS AND APPEALS**
 - a. All protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00 which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protests must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, stating, at length the facts relied upon or the rule(s) violated, the witnesses and their addresses must be named.
 - b. All protests or appeals must be presented to the Administration Office prior to the close of the Fair.
 - c. The decision of judges or superintendents shall be final in all cases except where fraud, misrepresentation or collusion not discovered at the time of the decision is apparent. In such cases a committee composed of one Extension educator, a Walworth County Vocational Ag teacher, the president of the Walworth County 4-H Sr. Leaders Association, the department superintendent and a Fair Board member shall make the decision.
25. All questions of dispute or difference not provided for under the general and class rules shall be referred to the aforementioned committee whose decision shall be final.
26. **Administration Office will issue ONE Livestock Parking Pass per family for departments 1J – 5J.**
27. No For Sale signs allowed in any Junior Department. Only animals properly entered into the fair can be on display. No animal can leave the fairgrounds before 4:00 p.m. on Labor Day unless approved by the Fair Board. The Fair Board discourages the handling of animals by fairgoers due to sanitation reasons.
28. Exhibitors who do not end the current program year "in good standing" with their organizations will be ineligible to exhibit in the junior department as representatives of that organization the following year.
29. All ribbons and special awards (champion reserve, merits) will be given at the discretion of the judge(s).

Livestock Rules and Regulations:

(Applies only to Junior Departments - Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep and Dairy Goats)

NOTE: All livestock must be entered under correct entry number by breed and age of animal. Wrong entries will be disqualified. **If an exhibitor makes a mis-entry for their project, that animal will not be shown or sold at the current fair. Junior Class late entries will be accepted until the entry correction due date the 3rd Friday in July at 5:00 p.m. (\$100.00) late fee per exhibitor. NO EXCEPTIONS. Exhibitors will be given until the 3rd Friday in July to make corrections on their fair tags.**

1. All livestock will follow the same general health regulations which are found in the front of the premium book. A club leader or herdsman will be responsible for all health papers and are to be made available to the veterinarian upon request. Include livestock premise ID number where animals are housed on your entry form.
2. All exhibitors must furnish their own feed and bedding. **NO STRAW FURNISHED BY THE FAIR.** Hay and straw may be stacked only three bales high in the barns. Excess hay should be stored in stock trailers.
3. No Junior exhibitor will be allowed to sleep overnight in the Junior barns.
4. To help maintain a healthy environment for our animals and patrons, we ask that all exhibitors refrain from eating in the barns.
5. **Administration Office will issue ONE Livestock Parking Pass per family for departments 1J – 5J.**
6. All junior exhibitors must house their animals in their district's assigned space. This rule does not include junior exhibitors whose animals are part of their immediate family's open class show string. Steers must be kept in the Junior Barn. Wethers are to be kept in the Junior District.
7. All intact male animals of all species must be registered and papers presented prior to showing. No certification of eligibility will be accepted.
8. Record of care and management must be for a period of at least four months for junior calves, spring pigs, lambs, Junior Dairy Goats and poultry and six months for animals older. All steers, wethers, and barrows must be in possession of exhibitor by identification date.
9. Each animal must be led into the show ring by the exhibitor who is carrying that animal as his or her project, and appear promptly upon call for judging of the class. Another exhibitor may exhibit the animal if extreme hardship exists and prior approval is obtained from the livestock committee for that particular species. The exhibitor must inform when his or her stock will be judged. No adult is permitted to assist exhibitors in the show ring except for ring personnel.
10. All livestock exhibits must be well cared for throughout the entire Fair under the penalty of forfeit of premium.
11. All market animals (beef, sheep, and swine) entering the fair must have a Walworth Co. Meat Animal Sale or WI State Fair ear tag. All other tags must be removed by exhibitor except for 840 tag.
12. All market animals (beef, sheep, and swine) entering the fair must have submitted DNA samples for each to be eligible to show at the Walworth County Fair. Exhibitors should consult with their leaders for details regarding purchase of tags and DNA envelopes.
13. If any of the market animals are missing its ear tag at the official fair weigh-in scale, it will be subject to retagging and a mandatory DNA test at the exhibitor's expense.
14. Any market animal that was not identified by the county identification deadline for the species is ineligible for showing and sales.
15. No livestock will be allowed to leave the fairgrounds until after 4 p.m. Monday Labor Day, except barrows and wethers sold in the livestock sale and carcass steers, barrows and wethers. Barrows and wethers may not be released before Monday morning.
