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Re: June 2002 Financial Statements

Find attached the June 2002 Financial Statements.

Please note that the **DEDICATED FUNDS** - Hotel Tax (line 4) is approximately \$76,000 lower than budgeted. This revenue source has been affected by the events of September 11, 2001, and the slower economy. We will track this revenue very closely and see if adjustments in the 2002-03 budget will be required.

ATM Fees (line 24) will be affected beginning August of 2002 in that the remaining ATM machine experienced some printer difficulties during the 2002 Washington County Fair. We will have the ATM machine assessed and determine its future usefulness.

TOTAL FAIR INCOME (line 47) will be lower than budgeted. Some of the decrease was due to lower-than-expected 2001 fairtime revenue plus treating 2002 Concessions/Booth fees received prior to June 30, 2002, as deferred income.

**TOTAL PERSONNEL** (Line 52) will be less than budgeted. This category was curtailed upon noting the decrease in Hotel/Motel Tax receipts.

**TOTAL INTERIM OPERATIONS** (line 91) will be less than budgeted. This category was also curtailed upon noting the decrease Hotel/Motel Tax receipts.

TOTAL FAIR (line 143) will be less than budgeted due to lower than budgeted Main Stage expenses.

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Board Communications Page 2

TOTAL CAPITAL OUTLAY (line 151) will be less than budgeted even though additional Development expenses of \$10,000 were approved associated with the proposed Washington County Event Center. This category was also curtailed upon noting the decrease in Hotel/Motel Tax receipts.

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**ENDING CASH** projected at approximately \$397,000 will be higher than budgeted of \$301,487.

President Christy called the meeting to order at 4:30 p.m., welcomed everyone and called for additions to the Agenda. No additions were requested.

**Board Minutes** - President Christy commented on the staff time committed to preparing Board minutes and noted that at a later date, she wanted to discuss this matter further.

## 1. Consent Agenda

President Christy asked if any items were requested to be removed from the Consent Agenda. Board Member Spiesschaert and Vial requests Profit/Loss Overview – Item A1 and ATM Statement - Item 5A, respectively, be removed from the Consent Agenda.

Motion by Board Member Vial to approve Consent Agenda with Items A1 and 5A removed. Second by Board Member Spiesschaert. Motion carried 3-0.

**Profit/ Loss Statement** - Board Member Spiesschaert inquired as to the budget projections through the end of the fiscal year. Executive Director Hillman noted that he had to make a year-end projection for the County and indicated that the Fair Complex

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was on track to meet interim revenue projections except for the Hotel/Motel tax, which could be \$90,000 less than estimated in the budget. Executive Director Hillman also noted that expenses had been curtailed based on the estimated reduction in the Hotel/Motel tax.

## Motion by Board Member Spiesschaert to approve Profit/Loss Statement. Second by Board Member Vial. Motion carried 3-0.

ATM Statement – Executive Director Hillman noted that the ATM statements are received about six weeks after the reporting period. Board Member Vial inquired as to our arrangement with the ATM service provider. Executive Director Hillman noted that we are on a month-to-month arrangement with Samsar. Board Member Vial indicated that we should consider changing service providers and suggested that we should expect to receive statements two weeks after the reporting period ends.

# Motion by Board Member Vial to approve ATM Statement. Second by Board Member Spiesschaert. Motion carried 3-0.

## 2. Special Reports

A. Rodeo Report - Rodeo Committee Chair Cody Feinauer announced that things are going well; that the painting of the arena will occur soon; and that there are still a few odds and ends to wrap up.

Board Member Vial inquired as to the specialty acts for the Rodeo. Chair Feinauer noted that Keith Isley, who was Clown of the Year two years ago, will serve as the clown and barrel man for the rodeo and that the miniature Brahma bulls are returning along with the Draft Horses.

President Christy inquired about the special kids rodeo. Chair Feinauer says there is still a lot of interest and they are continuing to sign up participants.

- B. 4-H Report President Christy noted that John Baggott, 4-H Extension Service, was not present and indicated that there would be no 4-H report.
- C. Boosters Report President Christy also noted that Bill Duerden, Booster President was not present and indicated that there would be no Booster report.
- **D.** Maintenance Report Fair Operation Manager Brander noted that the Maintenance Report was in the Board packet and noted that PGE was scheduled to replace a number of power poles prior to the County Fair & Rodeo. Fair Operations Manager Brander also noted that the preparation for the County Fair & Rodeo was going well.

Board Member Vial inquired as to who was providing security for the County Fair & Rodeo. Executive Director Hillman indicated that security services would be provided

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by Coast to Coast, the same company that provided services for the 2001 County Fair & Rodeo. Board Member Vial further inquires as to the individual in charge of security and whom that person would report to during fairtime. Executive Director Hillman indicates that the individual overseeing security and law enforcement issues is Art Berry and that Mr. Berry would be reporting to Fair Operations Manager Brander.

## 3. Old Business

- A. Insurance Report Executive Director Hillman refers the Board to the information in the Board packet noting that an analysis was completed from quotes received from different insurance companies and that the County Risk Office was contacted regarding the analysis. The County recommended that we continue with our current insurance provider based on the analysis. Executive Director Hillman stated that comprehensive and collision coverage was dropped on the vehicles based upon a saving of a couple thousand dollars as well as three vehicles were dropped from insurance coverage since they are no longer being used.
- B. Old County Jail Update Executive Director Hillman refers to the Board packet and notes that the current focus is to raise funds to restore and relocate the Old County Jail to the Washington County Historical Society. President Christy asks if the Old County Jail will be removed prior to the County Fair & Rodeo. Executive Director Hillman indicates that the earliest it would be moved is this September and it is contingent upon funding.

## 4. New Business

A. Redevelopment Plan - President Christy comments as to the recent Board of Commissioners meeting regarding the proposed redevelopment and asked if there are comments from Board Members about the meeting. Board Member Vial indicates that he came away from the meeting feeling there is a higher need to assure that there will be preservation of some current exhibitor's areas and facilities.

Board Member Vial stated that he had worked with Executive Director Hillman to draft a letter on behalf of the Board to further clarify the Board's position on the proposed redevelopment and states that there are four key elements described in this letter. First, that the Board recommend that the construction of the new show ring, auction ring and equestrian stables be eliminated and these monies be used to remodel existing facilities; second, that the Board recommend that the annual County Fair & Rodeo will not be charged any direct charges or fees; third, that the Board recommend that the Grant Street and 34<sup>th</sup> Avenue issues be analyzed to create a more campus like environment; and fourth, that the Board recommend that at least two members be appointed to the design and siting committee who are longtime exhibitors at the County Fair.

Board Member Vial moves that we adopt a resolution recommending the four points and send the resolution with a cover letter to the County Commissioners. Second by Board Member Spiesschaert. Motion carried 3-0.

