REGULATIONS – Refer to Health Regulations in front of book RULES GOVERNING EXHIBITS – READ THEM CAREFULLY

- An exhibitor may exhibit six beef animals with no more than three (3) of those animals being steers. (3 steers in live show or two in live and 1 in carcass). Only two animals (both can be steers) may be sold at the Meat Animal Sale, this includes Grand & Reserve Carcass steers.
- 2. Each exhibitor must be YQCA certified and meet mandatory meeting requirements in order to exhibit at the Walworth County Fair.
- 3. Only those steers mouthed as junior yearling or younger, properly identified and weighed according to regulations will be allowed to exhibit and sell. Dairy steers and dairy cross steers (at least 50% dairy breeding) must weigh a minimum of 1050# to sell. All other steers must weigh a minimum of 950# to sell. All decisions made at the scale and mouthing chute and decisions of the veterinarians, grader, and mouther in charge are final.
- 4. Mouthing and weighing will be from 5:30 7:00 pm on Tuesday evening. All feeder calves will be weighed immediately after the steer weigh-in, in order to break classes by weight.
- 5. A district herd will be composed of five animals which are the project animals of three or more exhibitors.
- 6. In Crossbred classes, only beef crosses will be allowed to be exhibited. EXAMPLE: A. A steer sired by a Hereford bull and born to an Angus cow should be shown in this class. Only "purebred" animals will be allowed to enter in breed classes, "purebred" will be defined by each breed organization.
- 7. Steers will be grouped by weight to give equal size classes and classes will be posted.
- 8. No exhibitor in the Junior Department will be allowed to compete in a Showmanship Contest which he/she has won the previous year. Winners of their age division must advance to the next age division the following year. They may not regain eligibility within the age group where the award took place, except in the Senior Division, where the winner will not be required to sit out. SHOWMANSHIP MUST BE PRE-ENTERED IN THE DIVISION THE YOUTH IS TO SHOW IN ACCORDING TO THE RULE ABOVE. EXHIBITOR MUST USE OWN ANIMAL IN SHOWMANSHIP.
- 9. The Walworth County Fair Board reserves the right to randomly drug test all steers including the Champion and Reserve Champion steers for drug violations. Random DNA samples will be pulled from steers at weigh-in. The Champion and Reserve Champion steers will have mandatory DNA tests.
- 10. All steers must be tagged with a Walworth Co. Meat Animal Sale tag or WI State Fair tag and DNA samples must be submitted for each to be eligible to show at the Walworth Co. Fair.
- 11. No bulls will be weighed or tagged. Leaders and advisors will notify exhibitors of weigh-in date. All animals will be identified by some means determined suitable by the committee. Bull leads or wires through noses will not be permitted at the spring weigh-in.
- 12. Exhibitors must state breed of animals at this weigh in. In "Any Other Breed" divisions specify Breed.
- 13. No breaking halters permitted in show ring.
- 14. The beef calendar year will run from Spring Weigh-In to the Walworth County Fair.
- 15. All steers must be haltered and double tied with neck collars.
- 16. All steers must be dehorned by spring weigh-in. Regrowth must not be more than 3" at veterinarian's discretion.
- 17. All steers must be halter broke to lead at spring weigh-in no breaking halters allowed.
- 18. Fitting Cattle may be toweled when entering the show ring. Cattle showing evidence of having their natural color altered on the body proper will be prohibited from showing. No foreign matter or use of additional hair will be allowed on any beef entry. No artificial filling of animals will be allowed. Fittings should be done in designated Jr. Area.
- 19. Animals not under control by exhibitor may be dismissed at the discretion of the ring personnel. Judge may still award premium.

- 20. Fans will not be permitted in the aisles of the breed exhibit.
- 21. All steers must be stalled in the Jr. Beef Barn.
- Clipping and grooming on exhibits while on the fairgrounds is to be done by the Junior Exhibitor, his/her immediate family, Walworth County 4-H and FFA leaders or advisors and/or other Wisconsin Junior Beef Members.
- All exhibitors must fulfill two requirements: 1. Attend 1 educational meeting or participate in another junior beef event. (Exhibitors must contact the superintendent within one week of attending the event to ensure it meets the qualifications of the beef project).
 Help with the Junior Beef Annual Steak Cookout in mid-July.
- 24. There will be an exhibitors' meeting at 5 pm on Tuesday evening immediately preceding weigh-in and mouthing.
- 25. All rules and regulations on page 55 and 56 are required.

AGE CLASSIFICATIONS:

- 1. A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of exhibit year. The calf must be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.
- 2. A senior calf is one born during the period September 1 to December 31 of year preceding exhibit year. It must have all eight temporary incisor teeth firmly in place.
- 3. A summer yearling is one born during the period May 1 to August 31 of year preceding exhibit year. It must have all eight temporary incisor teeth in place.
- 4. A junior yearling is one born during period January 1 to April 30 of year preceding exhibit year. It may have the two center temporary incisor teeth replaced by permanent incisors. These permanents must not be in wear. The remaining six temporary incisor teeth must be in place.
- 5. A senior yearling is one born after September 1 of the second year preceding exhibit year.

Division M– Performance and Carcass Evaluation

1. Carcass Evaluation (all ages)

JUDGING: Sunday before the start of the Fair, 2pm, Activity Center RULES:

- 1. The contest is open to any junior exhibitor carrying the beef project
- 2. All carcass entries MUST BE pre-entered Division M Class 1.
- 3. Straight beef, beef crosses, dairy beef, and straight dairy steers will be permitted to enter in the show.
- 4. Exhibitors must choose their carcass steer from eight steers identified at the spring weigh-in.
- 5. Each entry will be charged a \$5.00 entry fee which must be paid at spring weigh-in. The fee will not be refunded and no late entries will be accepted. This will be used as part of the premium money for the show. In addition, the Walworth County Fair will contribute \$550.00
- 6. Animals will be weighed in Spring at the Fairgrounds in Elkhorn by Districts to establish a standard feeding time and an average daily gain for each entry. All animals must weigh at least 950# on show day. Only one animal will be eligible to be weighed and shown on show day.
- 7. Animals will be weighed at 1 pm.
- a. All animals must be shown live and led by a youth exhibitor to be awarded a carcass placing.
 8. Following the live evaluation, cattle will be trucked to a locker plant. Carcasses will be evaluated by
- Thursday evening. Exhibitors are expected to attend the awards meeting. First and Second year beef project members should attend the carcass evaluation meeting to better understand the beef project.
- 9. Special recognition will be given for live carcass and overall placings. Placings will be determined by:

- 10. The Champion and Reserve carcass must grade Choice and will be sold on live weight per pound basis at the Meat Animal Sale.
- 11. All entry fees plus \$50.00 will be paid to the top one half of the live placings.
- 12. The carcass placing prize money will be based on the number of entries in the show.

- 13. Animals exhibited in this class are not to be fitted for the live show. Animals may only be clipped, washed, and dried. All animals violating the above will be disqualified from the entire contest.