16. **SHOWMANSHIP MUST BE PRE-ENTERED.**
17. No exhibitor shall wear clothing that bears farm or firm commercial advertising when competing before the judge in any event.
18. **MEAT ANIMAL SALE - Friday 10:00 A.M.**
 - a. All animals must be properly identified to be eligible for the Meat Animal Sale. Weights at the official fair weigh in must be:
 - I. Steers, minimum 950#
 - II. Dairy Steers and dairy cross (must be at least 50% dairy breeding), min. 1050
 - III. Barrows, minimum 230# - maximum 300#
 - IV. Wethers, (Small Breeds, 90# minimum) (Large Breeds, 115# minimum)
 - V. **An animal may only be weighed once. No lightweights or heifers may be in the sale.**
 - b. No shrinkage will be deducted from sale weight but a percentage per head will be charged for selling your animal in the sale. The commission fees are used for supplies, promotion and buyer recognition banquet.
 - c. Exhibitor has privilege of withdrawing entry prior to sale. All sales final with exception of Champions & Reserves.
 - d. Neither the Fair nor the Meat Animal Sale Committee will make a guarantee as to sale price. It is the responsibility of member to help bring in prospective buyers.
 - e. All exhibitors must present their animal in a clean presentable fashion for the Meat Animal Sale. Exhibitors not adhering to this rule will not be able to sell in the fair sale.
 - f. Beef must remain in place until 4 p.m. on last day of Fair. Exhibitor is responsible to feed and care for animals until release time and must check with purchaser on arrangements for caring and transportation of animal(s).
 - g. Exhibitors of beef not furnishing a rope halter will be charged \$10.00. Sale check will be withheld until payment has been made.
 - h. All livestock consigned for sale are to be marked with a buyer card provided, to be displayed over the pen or animal.
 - i. If youth exhibit four market animals, the two heaviest **will sell** unless the department superintendent is notified by 4:00 PM Thursday. Superintendents must notify Extension office and/or designated Meat Animal Sale representative by 4:30 p.m. Thursday. No substitution of animals is permitted after that time.
 - j. An exhibitor can sell no more than a maximum of (2) animals.
 - k. If an exhibitor is selling 2 barrows, or 2 wethers, they must be sold in pairs, with the exception of the champions. Steers will be sold individually.
 - l. **STEERS**, in order to qualify for the Sale, must exhibit sufficient finish to qualify for a minimum, low choice grade. Final determination is up to the grader at time of weigh-in.
 - m. **WETHERS**, in order to qualify for the sale, must exhibit sufficient finish and conformation to qualify for the choice or prime grade. Final determination of USDA grade is up to the grader at the time of weigh in on Wednesday (must grade prime or choice to sell.)
 - n. A committee composed of a representative from the Vo-Ag Instructors, Fair Board, Beef, Sheep and Swine Committees, Buyers, Auctioneers, and the 4-H and Agricultural Educators, Locker Plant, Member at Large, and representatives of the Walworth County Business Association will be responsible for the organization of the Meat Animal Sale and the Buyer's Appreciation Dinner.
 - o. Sale checks will be mailed to the exhibitors by the Walworth County Business Association.
 - p. Animals will not be sold in the sale if exhibitors are not present to sell their animals unless they have made prior arrangements with the sale committee. All animals must be shown in class in order to sell.
19. All Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Animals must be terminated for slaughter.
20. Unless other arrangements are made, all sale animals will be removed Monday by Madaus Trucking. If you want to take your sale animal home, you must present the Junior Superintendent a signed form from the buyer stating arrangements made prior to shipment. Exhibitors not complying with this rule will forfeit all premiums and money.
21. Judging of Herdsmanship will start at 5:00 p.m. Wednesday and continue from 9:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m. on all succeeding days except during showtime and one hour ahead and after showing. Last judging is noon on Sunday.
22. Any junior exhibitor may enter livestock in the open class providing the entry is made on or before the 1st Friday in August, at the Administration Office. **Each Junior Exhibitor must purchase an adult season pass at that time.** You then do not have to buy a Junior Exhibitor ticket, but please make a note on both entry blanks and inform your leader that you have entered both. Entry fees will also be charged. Open and Junior class regulations will apply.
23. Livestock exhibitors must show their own or immediate family's animals in the showmanship contests and must be enrolled in the project.
24. All exhibitors must meet mandatory requirements for their species. Exhibitors must contact the species superintendent within one week of attending an event to ensure it meets the qualifications of that species.
25. Any exhibitor showing at a previous county fair junior department in Wisconsin during a calendar year is ineligible to show in the same department at the Walworth County Jr. Fair.
26. The Walworth County Fair reserves the right to drug test and test for steroids. They may also run random DNA comparison samples.