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President Christy indicates a need for further discussions in order to fine-tune the Board's recommendations and indicated that all buildings should be analyzed prior to any construction.

Board Member Vial clarifies that this meeting is not to decide which buildings to tear down.

Board Member Spiesschaert indicates that he is not sure that the new facility will solve the problems expressed by existing County Fair exhibitors.

President Christy indicates that the design and siting committee will work through the issues expressed by the current County Fair exhibitors.

Board Member Spiesschaert states that the current exhibitors do not trust what the design and siting committee will do. Hence, the voters will have to decide on the proposed Events Center without seeing the final design. Board Member Spiesschaert further states that he understands how the Board cannot get into all the details, but what about assuring people that we will incorporate some of our existing facilities.

Board Member Vial mentions that there should be an inclusion of maximizing usage of the current Fair Complex buildings, as appropriate. Board Member Spiesschaert concurs and believes it puts things on a more positive note. President Christy also concurs.

Board Member Spiesschaert requests that the two representatives from the exhibitor group speak to the issue being discussed.

Joe Evers and Jim Clute indicate they are pleased with the Board's discusses and their interest to develop recommendations regarding the exhibitors' concerns.

Board Member Spiesschaert says that it is important to listen to people in order to be proactive.

President Christy recommends that the Board continue with the agenda items and return to discuss the letter and recommendations later in the meeting after Mr. Evers and Mr. Clute consider the proposed letter and resolution.

Joe Evers asks how exhibitors can express their opinions regarding the proposed Events Center at the upcoming County Fair & Rodeo.

President Christy asks staff about what kind of campaigning can occur at the County Fair & Rodeo. Executive Director Hillman indicates that he will research this issue and further notes that the Fair Complex can provide information on the proposed redevelopment, but that their efforts must be directed to educate, not advocate.

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B. Fair Updates – Executive Director Hillman directs Board Members to the Board packet and gives credit to staff and specifically Fair Coordinator Perkins for the work on the daily schedule. Executive Director Hillman further notes that the dink is scheduled to be published in *The Oregonian* on July 18<sup>th</sup> and will cover all subscribers in Washington County: that a dink will also be published in the *Community New Times*; and that W.C. Hogg has been sand blasted, repainted and will be placed on a six-foot pedestal located at the Main Gate.

Executive Director Hillman notes that there will be free carnival rides on the Friday. July 26th. from 10-12 noon; that public parking will be focused in the 34<sup>th</sup> Avenue parking lots leaving those lots off 28<sup>th</sup> Avenue for exhibitors, concessionaires and employees; and that one ATM is no longer working, but that credit card machines will be available at the Main Gate and Cloverleaf Gate as a convenience to fairgoers.

Executive Director Hillman further notes that Marketing Manager DuPre' has coordinated a Hillsboro Chamber Business After Hours gathering in the Corporate Picnic Tent from 4:30-6:30 on Thursday, July 25<sup>th</sup>; that our website has been very busy; and that there will be a 800-plus person picnic in the Corporate Picnic Tent on Saturday, July 27<sup>th</sup>.

Board member Spiesschaert asks about the Hillsboro Chamber Agricultural and Forestry tour departing from the Fair Complex on Saturday, July 20<sup>th</sup> and the involvement of the Fair Board. Executive Director Hillman indicates that members of the Fair Board are invited between 11:00 am and noon to greet those participating in the tour and that Rodeo Queen Marla Meadows will also be present.

Executive Director Hillman notes that the cattle drive route has been confirmed.

President Christy inquires about the talent show. Executive Director Hillman notes that this is a pre-fair event and hopes that winners could be recognized during the County Fair & Rodeo.

- C. Other Executive Director Hillman indicates that the August/September Board Meeting dates have yet to be determined. President Christy inquires about Board Member Day's availability for the next meeting. Board member Spiesschaert indicates his preference to stay with the regular meeting dates.
- 5. Announcements President Christy inquires as to the Contracts Calendar. Executive Director Hillman indicates that there are two to three contracts yet to be completed and that the Contracts Calendar should be mailed out soon.
- 6. Correspondence President Christy asks if there is any comments or questions under the correspondence section. There was none mentioned.
- 7. **Board Communications** President Christy notes that Board Member Vial and herself had met with Don McCoun, KUIP, regarding an appearance on his radio program

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to talk about the proposed Events Center and comments that the meeting went well. President Christy indicates that they trying to help the East County residents understand the effects of the proposed Events Center and how if these people do not want to come to the County Fair & Rodeo, they could still come to a sporting event or graduation at the new Events Center.

Board Member Vial comments as to how many East County residents are unfamiliar with the Fair Complex and the County Fair & Rodeo.

- 8. Sponsorships and Newspaper Articles Executive Director Hillman directs Board Members to the Board packet regarding sponsorships and notes that this is the complete list for the 2002 Washington County Fair & Rodeo; that Rodeo sponsors were wrapped up last week; that the Dodge Rodeo Posters have arrived; and that Marla Meadows our Rodeo Queen, will become Miss Oregon Rodeo Queen effective January 1st.
- 9. Other President Christy asks if there is anything under Other Matters. There is no response and hence requests the Board Members return to New Business.

President Christy announced the return to the proposed letter and recommendations discussion earlier and asks for further comments.

Joe Evers indicates their concurrence with the proposed letter and recommendations.

Board Member Spiesschaert requests that all Board Member names be included on the letter and resolution, and that all Board Members sign both documents.

President Christy requests that the motion be returned for consideration.

Board Member Vial moves that the previous motion be reconsidered and that the Board adopts a resolution noting the Board's recommendations on the four points previously discussed and sends the resolution with a cover letter to the County Commissioners. Second by Board Member Spiesschaert. Motion carried 3-0.

President Christy requests that staff print the letter and resolution (attached) and have it ready for the Board Members present to sign before they leave the Fair Complex.

With no further business before the Board, President Christy adjourned the meeting at  $6:00~\mathrm{pm}$ .

WHEREAS, the Washington County Fair Board has previously recommended to the County Board of Commissioners the adoption of the Task Force Report concerning the proposed Washington County Event Center;

WHEREAS, the County Board of Commissioners has held several public hearings regarding the recommendation of the Task Force and the possible referral to the voters of a bond measure necessary to carry out those recommendations;

WHEREAS, the public hearings held to date have indicated the need to provide clear direction on the use of all current Washington County Fair Complex facilities;

WHEREAS, the Washington County Fair Board desires to provide the Board of County Commissioners with all information necessary to make appropriate decisions at this time:

NOW, THEREFORE, the Washington County Fair Board adopts the following resolutions as they relate to the proposed Washington County Event Center;

- 1. The recommendations of the Task Force should be modified to eliminate the construction of a new show ring, auction ring and equestrian stables, and allocate the estimated savings of \$1 million to use in appropriate remodeling or upgrading of existing facilities at the Fair Complex. Buildings which should be carefully analyzed for their possible use both in connection with the newly developed event center facilities and for general public purposes include, but may not be limited to, the Cloverleaf Building, Floral Building, Amphitheatre, Beef Barn, Small Animal Barn, Dairy Barn, Auction Ring, Show Ring, Dairy Women's Booth, Friendship Square Building, 4-H Barn, and Milking Parlor.
- 2. The use of the newly developed facilities, as well as exiting facilities, must be available for production of the annual County Fair & Rodeo without direct rental fees. Direct charges such as utilities, labor, etc. should be appropriately charged.
- 3. The Grant Street extension and 34<sup>th</sup> Avenue development issues should be carefully analyzed to create connectivity for a campus-like environment including the Event Center facilities and any current Fair Complex buildings which may be used for the public in the future.

## RESOLUTION NO. 1306-P CRA 2-02: OLD COUNTY JAIL

A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE RELOCATION OF THE OLD COUNTY JAIL FROM THE WASHINGTON COUNTY FAIR COMPLEX TO THE WASHINGTON COUNTY MUSEUM AT PORTLAND COMMUNITY COLLEGE – ROCK CREEK CAMPUS.

WHEREAS, the owner of a certain tract of land, described below, has filed a written application with the City of Hillsboro for approval to relocate the Old County Jail from the Washington County Fair Complex to the Washington County Museum at Portland Community College – Rock Creek Campus, and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission held a public hearing on this application on and June 12, 2002, June 26, 2002, and July 10, 2002 and received testimony in support of this matter as well as testimony with concerns regarding the proposal, and

WHEREAS, based on the materials and testimony submitted by the applicant and other parties, the Planning Commission hereby approves the request to relocate the Old County Jail, with the conditions listed herein, based on the findings attached hereto as Attachment A.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Hillsboro Planning Commission, that the Commission, by and through this resolution, does hereby approve the cultural resource alteration for the Old County Jail as contained in Planning Department Casefile No. CRA 2-02, on the following described property:

Tax Lot 800 on Washington County Tax Map 1N2-33 Section 33, Township 1 North, Range 2 West, Willamette Meridian.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Planning Commission's approval of this relocation is conditioned upon the satisfaction of the following conditions:

- 1. Upon installation of the Old County Jail at the Washington County Museum, the Washington County Historical Society shall make application to Washington County for placement of the structure on the County Cultural Resources Inventory and the National Register of Historic Places.
- 2. If the anticipated preservation, restoration, and reassembly of the Old County Jail at the PCC Rock Creek Museum cannot be accomplished in the specified time frame, the applicant shall return to the Planning Commission with a revised alteration proposal.
- Restoration and reconstruction of the Old County Jail shall comply with the Secretary of the Interior's Treatments of Historic Properties, Restoration Standards.

- 4. Prior to disassembly of the structure, the applicant shall provide documentation that the full cost of the structural restoration has been funded by Washington County or by other sources.
- 5. Immediately upon completion of the restoration process, the Old County Jail shall be reassembled in a covered, waterproof, climate-controlled space at the Washington County Museum.
- 6. Following disassembly of the structure, the applicant shall provide monthly documentation to the Planning Commission of the progress of the reconstruction.
- 7. The applicant shall prepare a conservation plan detailing the disassembly, preservation, restoration, and reassembly techniques and procedures proposed for the Old County Jail. The conservation plan shall be submitted for review and comment by SHPO and Washington County shall ensure that the applicant subsequently complies with the plan's provisions and SHPO'S comments.
- 8. Prior to disassembly, the Planning Director shall receive a copy of the conservation plan with SHPO's comments.

### 1. INTRODUCTION

This application is a request to relocate the Old County Jail, a designated Cultural Resource on the City's acknowledged Cultural Resources Inventory ("Inventory"), from the Washington County Fair Complex to the Washington County Museum at the Portland Community College Rock Creek Campus. The Resource is currently located south of NE Cornell Road, north of the Westside Light Rail Line, and west of NE 34<sup>th</sup> Avenue. The site is located on Tax Lot 800 on Washington County Tax Map 1N2-33 and is addressed as 873 NE 34<sup>th</sup> Avenue. The property is designated SCPA Station Community Planning Area on the City's Comprehensive Plan land use map and is zoned SCFI Station Community Fair Complex Institutional.

The "Inventory" is part of the City's acknowledged Comprehensive Plan implementing Statewide Planning Goal 5. The City of Hillsboro Zoning Ordinance ("HZO"), Section 132 "Cultural Resource Management Ordinance", governs applications for alteration to designated sites on the Inventory.

### 2. PROCEDURAL STATUS

The applicant in this matter is Washington County Fair Board. Washington County Fair Complex owns the parcel on which the Old County Jail is located.

The Staff issued staff reports on June 6, 2002 for the June 12, 2002 Planning Commission public hearing, on June 21 and 25, 2002 for the June 26, 2002 Planning Commission public hearing, and on July 3, 2002 for the July 10, 2002 Planning Commission public hearing. The staff reports are incorporated herein by reference. If there are any conflicts between these findings and the staff reports, these findings shall control.

The Planning Commission opened the public hearing on June 12, 2002. The Planning Department staff read into the Record the statements required by ORS 197.763(5). No party objected to the procedural status or the jurisdiction of the Planning Commission to hear the application. Those speaking in favor of the application were Don Hillman, Executive Director of the Washington County Fair Complex, Mark Granlund, Executive Director of the Washington County Historical Society and Museum, Larry Eisenburg, Washington County Facilities Manager, Melissa Darby, a historic preservation consultant, and David Rodgers, a historical conservationist. The Planning Commission requested that the applicant obtain letters from the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and Washington County regarding the request and

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continued the hearing until June 26, 2002.

The Planning Commission resumed the public hearing on June 26, 2002. The letters requested by the Planning Commission and a letter from the Hillsboro Historical Society were included with the June 25, 2002 staff report. Don Hillman and Mark Granlund spoke in favor of the request. The Commission continued the hearing until July 10, 2002 and directed staff to prepare findings of fact and additional conditions of approval.

The hearing was resumed on July 10, 2002. Findings drafted from the June 12 and 26, 2002 hearings were prepared by staff and included in the July 3<sup>rd</sup> staff report. A letter from Commissioner Fitzgerald was submitted to staff prior to the meeting and was also included with the July 3<sup>rd</sup> report. Don Hillman and Mark Granlund spoke in favor of the request. Mr. Granlund notified the Commission that a representative from SHPO was in the audience if there were any questions. The Commission tentatively approved the request and directed staff to revise three conditions of approval, prepare findings of fact and a draft resolution and subsequently return to the July 24, 2002 Planning Commission meeting for final approval.