27. Any junior exhibitor that has been disqualified from any county fair for a project and/or behavioral violation will not be eligible to enter at the Walworth County Fair for three (3) years from the time the violation has taken place.

SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who complete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition, the "IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1) All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2) Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3) Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4) Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of, consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person to show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.
If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.
At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5) Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substances or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6) The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

- 7) Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8) No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9) The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10) The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expos and any special notices to members.
- 11) The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Show Ring Code of Ethics

Believing it is in the best interest of all breeders of all livestock to maintain a reputation of integrity and to continue to present a wholesome and progressive image in the show ring, the following list of practices are considered unacceptable in the presentation of livestock. The use of such practices or procedures is, therefore, considered a violation of the Rules and Regulations governing this show.

1. Misrepresenting the age of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
2. Treating or massaging any part of the body internally or externally with an irritant, counter-irritant, or other substance to temporarily straighten a weak back or loin or to produce unnatural animation.
3. Minimizing the effects of crampiness by feeding or injecting drugs, depressants or applying packs or using any artificial contrivance or therapeutic treatment excepting normal exercise.
4. Striking the animal to cause swelling. Blocking the nerves to prevent limping or tail switching.
5. Surgery, injection, administration of any product or material, or any other procedure performed to change the natural process of growth, maturation, contour or appearance of any animal, to include teeth, is prohibited. Not included is removal of teats or horns, clipping and dressing of hair and trimming hooves.
6. Injection or inserting of foreign material under the skin. The use of diuretics.
7. Any attempt to change natural color of an animal, either purebred or crossbred, by changing the color or adding false hair, fleece or skin at any point, spot or area of the animal's body.
8. The use of alcoholic beverages in the feed or administered as a drench.
9. The practice of artificial filling by pumping or any other device is prohibited.
10. Administration of a drug of any kind or description, internally or externally, prior to entering the show ring, except upon prior written notice to the Walworth County Fair as stated hereinafter in this paragraph and except for treating a recognized disease or injury and for tranquilizing bulls that may otherwise be dangerous or females in heat. The use of any performance enhancing drug or drug/medication/treatment which gives an animal an unfair competitive advantage is prohibited. For the purpose of these rules, the term "legal drug" shall mean any substance, the sale, possession or use of which is controlled by license under federal, state or local laws or regulations and any substance commonly used by the medical or veterinary professions. The use of any chemical and/or compound that is not approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use in meat producing animals, or which is not labeled by the FDA for use by that breed of animal, or which exceeds the FDA/EPA/USDA established tolerances for any foreign substances and the illegal use of approved chemicals and/or compounds are prohibited. All animals shall be subject to test for foreign substances that exceed the acceptable levels established by the United States Department of Agriculture, Food and Drug Administration or the Environmental Protection Agency. A positive test will result in disqualification, forfeiture of any premiums and/or awards and will exclude the exhibitor from future competition at the Walworth County Fair. All medications will be administered by licensed veterinarians only. If medications, drugs or chemicals are administered during the Walworth County Fair, such shall be administered ONLY by a licensed Veterinarian and personally witnessed by the Walworth County Fair Livestock Manager or their designated employees. If administered due to such a medical emergency, then the Exhibitor shall also provide written notice promptly and immediately to the Walworth County Fair Livestock Manager. The written notice described hereinabove shall include the particulars of the administration of the medication, drug, or chemical, including the injury or condition for which the product is administered, the name of product administered or given to the animal, the dosages given, the veterinarian who administered such and the days/dates when such medications, drug or chemical was administered. Be aware that the administration of any medications, drugs or chemicals may result in disqualification of the Exhibitor and his/her animal from the Show and the Auction, from eligibility for premiums or awards, and other penalties at the sole discretion of the Walworth County Fair.
11. Balancing the udder by any abnormal means including the use of mechanical contrivance or the injection of fluid or drugs. Setting the teats and/or occluding (sealing the ends) with a mechanical contrivance or with the use of a chemical preparation. Treating or massaging the udder or its attachments with an irritant or counter-irritant. The use of common products such as fly spray, ointment or liniment in excess to the extent that it is irritating is included as an irritant unless required to reduce edema at the time of calving.
12. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during or after the event may result in an individual or group being expelled, placed on probation, declared ineligible and/or barred from exhibiting at the event.
13. The showing of unethically fitted livestock, the showing of livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, or the misrepresentation of breeding or milking status is prohibited. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of changing the normal conformation of any part of the animal's body or using drugs, including over the counter and/or extra label, or mechanical devices to alter the physical makeup and/or performance of the animal.
14. All owners or persons in charge of property or livestock shall care for, guard, protect, and preserve same, as the Walworth County Fair does not undertake to do so, and it shall not be held responsible for any loss, shrinkage, or damage to said property or livestock or the owners or exhibitors thereof. The Walworth County Fair is not responsible for the acts of third parties.

Any violation of the Rules and Regulations specifically designed for the individual shows or the "Show Ring Code of Ethics" may result in forfeiture of all premiums and awards, disqualification, expulsion or probation of the exhibitor, organized group, and individual or livestock involved. Probation, disqualification, expulsion or other disciplinary action of the Management will be final. Such action will require application for readmission under such terms as the Management may prescribe before the group or individual is allowed to exhibit at future events.

The Walworth County Fair is a member of the following show support organizations: The Wisconsin Association of Fairs; The International Association of Fairs and Expositions. Violations at this show may affect the eligibility of the individual group, or sponsoring organization for participation at other shows who are also members of these organizations. The names of anyone in violation will be released to these other Fairs and Expositions.

Walworth County Fair Livestock Equipment Rules

Equipment:

- A) **Fans:** The use of one (1) fan no larger than 24" in diameter is allowed per animal. No other air movement device is allowed. Fans must be hung from the front wall, on either side of the animal. All fans must conform to the manufacturer's recommendations and the Walworth County Fair safety regulations. No butt fans allowed. All fans must be plugged directly into provided outlets – no extension cords on fans. All fans must blow air south to north.
- B) **Generators:** The use of portable power sources is permitted during show hours only. Generators must be kept outside the barns. Generators may not be used to power fans.
- C) **Extension Cords:** All cords must meet Walworth County Fair and manufacturer's recommendations for safety. Extension cords cannot be longer than 25' and must be a 12-gauge cord. One appliance per cord. No cords are permitted to be in the aisles or in public areas both above and on the surface without being properly secured. Walworth County Fair retains the authority to determine what is acceptable. Cords may not be used on fans.
- D) **Grooming Chutes:** Exhibitors using grooming chutes must store them out of the public walkways, in tack areas or in designated areas outside of the barn when not in use for fitting.
- E) **Stalling Equipment:** The use of stall dividers for the purpose of separating cattle and designating tack areas is permitted. No equipment is approved for use behind the animals or in the aisles.
- F) **Tack:** Show boxes, feed, bedding and other show equipment which is used for the care of the livestock must be kept neatly in the exhibitor's designated area and out of the public aisles. It is important to keep all livestock and livestock housing areas orderly and safe to demonstrate a positive image of animal agriculture to the public.

General Rules:

1. Species to be included in the Master Showman Contest: Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep and Goat.
2. The species representative will be the winner of their respective species Senior Showmanship Class (5 contestants total).
3. If the original winner of the species showmanship wishes to not compete the option defaults to the 2nd place winner of the species. If the contestant becomes eligible in more than one species to participate in the Master Showman they must choose which species they would like to represent. This MUST be done by 1 hour after winning the second contest. Both Superintendents and Master Showman Committee must be informed of the decision
4. The overall winner of the Master Showman Contest is no longer eligible to participate again in the Master Showman Contest. It is each species representative decision to allow the individual to still compete in that departments Showmanship Class. Those contestants who place 2nd thru 5th place are eligible to compete in the contest again.
5. Each contestant will show an animal from each of the five species included. This will NOT include a contestant's own animal.
6. Animals are chosen by the species superintendent not the Master Showman Committee.
7. Each species superintendent (or species representative) will be present in the show ring during the showing of that species. They will act as ring men and safety advocates for the animals.
8. Contestants will be judged out of 30 points per species. Judging will be based on showmanship, knowledge of the species, attitude & appearance.
9. Judges are selected by the Master Showman Committee. Recommendations for judges are always accepted and will be considered.
10. Any items needed to show a specific species will be supplied along with a show number that is to be worn for the duration of show. Items supplied may include but not limited to a show stick, comb/brush & halter.
11. All contestants will receive a cash prize at the conclusion of the show. Exact amounts are TBD.
12. Contestant information sheets are due to the Master Showman Committee by Noon on Saturday.
13. Contestants have till one hour prior to the show to learn everything they can about each of the species in the contest.
14. White show attire is not required for the contest. Each contestant will receive a show shirt courtesy of Compeer Financial.

Golden Pitchfork: Sponsored by Oak Shade Farms, Burlington WI.

The Master Showman Contest Committee will be giving out a "Spirit" award to the barn that we feel put forward the best sportsmanship for the year. Judges will walk through barns and look at the décor (Is there an educational display? Use of fair theme and overall cleanliness of the barn.) Also looked at will be Support (for the contestant and contest.) Barn that wins will receive The Golden Pitchfork and a Pizza Party. Date to be determined by Species Superintendent.

Award is scored on the following:

1. Décor in each barn. Barn is judged as a whole, not by districts. The exception is if the exhibitor does not stall in the junior section. The contestant's open display will also be included. (20 pts.)
2. Support in barn. How well is the general contest promoted and the contestant? (20 pts.)
3. At contest time. Each species judge chooses their choice for barn they feel has best sportsmanship. (15 pts/per judge)

5. Any grade animals may be tied in open class barn.
6. Dairy Exhibitors must show their own animals in the Showmanship Contests and must be enrolled in the project.
7. All exhibitors must complete one of the following: 1) Attend any scheduled county wide dairy project meeting **OR** 2) If offered – attend any dairy judging / evaluation practice for area animal science days **OR** 3) Exhibit at Wisconsin State Fair as a Junior Exhibitor.
8. All animals shown in Activity Center should enter from the south entrance and exit through the west entrance.
9. All rules and regulations on page 55 and 56 are required.

AGE CLASSIFICATIONS:

1. A spring calf is one born in March, April, or May of exhibit year.
2. A winter calf is one born between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.
3. A fall calf is one born between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
4. A summer yearling is one born between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
5. A spring yearling is one born between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
6. A winter yearling is one born between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the preceding exhibit year.
7. A fall yearling is one born between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
8. A 2-year-old is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A 2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.
9. A 3-year-old is one born between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.
10. A 4-year-old is one born between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

DAIRY REGULATIONS (Grade versus Registered)

1. All registration papers must be checked and it is your responsibility to get them to the Superintendent by Thursday 10 p.m.
2. All purebred animals or grades QIH grades must have registration papers proving 87.5% Holstein ancestry by June 1 of the fair year. (Including Red and Whites Holsteins). EXCEPTION: March-May heifer calves must be registered by July 1.

RULES GOVERNING EXHIBITS – READ THEM CAREFULLY

1. An exhibitor may exhibit six beef animals with no more than three (3) of those animals being steers. (3 steers in live show or two in live and 1 in carcass). Only two animals (both can be steers) may be sold at the Meat Animal Sale, this includes Grand & Reserve Carcass steers.
2. Each exhibitor must be YQCA certified and meet mandatory meeting requirements in order to exhibit at the Walworth County Fair.
3. Only those steers mouthed as junior yearling or younger, properly identified and weighed according to regulations will be allowed to exhibit and sell. Dairy steers and dairy cross steers (at least 50% dairy breeding) must weigh a minimum of 1050# to sell. All other steers must weigh a minimum of 950# to sell. All decisions made at the scale and mouthing chute and decisions of the veterinarians, grader, and mouther in charge are final.
4. Mouthing and weighing will be from 5:30 – 7:00 pm on Tuesday evening. All feeder calves will be weighed immediately after the steer weigh-in, in order to break classes by weight.
5. A district herd will be composed of five animals which are the project animals of three or more exhibitors.