# 3. SUPPLEMENTAL FINDINGS FOR THE APPLICABLE APPROVAL CRITERIA

In addition to the findings contained in the staff reports, incorporated herein by reference, the Planning Commission herein adopts the following findings of fact justifying the approval of the application to relocate the Old County Jail.

## A. <u>HZO Section 132(5)(c)(1)</u>.

This criterion provides that the Planning Commission shall evaluate the application with reference to the "economic or structural necessity of the proposed action."

The Planning Commission finds that there is substantial evidence justifying a structural necessity to modify the inventory by allowing the relocation of the Old County Jail. Because of its significant age and its present outdoor location, the Old County Jail has been exposed to the elements, become infested by insects, and has developed significant structural problems. Examination of the structure by a conservationist has determined that the building is no longer safe and presents a hazard in the event of any unexpected stress. David Rodgers testified that the building could stand for a while but is currently a safety liability. The building has rotten logs and the roof is structurally dangerous. The Commission finds that the Old County Jail will continue to deteriorate unless an action is taken to restore and preserve the building.

# B. <u>HZO Section 132(5)(c)(2)</u>.

This criterion requires that the Planning Commission evaluate the application with reference to "the extent of visible modification to the resource".

The Planning Commission finds that modifications have already been made to the resource including the relocation of the building from its original site and visible changes in its original appearance and construction. The Old County Jail was constructed in 1853 near the intersection of SE 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue and SE Washington Street in Downtown Hillsboro. In 1870, the building ended its service as the County jail and was sold to a private landowner and was converted to into a dwelling. The logs were clad with shiplap siding, the barred door was replaced, and the bars on the windows removed.

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In 1953 the Old County Jail building was relocated to the Washington County Fair Complex to prevent its demolition. At that time the shiplap siding was removed and the building was placed on a concrete pad rather than the original brick foundation. The door was rebuilt using planks that were removed from the interior and bars made of water pipe were placed in the door light and in the window. The roof was rebuilt and covered with cedar shakes.

When the building was relocated to the Fair Complex, two rotted logs on the southern side of the building were replaced with stacked planks. The original window which was originally one and one half log courses above the ground and three log courses wide was shortened by one course and located three and one half log courses above the ground. This indicates that some of the logs were not arranged in their original positions.

# C. <u>HZO Section 132(5)(c)(3)</u>.

This criterion requires that the Planning Commission evaluate the application with reference to "the relationship of the proposed action to the resources original character".

The Planning Commission finds that the Old County Jail will be relocated and subsequently restored in exacting detail with appropriate historical methods and materials. Don Hillman and Mark Granlund testified that a professional historical conservator would be retained to complete the disassembly, preservation, restoration, and reassembly of the resource. The historical conservator proposed for the project, David Rodgers, provided testimony regarding the restoration process.

The Commission also finds that the applicant will be submitting a conservation plan to the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) detailing the disassembly, preservation, restoration, and reassembly techniques proposed for the Old County Jail. SHPO will provide comments on the proposed plan and Washington County will ensure compliance with the plan's provisions and with SHPO's comments.

### D. HZO Section 132(5)(c)(4).

This criterion requires that the Planning Commission evaluate the application with reference to "the possibility of any alternative action which would reduce negative impacts on the cultural resource."

The Planning Commission finds that the proposed action to disassemble, preserve, restore, and reassemble the Old County Jail at the Washington County Museum is the best action which would reduce negative impacts on the resource. The applicant considered two alternative actions; however, neither would ensure the continued preservation of the resource.

One alternative was to leave the building in its current location. The deterioration process would continue through exposure to the elements and insect infestation. A storm or seismic event could eventually topple the building. Another alternative considered was to restore the building on site. Although the structural stability could be renewed and the insect infestation eliminated, the building would again weather and deteriorate over time. Given the advanced age of the timbers, the building would be at risk again at some time in the future. The best way to reduce the negative impacts on this resource is to place the Old County Jail in a climate controlled environment for its long-term protection.

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### E. <u>HZO Section 132(5)(c)(5)</u>.

This criterion requires that the Planning Commission evaluate the application with reference to "in the case of moving or demolition, the scheduling of redevelopment of the resource site."

The Planning Commission finds that the applicant will not disassemble the Old County Jail until 100 percent of the funds are secured for the disassembly, preservation, restoration, and reassembly of the structure at the Washington County Museum. Mark Granlund testified that a contract with the historical conservator would not be signed until the funding required for the project was obtained. The Planning Commission also finds that immediately upon completion of the restoration process, the Old County Jail will be reassembled in a covered, waterproof, climate-controlled space at the Washington County Museum. Mark Granlund has testified that there would be adequate indoor climate-controlled space at the Museum to store the reconstructed structure prior to the expansion and remodeling of the Museum. The applicant provided a schedule for the relocation of the Old County Jail in their application submittal.

### F. Other Issues.

### National Register of Historic Places.

The Old County Jail is currently listed on the National Register of Historic Places. At the June 12, 2002 hearing, the Planning Commission requested that the applicant obtain a letter from SHPO regarding the National Register status of the Old County Jail if it were moved inside the Washington County Museum. A letter from SHPO was presented to the Commission at the June 26<sup>th</sup> hearing and it stated that buildings located inside buildings are not typically eligible to be placed on the National Register. SHPO also stated that they would be willing to coordinate with the Washington County Historical Society and the National Register office in Washington, DC to determine if the Jail would be eligible for designation inside the museum.

Commissioner Fitzgerald asked if prior to disassembly of the Old County Jail, the applicant could submit the proposed relocation and restoration plan for State and federal review in order to determine whether the Jail could remain on the National Register. Mark Granlund testified that the submittal and review process is too lengthy just to get a determination, and that fundraising would be delayed because of the unsure outcome. The Commission notes that a condition of approval included in the resolution requires that the applicant reapply for National Register status once the Jail is moved into the museum.

### Washington County Cultural Resources Inventory.

The Planning Commission at the June 12, 2002 hearing requested that the applicant obtain a letter from Washington County supporting the placement of the Old County Jail on the County Cultural Resources Inventory if it were relocated to the Washington County Museum at Portland Community College — Rock Creek Campus. The Museum is located outside the Hillsboro City Limits and the City's Cultural Resource Management Ordinance would no longer apply. A letter from Washington County was presented to Commission and it stated that the Board of County Commissioners expressed support for placing the Jail on the County's Cultural Resource Inventory if it were relocated to the Washington County Museum. The Commission notes that a condition of approval included in the resolution requires that the applicant make application to Washington County for placement of the Old County Jail on the County Cultural

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Resources Inventory once it is installed at the Museum.


### Funding for Project.

Commissioner Mathews inquired whether the entirety of the funding had been obtained for the relocation and restoration of the Old County Jail. Don Hillman testified that not all of the funding had been obtained at this point, but they anticipated raising money during the Washington County Fair. Mark Granlund also testified that a contract with the conservator would not be executed until the project was fully funded. The Commission notes that a condition of approval included in the resolution requires the applicant provide documentation that the full cost of the relocation and restoration has been funded by Washington County or other sources.