6. In Crossbred classes, only beef crosses will be allowed to be exhibited. EXAMPLE: A. A steer sired by a Hereford bull and born to an Angus cow should be shown in this class. Only "purebred" animals will be allowed to enter in breed classes, "purebred" will be defined by each breed organization.
7. Steers will be grouped by weight to give equal size classes and classes will be posted.
8. No exhibitor in the Junior Department will be allowed to compete in a Showmanship Contest which he/she has won the previous year. Winners of their age division must advance to the next age division the following year. They may not regain eligibility within the age group where the award took place, except in the Senior Division, where the winner will not be required to sit out. SHOWMANSHIP MUST BE PRE-ENTERED IN THE DIVISION THE YOUTH IS TO SHOW IN ACCORDING TO THE RULE ABOVE. EXHIBITOR MUST USE OWN ANIMAL IN SHOWMANSHIP.
9. The Walworth County Fair Board reserves the right to randomly drug test all steers including the Champion and Reserve Champion steers for drug violations. Random DNA samples will be pulled from steers at weigh-in. The Champion and Reserve Champion steers will have mandatory DNA tests.
10. All steers must be tagged with a Walworth Co. Meat Animal Sale tag or WI State Fair tag and DNA samples must be submitted for each to be eligible to show at the Walworth Co. Fair.
11. No bulls will be weighed or tagged. Leaders and advisors will notify exhibitors of weigh-in date. All animals will be identified by some means determined suitable by the committee. Bull leads or wires through noses will not be permitted at the spring weigh-in.
12. Exhibitors must state breed of animals at this weigh in. In "Any Other Breed" divisions – specify Breed.
13. No breaking halters permitted in show ring.
14. The beef calendar year will run from Spring Weigh-In to the Walworth County Fair.
15. All steers must be haltered and double tied with neck collars.
16. All steers must be dehorned by spring weigh-in. Regrowth must not be more than 3" at veterinarian's discretion.
17. All steers must be halter broke to lead at spring weigh-in – no breaking halters allowed.
18. Fitting – Cattle may be towed when entering the show ring. Cattle showing evidence of having their natural color altered on the body proper will be prohibited from showing. No foreign matter or use of additional hair will be allowed on any beef entry. No artificial filling of animals will be allowed. Fittings should be done in designated Jr. Area.
19. Animals not under control by exhibitor may be dismissed at the discretion of the ring personnel. Judge may still award premium.
20. Fans will not be permitted in the aisles of the breed exhibit.
21. All steers must be stalled in the Jr. Beef Barn.
22. Clipping and grooming on exhibits while on the fairgrounds is to be done by the Junior Exhibitor, his/her immediate family, Walworth County 4-H and FFA leaders or advisors and/or other Wisconsin Junior Beef Members.
23. All exhibitors must fulfill two requirements: 1. Attend 1 educational meeting or participate in another junior beef event. (Exhibitors must contact the superintendent within one week of attending the event to ensure it meets the qualifications of the beef project). 2. Help with the Junior Beef Annual Steak Cookout in mid-July.
24. There will be an exhibitors' meeting at 5 pm on Tuesday evening immediately preceding weigh-in and mouthing.
25. All rules and regulations on page 55 and 56 are required.

RULES GOVERNING EXHIBITS – READ THEM CAREFULLY

1. Families will register up to eight (8) barrows per family member exhibitor. The barrows will be entered in the family name with the exhibitors making exact entries when entries are due to the Fair Office. All barrows to be ear notched by the United Method of ear notching by exhibitor.
2. Pigs purchased out of state or from Wisconsin that are not tested or test positive for PRRS or PEDV must be tested at the exhibitors expense before they can be shown at the Walworth County Fair.
3. Each exhibitor must be YQCA certified and meet mandatory meeting requirements in order to exhibit at the Walworth County Fair.
4. Weigh-in hours are 2:00 p.m. – 7:00 p.m. on the Monday preceding the show.

5. Exhibitors will be allowed to enter barrows from different breeds, but will be allowed to exhibit a total of only two (2) barrows from those entered.
6. Barrows may be unloaded on Monday between the hours of 9 am and 6 pm. Health papers and required forms will be handed in before barrows are unloaded. All barrows will be weighed in between 2:00 pm and 7:00 pm, using an open scale method. **Fair entry tags must be presented at the scale for all barrows.** It is recommended to wash your pigs at home before arriving at the fair. If there are no carcass entries, only 2 barrows may be unloaded.
NO HOGS ALLOWED IN THE BARN BEFORE 9:00 AM ON MONDAY.
7. You must have the original registration papers at weigh in. No faxes or copies will be accepted. If registration papers do not match at the scale, your barrow will be considered a crossbred and must be entered as such to be eligible to be shown. Make your crossbred back-up entry when you make your other entries. It cannot be added at the fair.
8. Feeding of swine will be completed by 8:00 am and between 4:00 – 6:00 pm, in the evening. Pens must be cleaned out when your pigs leave and all manure must be put in the manure pit east of the swine barn. Failure to comply will result in loss of premiums.
9. Exhibitors under 12 years of age are ineligible to show a January Boar.
10. Market barrows must weigh a minimum of 230# to show and sell. All lightweight barrows and heavyweight barrows #300 (Not Entered in the Carcass show) will be shown first on Wednesday morning by weight only, not by breeds. These barrows do not qualify for the Champions or the Meat Animal Sale. All carcass barrows not in the top 50 must leave the fairgrounds by 9:00 pm Tuesday night.
11. Barrows will be shown by breeds alphabetically. Divisions will be divided according to weight and posted.
12. Skin and hair products are legal to use, but it is strongly advised not to use pure oil products on swine as it makes it unpleasant for the ring help to handle these hogs and makes the slaughter process harder. All show boxes are to be kept out of main alleys. Show boxes may not exceed 24" x 36" in size.
13. **EACH BARROW WILL BE WEIGHED ONE TIME. NO EXCEPTIONS.**
14. No exhibitor will be allowed to compete in a Showmanship Contest which he/she has won the previous year. They may not regain eligibility within the age group where the award took place, except in the Senior Division, where the winner will not be required to sit out. **SHOWMANSHIP MUST BE PRE-ENTERED IN THE DIVISION THE YOUTH IS TO SHOW IN.** Exhibitors entered in Showmanship may use another exhibitor's animal if he/she has no eligible animal.
15. All exhibitors must attend 1 educational meeting or participate in another species event. Exhibitors must contact the Swine superintendent within one week of attending the event to ensure it meets qualifications of that species. Attending the carcass show at the locker plant counts as attending a mandatory meeting for the following year. (Exhibition in the Junior Swine Show at the Wisconsin State Fair counts as attending a mandatory meeting for the current year.)
16. There will be a mandatory exhibitor's meeting at 2:00 pm Tuesday before carcass show.
17. All exhibitors selling in the Meat Animal Sale must turn in 2 self-addressed stamped Thank You cards to their buyers by Monday noon. This is mandatory even if you thank your buyer personally during the sale. Failure to turn in thank you cards will result in a one-year suspension from showing.
18. There will be no changing of barrow locker destination after 10:00am on Saturday of the Fair.
19. The Walworth County Fair reserves the right to randomly drug test all hogs for drug violations. The Walworth County Swine Committee will be testing 10 hogs. Random DNA samples will be pulled at weigh-in. The Champion and Reserve Champion barrows will be subject to Mandatory DNA testing.
20. Load out is on Monday of the Fair any time after 5:00 a.m. On Monday of loadout, no pens may be cleaned until after 10:00 a.m. to allow us to get pigs out more efficiently. Barn will be closed from 5:00 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. to allow for loadout.
21. Any market barrow that arrives at fair weigh-in scale missing its Walworth Co. Meat Animal Sale tag or WI State Fair tag will be subject to retagging and mandatory DNA testing at the owners expense. Tags lost during the fair will not be charged.
22. All exhibitors are required to work one (1) shift of barn duty during the fair. Failure to complete this obligation will result in a one (1) year suspension from showing.
23. No individual scales are allowed in the barn.
24. All exhibitors must submit a completed *Swine Project Summary* form for review by the time and date directed by the superintendent. This form will be returned on the day of the sale.
25. The top 5 barrows from the live show plus additional will be subject to drug testing either by blood draw or urine, Violators will forfeit all sale money and will face a family suspension of one year. Refusal to submit to such test will be considered an admission of guilt and result in a one year family suspension from exhibiting.
26. All rules and regulations on page 55 and 56 are required.
27. Walking pigs in the showing is not allowed after Monday. Walking in the aisle is allowed, but you must clean up after your pigs.
28. **JUNIOR SWINE EXHIBITORS:** The use of Ractopamine (Paylean and/or Engain) is prohibited. The Walworth County Fair will now require a signed affidavit from a parent or legal guardian and Junior exhibitor at the time of check in at the fair which states that the pigs exhibited by the Junior exhibitor have never been offered Ractopamine (Paylean and/or Engain).

RULES GOVERNING EXHIBITS – READ THEM CAREFULLY

1. Each exhibitor must be YQCA certified and meet mandatory in order to exhibit at the Walworth County Fair.
2. Exhibitors should enter one crossbred wether class for every purebred wether entered in case one or more purebred animals does not grade as expected at the fair weigh-in scale.
3. If a wether's breed is in question, it should be double entered in the fair in both the purebred and the crossbred classes in the event it does not display enough breed characteristics at fair time as determined by the committee.
4. Exhibitors may show a total of two wethers. A pen consists of 2 wethers of the same breed; and must have been shown individually in their respective breed classes by that same exhibitor.
5. Wether lambs will be identified by the sheep committee at the spring tagging at the Walworth County Fairgrounds.
6. All wethers must be in the exhibitor's possession by the county tagging date.
7. Exhibitors should consult their leader for exact date and location of tagging.
8. Families may register up to eight wethers per family member exhibitor and each lamb will be identified with Walworth Co. Meat Animal Sale ear tags.
9. Exhibitors must present a fair entry tag for each lamb at weigh-in to document its proper entry in the fair.
10. Wethers will be identified in the family name with exhibitors making exact entries at the time of fair registration.
11. If a lamb is registered as a crossbred at the spring tagging, it cannot be changed to a purebred at any time.
12. Any disputes as to a wether's breed type will be decided by a vote of the committee the day of tagging and/or final weigh-in.
13. Exhibitors will be responsible for removing any tags from their lamb's ear.
14. Each wether must have the proper ear tags in place before entering the scale. All blankets must be removed before the wether will be weighed. Sheep drug withdrawal forms are to be handed in at the time of weigh-in.
15. All project animals for both county and state exhibitions must be kept at the exhibitor's home and cared for by the exhibitor and their family. Permission to house the project animals someplace other than home must be obtained from the sheep committee members by the county tagging date. Farm visits may occur at the committee's discretion. Non-compliance will result in the disqualification from both county and state sheep exhibitions. In other words, junior exhibitors must be in good standing at the county level to participate at the state level. Exhibitor can appeal to the Fair Board.
16. All sheep must be in place by 8:00 pm Tuesday. Wethers for the Meat Animal Sale will be weighed at 7:30 am Wednesday. Wethers (large breeds) must weigh a minimum of 115# for consignment in the Meat Animal Sale and must grade prime or choice. Wethers in the small breeds (Cheviot, Southdown, and any other small breed to be determined by the committee) must weigh a minimum of 90# for consignment.
17. Exhibitors meeting will be held on Wednesday of Fair at 7:00 a.m. before weigh-in.
18. No sheep or lambs may leave the barn once in place on Tuesday evening until after the completion of the Junior show on Thursday except to go to the wash rack area. If removed from the sheep barn, the animal will not be permitted to show or sell.
19. All purebred rams and ewes must be registered in the Jr. exhibitor's name in order to show. Committee members will check papers Tuesday night from 8:00 – 9:00 pm.
20. Only those animals that have lamb teeth will be eligible to show in the lamb classes, yearlings must have yearling teeth.
21. Only the judge, the superintendent, and his aides and the exhibitors actually showing the animals will be permitted in the ring.
22. All breeding classes of registered Targhee, and Columbias show with 2-inch wool or less. All Shropshires must be slick shorn. All other breeds must not carry more than 1" of wool on any part of the body. In market classes, all lambs must be slick shorn (within 5 days) before entering the scale to be weighed the day before showing.
23. No coloring of sheep or chemical enhancement or inhumane treatment of any kind will be permitted. This includes the application of any substance other than soap and water when fitting the animal for show. Icing of any sort is prohibited.
24. A district herd will consist of 5 sheep shown by 3 exhibitors with not more than 3 sheep shown by one exhibitor. Both sexes are to be represented and market animals may be included.
25. Classes for a market lamb pen of 2 will be determined by the average weight of the 2 lambs.
26. No exhibitor in the Junior Department will be allowed to compete in a Showmanship Contest which he/she has won the previous year. Winners of their age division must advance to the next age division the following year. They may not regain eligibility within the age group where the award took place. SHOWMANSHIP MUST BE PRE-ENTERED IN THE DIVISION THE YOUTH IS TO SHOW IN, except in Senior Division, where the winner will not be required to sit out.
27. Showmanship will be held promptly at 8:00 am and will be run in order from oldest to youngest.