### 4. CONCLUSION


For the above reasons, the Planning Commission finds that the application should be approved allowing the Old County Jail to be relocated from the Washington County Fair Complex to the Washington County Museum at Portland Community College — Rock Creek Campus pursuant to the evaluation criteria specified in HZO Section 132 (5)(c). Pursuant to HZO Section 132(5)(h), once the Old County Jail is relocated, the site shall be reevaluated to determine whether it continues to exhibit the characteristics which justified its inclusion in the inventory. The Planning Commission hereby adopts these findings of fact and conclusions of law as its decision in this matter.







# Historical society asking donations to restore county's old log jail



The Washington County Historical Society wants to relocate and restore the oldest log building in Oregon, the Old Washington County Log Jail currently sited at the Washington County Fairgrounds.

Over \$50,000 in funds need to be raised this summer to restore and move the Old Washington County Log Jail to the Rock Creek campus location of the Washington County Museum.

Now approaching its 149th birthday, the building is quickly decaying due to age, weather and insect damage. Unless restored quickly, the building is in danger of decaying to the point where restoration will be impossible.

Currently, the building retains much of its integrity of design, materials and workmanship. The simple, single room, one story rectangular structure is 16 feet long by 9 feet wide and 11 feet eight inches high from the ground to the gable peak.



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The jail has housed some of Oregon's most notorious thieves, murderers and drunkards. There has been considerable debate

among historians whether Ulysses S. Grant was arrested and spent the night in the jail while stationed in Vancouver. Wash.

To relocate and preserve the building, donations from the community are being sought to cover the \$50,000 moving and restoration expense.

# SUMMARY (Attach Supporting Documents if Necessary)

During a July 16. 2002 public hearing, the Board of Commissioners approved a resolution and order placing the Event Center general obligation (GO) bond measure on the November 5, 2002 ballot. During this hearing, the Fair Board submitted to the Board of Commissioners a resolution dated July 9, 2002 containing a set of suggested modifications to the Event Center proposal. The Board of Commissioners accepted these modifications with the stipulation that a separate action specifically addressing them be taken by the Board at the earliest opportunity.

Accordingly, this agenda is intended to serve as a ratification process regarding these modifications. This ratification process essentially acknowledges ands affirms the Fair Board's suggestions and clarifies how the modifications are to be implemented. Each of the four suggested modifications is addressed below:

# 1. Construction of New Rings and Stables to be Foregone, Some Existing Facilities to be Upgraded

The original Task Force-approved Event Center Capital Improvement proposal and accompanying capital budget called for the construction of a new show ring, auction ring and equestrian stables as part of the Event Center.

It is the intent of the Board of Commissioners to amend the Capital Improvement plan as follows: The new show ring, auction ring and equestrian stables will not be constructed. (Continued)

The capital funds that would have been used for those purposes will instead be directed toward the upgrading of existing Fair Complex facilities. Existing facilities to be upgraded through this process will be determined through a cooperative analysis to be conducted by appropriate Fair Complex and Washington County staff at a time determined appropriate by the Board of Commissioners.

The new rings and stables called for in the original capital budget are estimated to cost \$1,050,000. Foregoing this construction would free up that amount for upgrades to existing Fair Complex facilities. However, as is the case with any large capital improvement project, in order to meet budget, functionality or time demands, specific elements of the proposal may need to be adjusted as final design and construction proceed. As such, the actual dollar amount that will be saved by foregoing construction of new rings and stables may shift during the final design process. While the exact dollar amount to be directed toward the upgrade of existing facilities cannot be known at this time, it is the intent of the Board of Commissioners to direct toward these upgrades the amount saved by foregoing construction of the new rings and stables. The dollar amount to be directed to these upgrades will not exceed the amount saved by foregoing construction of the new rings and stables.

Fair Complex facilities to be analyzed for upgrades for their possible use both in connection with the Event Center and for ongoing general public purposes include, but may not be limited to, the Cloverleaf Building. Floral Building, Amphitheater, Beef Barn, Small Animal Barn, Dairy Barn, Auction Ring, Show Ring, Dairy Women's Booth, Friendship Square Building, 4-H Barn and Milking Parlor.

2. No Rental Fees to be Charged to Fair and Rodeo

It is the intent of the Board of Commissioners that the proposed Event Center facilities and the existing Fair Complex facilities will be available for use and production of the annual County Fair and Rodeo without rental fees. Direct charges such as those for repairs, utilities, cleanup and labor will be charged.

3. Grant Street and 34th Avenue Configurations to Maximize Connectivity

While it is the belief of the Board of Commissioners that the original Task Force-approved Event Center proposal sets forth general guidelines for the siting of the Event Center facilities, the Board of Commissioners acknowledge that more specific siting plans will need to be determined in the final design process. The Board of Commissioners also acknowledge that central to the design are the final plans for the alignment of Grant Street and 34th Avenue. It is the intent of the Board of Commissioners that final design and street configuration be made with the goal of achieving connectivity between the Event Center and existing Fair Complex facilities.

4. Event Center Design Advisory Committee to Include Two Fair Exhibitors

Task Force discussions and public testimony have indicated the need for a broad-based, representative advisory committee comprised of community members to consider and make recommendations to the Board of Commissioners on a range of issues related to design of the Event Center. # WASHINGTON COUNY EVENT CENTER GO BOND

### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

Washington County has no major facility in which to hold exhibitions, consumer shows, community gatherings or entertainment events.

Rather than reconstruct the existing fair buildings as a single-use facility, the County Board of Commissioners proposes a County Event Center that accommodates a year-round calendar of exhibitions, consumer shows, community gatherings and entertainment events for residents and businesses. The Event Center and surrounding grounds would continue to serve as the home of the County Fair. Some existing County Fair buildings would be rehabilitated.

# What types of events would the Event Center offer?

The Event Center would host events year-round:

- Exhibitions and consumer shows would include car, home, garden, RV, electronics, hobby, trade and recreation shows
- Community events would include farmers' markets, town halls, graduations and job fairs
- The annual County Fair
- Entertainment events would include concerts and theatrical performances

# What facilities would the Event Center include?

- Main Exposition Hall: It would offer approximately 86,000 square feet of dividable space, kitchen facilities, concessions, restrooms, administrative offices and meeting space. The Main Hall would be designed for consumer shows, trade shows and community events.
- Exposition Annex: Connected to the Main Hall, the Annex would have approximately 50,000 square feet of dividable space. The Exposition Annex and Main Hall would function as one building for large shows, or could be divided into smaller spaces for smaller shows.
- Arena/Amphitheater: It would have grandstand seating for approximately 2,500, with capacity for an additional 3,000 festival seats on the arena floor. The Arena/Amphitheater would be suited to hosting community events, sporting events and performances.
- Commons Area: Approximately 125,000 square feet in size, the Commons Area would be an outdoor community greenspace. It would provide a space for farmers markets, sidewalk sales and picnics. It would include a covered outdoor walkway connecting the buildings.
- Parking: Approximately 3,300 parking spaces for visitors and exhibitors.

# How would the Event Center be financed?

- Washington County would issue \$40 million in general obligation bonds to finance costs of constructing, equipping and furnishing the Event Center.
- General obligation bonds are paid for by property taxes.
- The estimated property tax cost is 9½ cents per \$1,000 of assessed value in the first year.
   This rate is expected to decrease over the life of the bonds.
- The owner of a typical home with an assessed value (not market value) of \$158,000 would pay about \$15 the first year.
- The Event Center is projected to produce enough revenue to pay its operating costs.

John DuVall with Glencoe Community Football, Inc. has informed the Fair Complex the organization has decided not to continue with its Bingo fundraising program after the current contract expires on December 31, 2002.

Mr. DuVall says the decision has nothing to do with the Fair Complex, but is simply related to the organization's desire to look at fundraising projects that are less time consuming. Mr. DuVall and his wife, Marilyn, along with their team of workers, have been the driving force behind Bingo for Glencoe Community Football, Inc. for years, even before it began operating the program from the Fair Complex. They have devoted every Tuesday night to the effort, with the exception of the summer break they take in July and early August due to the Fair. Mr. DuVall says the organization has come to realize there are other fundraising projects and options available that can raise the same amount of money with a much smaller time commitment.

Mr. DuVall says he has informed Vern Petrick, the Athletic Director for the Hillsboro School District, that Glencoe Community Football, Inc., is giving up the Bingo project after December of 2002, and if there are any other interested sports programs that would like to take it over, he and his wife would be happy to fully train the organizers and help them get started.

Glencoe Community Football. Inc., pays the Fair Complex \$300.00 a week for the use of the building and the equipment. The loss will amount to a total of \$7,500 for January through June of the current fiscal year.

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



Dear Ms. Christy,

I would like to bring to your attention an incident that happened last week during the 4H Horse Fair. This was my just turned 11-year-old daughter's first year with 4H, and her first experience with showing her horse. My daughter, Caitie, has been a horse rider and owner for only 1 year.

Normally Caitie's horse, Buddy, is a very sane and calm mount. But at the fair grounds he seems to turn in to a maniac! All week Caitie had a difficult time with him, nothing really unsafe, but frustrating and nerve racking just the same. I tried to help as much as I could, but nothing I did seemed to be of much help. I can't count the number of times I thought, "I want to kill that horse!" Still, Caitie is very proud of her boy and was having an overall good time. Our goal in 4H, and fair, is to have fun, learn, and spend time with the animal Caitie loves. As long as Caitie tries her best and always does the right thing for her horse, I couldn't care less what color of ribbon she gets, if any. And I believe that Caitie feels the same way.

Caitie's last class was Western Walk/Trot, Junior Novice, on Thursday afternoon. We had taken Buddy out for her to ride that morning and he seemed a lot calmer than he had the day before. When the time came to take him out to prepare for the class, he was back in his maniac mode. As time for the class drew near, we made our way over to the waiting area. Try as she might, Caitie could not get Buddy to settle down and stand still. Buddy wouldn't stand even when I tried to hold his reins. It just seemed to aggravate him all the more. At one point Buddy even reared up a little! This certainly was not the horse we have at home! By this time, Caitie was almost at the end of her rope. As I looked at her swimming eyes, she told me that she wasn't sure that she could compete in the class. Now, we try to teach the kids not to give up when the going gets rough, so I told Caitie that I believed that she could do it, and that if I felt that Buddy was really being unsafe I would take her off of him myself. But, I went on to say, if she felt in any way afraid or unsafe, it was okay to scratch the class. It certainly would not be the end of the world.



At about that time, a young lady came walking over; I don't know where she came from. She walked up to Caitie and calming began talking to her - asking her name and her horse's name. This young lady went on to give Caitie advice on ways to calm and settle a horse, etc. She was very encouraging, so I just backed up a little and let her talk. She stayed with Caitie until it was time to enter the arena, and then stayed to watch. As the kids rode their horses around, she would give words of encouragement each time Caitie rode by. I could see that Caitie was trying very hard to take her advice and smile, all the while talking to Buddy. As we stood there, I found out that this young lady was the Fair & Rodeo Queen, Marla.

Well, Buddy did not settle down until it was time for Caitie to do the pattern. They did it perfectly and came back to the line, where Buddy finally decided that he'd just stand there now, thank you very much!

As the kids came out of the arena, Marla praised Caitie, telling her a great job she had done in keeping Buddy under control and safe. She encouraged Caitie to keep working on her riding skills, specifically on her use of the reins. I could see that Caitie was very impressed that Marla had stayed to root her on, as was I. We parted ways as Caitie and I headed back to the barn. The pride and awe I felt at that moment for my young daughter's courage was immense. Later, we found a note from Marla at Buddy's stall. She wrote "Caitie, you did an amazing job. Marla" That just made Caitie's day! To say that Caitie has a serious case of hero worship going on is an understatement.

So, why am I writing this very long letter to you? Because I want you to know what a wonderful ambassador the Washington County Fair & Rodeo has in Marla. I have no idea what made Marla lock on to Caitie when we needed her most, but that fact that she did so without hesitation speaks volumes for that young lady's sense of compassion and duty. I can't tell you how impressed I am with Marla. I can never thank her enough for what she did for Caitie. And I thought you should know that.

HILLSBORO -- From fireworks vendors to festival leaders, pyrotechnic fans of all stripes want today's Fourth of July shows to top previous years, reflecting the renewed nationalism of a country at war.

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In most cases, the sluggish economy has dampened those fiery ambitions. Not so in Hillsboro, where Ron Burback, a seasoned event planner and promoter, has 400 additional shells to prove that tonight's fireworks display will really be more flashy than last year's.

That doesn't mean viewers can settle in and sip a second beer during a longer show.

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lot of boom, boom boom," said Burback, president of Amusement Consulting Services, which took over a troubled Hillsboro Happy Days in 1993. "I want no dark sky,

something blasting off at all times."

Under Burback's leadership and his partnership with Leo Aguilar, the owner of three Mexican-themed businesses, what's now called the Hillsboro Fourth of July Festival continues to grow, enjoying the support of a predominantly Mexican American audience.

Monday night in Aguilar's office at Yesenia's Bakery in Hillsboro, the 40-year-old businessman fielded calls from as far away as Madras and Springfield from people wanting directions to today's headliner show, El Coyote y Su Banda Tierra Santa.