28. Clipping and grooming on exhibits while on the fairgrounds is to be done by any Junior exhibitor, immediate family member, or youth leaders on file in the fair office. No show stands allowed in aisles after 8:00 a.m. show day.
29. Each animal entered will be only shown once except for pen of wethers and showmanship divisions.
30. Wethers that do not meet the weight or grade requirements are eligible to show. They will not be sold in the sale.
31. Use of a drench gun or any use of a muzzle is prohibited. Any oral administration or injection to a sheep or lamb is prohibited unless administered by the fair veterinarian. All lambs will have free-choice, fresh, clean water in pens at all times. A violation of any part of this rule will result in the exhibitor's disqualification from the sheep show and sheep portion of the Meat Animal Sale. All exhibitors must attend 1 educational meeting or participate in another species event. Exhibitors must contact the species superintendent within one week of attending the event to ensure it meets the qualifications of that species.
32. The Walworth County Fair reserves the right to randomly drug test all wethers for drug violations. Random DNA samples will be pulled at weigh-in. The Champion and Reserve Champion will be subject to mandatory DNA testing.
33. Any market lamb that arrives at the fair with a missing Walworth County Meat Animal Sale or Wisconsin State Fair tag will be subject to mandatory retagging and DNA testing at the exhibitor's expense.
34. All rules and regulations on page 55 and 56 are required.

9. An exhibitor may sell no more than a total of four (4) animals: 2 wether goats, meat birds, or rabbits, at the Fur & Feather Sale. All animals sold at the sale must be commercial grade and blue ribbon winners.
10. No exhibitor in the Junior Department will be allowed to compete in a Showmanship Contest which he or she has won the previous year except in the Senior Division. Members who have won the Senior Division, regardless of age, must continue in Senior Division. Seniors will be able to compete again if they win. Winners can sit one year to regain eligibility within the age group where the award took place, or must advance to the next age group. SHOWMANSHIP MUST PRE-REGISTER to receive premiums. Exhibitor age will be determined as of Jan. 1 of the current year.
11. **Barn duty is required of all exhibitors. Exhibitors must attend three county project meetings. Failure to comply with either portion of this rule will be cause for disqualification from the goat show and goat portion of the Fur & Feather Sale.**

1. No exhibitor may exhibit more than 2 head in the project. Team driving is exempt from this limit. Any exhibitor showing at a previous county fair during a calendar year in Junior Competition is not eligible to show in the same division at the Walworth County Fair.
 - a. Managerial – Not to be owned by the exhibitor. Management (to include riding, driving, and grooming) to commence May 1 and to include at least 70% of the work associated with the managed animal.
 - b. Ownership – To be owned by the exhibitor or the exhibitor's immediate family (mother, father, brother, sister, or legal guardian) to be cared for by the member at least 70% of the time commencing May 1.

c. Hardships – Must be appealed to the Horse & Pony Executive Committee

HARDSHIP POLICY- To apply for hardship, the youth member/parent/guardian must contact the Superintendent of the Horse & Pony Executive Committee and request a hearing. Depending on the time, the Executive Committee will hear the hardship at the beginning of a regular meeting or a special meeting will be called to ensure deadlines are met. In no case will more than 15 days' pass between the time of the request and the meeting. The youth member, with parent, guardian, or owner (in the case of managerial animal), will come to the meeting and present their request for hardship along with signed veterinarian's certificate and all other necessary information pertinent to the request. A safety concern may be addressed as a hardship when the youth member presents the request, with parent, guardian, or owner (in the case of a managerial animal) along with a written statement by the respective Walworth County Horse and Pony Discipline Leader. The Youth member may or may not be asked questions by the Executive Committee. At this point, those requesting the hardship will be excused so the Executive Committee may discuss and vote on the hardship request. The youth member will be notified of the Executive Committees' decision within 48 hours of the meeting date. The animal that is hard shipped may not be exhibited for that project year. If the hardship is requested, reviewed, or approved after the Walworth County Fair add/drop date for fair tags deadline, the replacement animal will not be eligible for Grand or Reserve Champion premium money or competing at the State 4-H Horse Show. The Committee will decide all hardship applications by a simple majority vote on ballots. At least seven (7) Executive Committee members must be present for the vote to be official. **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE DECISIONS ARE FINAL.**