Aguilar has worked for years to bring El Coyote to Oregon. The Mexican singer is a Billboard-recognized star in the banda music world, with hits such as "Te Sone" and "Arboles de la Barranca."

With such coveted acts, Hillsboro's 131-year-old July Fourth festival, called the oldest in the state, is expected to pull in 50,000 people during five days. That's less than the 60,000 that Fort Vancouver will draw for its one-day extravaganza or the 100,000-plus expected for the five-day Waterfront Blues Festival.

But it's more than twice the 21,600 who attended in 1993, when Burback couldn't turn a profit. And he and his team insist it's gaining on the bigger guys.

This year's affair features entertainment on two stages simultaneously, a bigger beer garden, a soccer tournament with 16 teams and two divisions in the Hispanos Unidos league and 800 bleacher seats added for the rodeo, which will feature a famed bull, El Toro Gol.

When asked to recall how many the festival drew in the early 1990s, Burback joked, "Attendance, what attendance?"

"Anglos stopped supporting the event 10 years ago," Burback said, before he decided to add entertainment that reflected the county's growing Latino population.

The year he tried to woo people with a \$10,000 monster truck show -- this year's fireworks will cost \$20,000 by comparison --Burback lost \$7,000 in a matter of hours.

The pivotal point came in 1995, when he teamed with Aguilar and Juan Cortez, calling themselves the Three Amigos, and added a Mexican-style rodeo or jaripeo.

Burback received some angry calls this year after posters publicized the "Festival Cuatro de Julio," a literal translation into Spanish of the name the event has carried for years.

"When people call in, yell and swear and don't leave their names, there's not much you can do," said Burback. He welcomes suggestions on how to improve the event.

"This is what is so difficult for me: Here we have an event that is growing, thriving with a combination of Latino and Anglo support, and we go through this flap every year."

Aguilar said that the promoters are working to bring something for everybody. "We have to bring entertainment that is supported," he said.

Burback doesn't fret about the future of the festival. He points to the parking lot that will be jammed during today's fireworks with mostly Anglo families.

He also looks forward to future customers, the young Latinos who make up to 40 percent of the elementary school population in parts of Washington County.

Meanwhile, Aguilar wonders why people also don't worry that Portland's Cinco de Mayo Festival, intended to celebrate a Mexican victory over the French, is a largely a Anglo affair.

He, for one, couldn't care less.

Campaign costs sink parks levy

HILLSBORO -- The economy is bad, and political campaigns to raise taxes can be pricey.

Washington County's biggest park district looked at those facts and decided not to ask voters in November to pass a levy.

But supporters of three other money measures -- for libraries, extra sheriff's patrols and fairgrounds redevelopment -- reached a different conclusion than leaders of the Tualatin Hills Park & Recreation District.

All three ballot measures are going forward in the Nov. 5 election despite the slack

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economy and lack of big campaign bucks. Backers of those property tax increases are confident they can make a winning case that their money needs are dire and immediate.

The park district had appeared ready to join the list of government agencies in Washington County asking voters for financial help. District staff had recommended a five-year, local-option levy request of \$12 million for operations, maintenance and land acquisition.

That would have worked out to 18 cents for each \$1,000 of a property's

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assessed value, or \$27 on a home assessed at \$150,000.

But the district's general manager, Ron Willoughby, reversed course after seeing numbers from a May poll and a consultant's conclusions.

The survey of district voters showed chances of passing a levy were uncertain and estimated a winning campaign would need \$90,000 to \$150,000 for campaign consultants.

"We didn't have the time to raise that money," Willoughby said Wednesday. "Times have changed where you need to have somebody professional who knows what buttons to push."

Instead, Willoughby said the district hopes to return in November 2004 with a money request. By then, he said the economy may have improved for cost-conscious voters, and district supporters may be better able to raise money for a successful campaign.

A campaign committee for the district's failed \$26.3 million levy in 2000 raised less than \$13,000.

Meanwhile, the park district might cut costs by watering and mowing fields less often and deferring maintenance on buildings, Willoughby said.

District officials also hope to prevail in a court battle over a \$5.4 million pot of money from systems development fees. The fund has not been tapped while builders challenge the fee.

Three on the ballot None of the campaigns for other three measures facing many county voters in November expect to raise anywhere near \$90,000, much less \$150,000. Yet supporters of each say they can win.

The enhanced sheriffs patrol district, which pays for extra officers in the county's urban unincorporated areas, got 72 percent voter approval in May. But the five-year, \$30.8 million levy did not pass because the voter turnout was lower than the required 50 percent.

County commissioners plan to resubmit the measure for November, the general-election ballot every two years when money requests don't face a turnout requirement.

In May, the county spent about \$17,500 in printing, postage and graphic design for the measure. Governments can spend money to educate voters about money measures but cannot advocate for them.

Deputy county administrator David Maertens expects expenses to drop the second time around, though he did note postage costs have increased.

"I don't think we'll reinvent the wheel," Maertens said. "We'll try to use what we have."

A separate citizens committee favoring extension of the levy raised about \$12,000 for the May election. Walt Gorman, who was chairman of that committee, said members must decide what to do for November.

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"It's going to be a pretty obvious message," Gorman said. "Here it is -this is the last vote you get on this one."

The current levy expires in June 2003, and the sheriff's office said patrols would be substantially cut if voters reject its extension.

Eva Calcagano, manager of Washington County Cooperative Library Services, said the cooperative's \$49.9 million, five-year levy request expects to spend about \$17,000 for brochures and a video.

The cooperative also plans to put information in its quarterly newsletter to patrons. Calcagno expects that a pro-library political action committee that worked on the last successful levy in 1996 will help with fliers and a statement in the Voters' Pamphlet.

A voter survey in mid-April found 70 percent of respondents very likely or somewhat likely to support a levy slightly cheaper than the one on the ballot.

"We won't be hiring a consultant or doing a fancy campaign," Calcagno said.

County spokesman Walt Peck expects spending on informational material for the proposed \$40 million fairgrounds redevelopment bond to be in the same ballpark as for libraries and extra sheriff's patrols. Peck said one remaining large question is whether to do a direct mailing that could cost \$25,000 to \$30,000.

Longtime supporters of the fair also expect to raise money to promote the bond.

One fact from the Tualatin Hills survey might interest campaigns for all three money measures.

Pollsters told respondents that a number of government agencies might ask for a tax increase this year. Without details, they then asked them to pick from a list of ones they would most likely support.

Topping the list at 49 percent was law enforcement. Next came local libraries at 17 percent, then parks and recreation at 12 percent. Improvement of the county fairgrounds came in at 4 percent.

But facing all the choices, 18 percent of voters said they were unsure.