2. No exhibitor will be allowed more than one entry under each class.

RULES GOVERNING EXHIBITS – READ THEM CAREFULLY

1. No exhibitor will be allowed more than one entry under each class number.
2. All birds (including non-bird projects) must be brought to the fair between 7 am and 7 pm on Tuesday. Birds must be clean, appear healthy, and free of parasites or they will not be allowed to stay at the fair. All birds (including non-bird projects) must be removed after 4 pm and before 7 pm on Monday (Labor Day) after a committee member has checked you out. Before your birds are removed from the fairgrounds, all feed and water containers are to be cleaned and put away and all trash removed.
3. Attendance at one poultry project meeting is required to show at the fair. If this is not met, birds may be dropped one place during the show (Example, a blue ribbon bird will get a red ribbon).
4. Each exhibitor will be expected to clean their cages each day and refill water and feed throughout the day, Barn duty is required of all exhibitors. Failure to comply with either previous portion of the rule may cause premiums and awards to be withheld.
5. Each exhibitor may sign up 15 bird entries, but may only show a maximum of 10. Only 1 male and 1 female per class may be entered per Division letter. Scratches (entry tags of bird not being shown) **SHOULD BE** surrendered at set-up or must be turned in on Tuesday at check in to the Fair. If scratches are not reported by check in deadline to bring total to 10, excess bird entries will be scratched by the superintendent; starting with auction eligible birds. If there are no auction eligible birds, then the scratches will proceed in class alphabetical order.
6. All entries should be varieties recognized by the American Standard of Perfection or the Bantam Standard of Perfection. All birds must show in class entered. Any entries not recognized by the American Standard of Perfection or the Bantam Standard of Perfection can only advance at the level of their class. They will not be eligible for awards beyond their class.
7. All birds must arrive at check-in with numbered leg bands on the birds.
8. All birds must be shown only by a junior exhibitor.
9. All birds (except roasters and broilers) must be owned by exhibitor by June 1, and the exhibitor must take an active role in the care of the birds while at home and at the fair.
10. Age Classifications: All fowl for exhibition must be hatched on or after Jan. 1st of exhibit year.
11. **FUR & FEATHER RULES:** Only blue ribbon birds from divisions with an asterisk * are eligible to sell. To sell your bird, you must fill out a sale form by NOON on SUNDAY. They will be available at the front of the poultry building, by the storeroom. An exhibitor may sell no more than a total of 4 entries from the poultry, rabbit, or goat projects. To sell your bird, you **MUST BE** available by 9:00 a.m. on sale day to move your birds and cages to the sale area and back to the barn after the sale.
12. Roasters and Broilers will have their weight checked at check in.
13. The exhibitor will be allowed to change the sex and/or breed of their bird on fair tags until 5PM the Friday after cage set up in August. The exhibitor may NOT change the species of the bird.

14. All exhibitors must submit a completed *Poultry Project Summary* form for review by the time and date directed by the Superintendent. These will be returned to exhibitors before the animal release time on Monday of fair week.
15. All livestock rules and regulations on page 56 are required.

Tentative show order will follow the fair book; it will be posted on show day. Champion trophies and ribbons will be given to all class champions. Ribbons will be awarded to all reserve class champions. In bird entries as well as non-bird classes awards will be given to best of show and reserve best of show in standard Chicken; Bantam; Turkeys; Ducks; and Geese. Rabbit Hopping Objective:

- The handler and rabbit are considered a TEAM.
- The ideal run that a judge will want to see is when the handler and rabbit work as a team.
- The rabbit will freely run the course without any encouragement from the handler.
- A clean run is on without any corrections or faults in the fastest time.
- Each team will run the course 2 times, both scores of faults, corrections and time will be added together.
- The winner will be determined by which team has the fastest time after faults and corrections have been added.
- There is a 2 minute time limit for each run.
- The handler should be keeping pace alongside the rabbit off the course and not walking over any of the jumps or touching any obstacles.

Rabbit Hopping Regulations:

1. All rabbit competing in this event must be in place at the fairgrounds between 12:00 – 7:00 pm on Tuesday and must follow the project Rules Governing Exhibits.
2. Rabbit does not need to be pedigreed and can be a mixed breed.
3. All rabbits must be at least 5 months of age to compete.
4. All varieties of rabbits are allowed to compete. Types of rabbits that might have a problem with hopping, possibly creating injury and/or injury, are the giant or heavy breeds. Overweight, pregnant or nursing does are not allowed to jump.
5. Rabbits must be healthy and free of any disease or parasites. Any animals found to be in poor health must be removed from the event area immediately.
6. Handlers are responsible for the training of their rabbit. Persons with disabilities may appoint an animal handler for a competition.
7. The rabbit does not wear a harness or lead for Agility. A harness is permitted if it is easier to handle the rabbit. A harness and lead will be needed for training meetings.
8. The rabbit and handler are considered a team. You may not hand your rabbit over to anyone else during competition to compete in other events.

6. Handlers **ever** having previously trained in Beginners Showmanship must advance to the next level.
7. Exhibitors must attend one of two mandatory pre-training meetings to be eligible to show their dog at the fair. Exhibitors unable to attend one of the mandatory pre-training meetings must contact the key leader prior to May 1 to discuss eligibility to participate in the dog classes at the fair.
8. Exhibitors with more than three absences from training sessions will not be permitted to show their dog(s) at the fair unless approved by the Dog Committee. Exhibitors showing multiple dogs must attend a minimum of one training session of each class per month to be allowed to show.
9. Dogs cannot be shown or trained by anyone other than the Dog Project exhibitor from May 1 to September 10.
10. The leaders reserve the right to remove a dog from classes, which in their opinion poses a hazard.
11. Dogs in this department are allowed on the fairgrounds only during judging. They must leave the grounds immediately at the conclusion of judging.

8. All freezing must be in regulation freezing jars or in approved freezer containers. Quart size “Ziploc Freezer” bags may be used. Vacuum seal bags may be used.
9. Fair book listing with a * (star) before them are to stay at the fair on judging day for display during the fair. (Must be done to receive premium money).
10. All Grand, Reserve Champion and Merit ribbons should be marked on the back with name, club, and food item information. They should be left with the canning items on judging day.
11. The fair reserves the right to dispose of food exhibits displayed at the fair.
12. Canned items must be processed in a Hot Water Bath or in a Pressure Canner. No refrigerator items will be judged.