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#### Fairgrounds measure to go to voters

7/18/02

After agreeing to consier some recommended changes from the fair board, Washington County commissioners voted unanimously Tuesday to ask voters in November to approve a \$40 million bond issue to redevelop the fairgrounds in northeast Hillsboro.

If approved by voters, the plan is to build two new exhibition halls. If feasible, commisioners said some of the money might be used to spruce up existing buildings.

Longtime supporters of the fair had complained that newer, fancier buildings might mean the end of a conventional fair.

Supporters said redevelopment would allow the site to become useful year-round, not just for the annual fair and rodeo.

If the measure passes, the county would sell general obligation bonds and pay the debt off over a 20-year period through annual property tax levies. The payback amount would be roughly \$15 a year for the owner of a typical home valued at \$158,000.

The sounds of moos and hooves were heard at 9 a.m. Sunday in Hillsboro.



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Joining the drive were local dignitaries; youth who are in the Washington County 4-H Horse Program, and members of the rodeo committee.





Why should you attend the 2002 Bi-Mart Washington County Fair and Rodeo?

Because there's so much entertainment packed into four days, said Don Hillman, executive director of the fair. You've got the demolition derby, the tractor pull, the draft horse driving show. You've got big-name entertainment, like Carrot Top and The Calling. There's something for everyone from 5 to 105 years old.

The fair runs through Sunday at the Washington County Fair Complex, 873 NE 34th Avenue off Cornell Road.



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Hours are 10 a.m. to 11 p.m. each day. Tickets are \$7 for adults, and \$4 for kids and seniors (children under 5 get in free).

Rodeo times are 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday, with a Saturday afternoon show at 1:30 p.m. Tickets are \$5 in addition to the \$7 gate



fee.

This is the first year for the four-day fair, which was Hillman's idea. Hillman, who started with the fair complex in December, recommended it to boost attendance.

In the last 10 to 15 years, attendance has shrunk down, he said. We're trying to repackage it, with more stuff in four days.

A few vendors offered mixed reactions to the shorter format. There have been some radical changes, and I hope they don't affect the vendors, said Beverly Duddy, who has run a Portland Watch Company booth at the fair for the past seven years.

I've seen this fair progressively slide over the last seven years because it hasn't had the proper entertainment, Duddy said. There's new management now, and I hope they do a good job.

Most of the fairs we've been to have been way up, and I think this will be way up, too. he continued. Change is good.

I think if people won't come in four days, they wouldn't have come in six anyway, agreed Chad Wilkins, with Hiney Brothers Iron Works. This is Wilkins' third year at the fair.

The fair features several attractions to draw people in, like a free breakfast this morning and free carnival rides on Friday. From there, attendees will find three stages going with constant entertainment, agricultural and exotic animal exhibits, and all the traditional events that make the fair.

For example, the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) Rodeo will take place on Friday night and Saturday, the demolition derby will take over the arena on Sunday afternoon, and the 4-H and FFA animals will be on display throughout the fair.

Other arena entertainment includes the 4x4 truck pull a 7 p.m. today and the draft horse driving show at 3:30 p.m. Saturday.

New to the fair are the Great American Duck Race, the Squalus Inc. shark tank and Jest in Time Circus of Clowns. Making a return is Nancy Korbet's Amazing World of Birds.

Big-name entertainment at the DeMar Bachelor Amphitheater will include The Calling tonight, comedian Carrot Top on Friday, Johnny Limbo and the Lugnuts on Saturday and Hit Explosion on Sunday.




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

## State 4-H leaders say girls outnumber boys in many clubs

HILLSBORO A drian Amabisca sweeps a spray of bark dust into a steer's stall and nods toward a line of snoozing cattle.

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Some girls say cattle are stinky and gross and would never touch them, she says. Not this 16-year-old or the growing herd of girls in the beef and dairy barns at this week's Washington County Fair & Rodeo.

"Girls around here are tough. You can't be a sissy," Amabisca says. "You have to be tough to hold them and tough when it's slaughter time."

Of course, Amabisca doesn't object to a little snuggle when it comes time to calm her heifer. Cara. She appreciates the Red Angust understanding ear when it comes to heartfelt conversations in her family's Helvetia orchard.

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As is often the case, girls outnumber boys in the Washington County 4-H program -- this year's count is 682 girls and 324 boys. Many of those

girls compete in Horse Fair, craft, cooking and horticulture classes and in smaller animal divisions, such as rabbits, sheep and swine.

But the number of girls competing in classes historically dominated by boys, such as steer and dairy cow competitions. has increased steadily in recent years.

"With 4-H, people tend to think boys and cows," says Jeanne Brandt, a 4-H extension agent for Oregon State University. "But that's not necessarily the case."

Other choices The change is more about a drain of boy 4-H members than a flood of cow-toting girls, 4-H officials say. They speculate it could be because boys choose sports or jobs. It also could be that the organization has a tough time finding men leaders and volunteers.

"And part of it depends on who's on the farm," Brandt says, "whether farmers have daughters or sons."

Heidi Lee, leader of the Sherwood Sheepkeepers, has another idea about what keeps boys away.

"There's a misconception that fair is kind of dorky," Lee says. Her father-in-law, she says, never allowed his older daughters to show livestock because it was "a guy thing."

Lee and her daughter, Kara, both noticed more girls showing larger livestock several years ago.

"The boys just thought they were too good to be out here," says Kara Lee, 16, who has shown sheep for years. "And girls realized they could do it, too."

Emily Duyck, 16, walks her dairy cow. Myra, around the outside wall of the showring in hopes of getting the youngster prepared for today's competition. It will be Duyck's first, as she has stuck with swine.

No halters on pigs "Pigs are a lot harder." says Duyck, as Myra hides her soft nose under her trainer's arm. "With cows, you get to use a halter."

Some 4-H clubs haven't seen much of a change. The Glencoe 4-H Livestock club has always had a steady stream of girls interested in showing cows. This year, four girls and eight boys came to fair.

"Quite often, the girls win," says Esther Conklin, the club's co-leader. "They dress neat and tidy, and pay attention to detail. They just have to be willing to get dirty and get dragged."

Brandt and other 4-H officials often discuss ways to bring in more boys. They've talked about more flexible schedules, new competition areas and expanded high-tech offerings. On Thursday morning's drive to the fair, Brandt came up with an idea for a survival cooking class for middle school boys.

Either way, the boys are fine with the competition.

"They're better at showing, but that's only because judges like girls better," snickers Nate Vial. 13, as he teases Haley Barno, 16, a fellow Tualatin Valley Beef Club member.

Barno, the club's president, won reserve champion in the market steer class Thursday morning. She showed her first steer in the fourth grade, as a 60-something-pounder hauling around a 1,320-pound steer on a rope.


"It has nothing to do with feminism stuff," Barno said. "People show if their parents have cows. It's all pretty much equal.

"And it's fun," she says, leaning back in the shade of the beef barn. "You just go out there and make your animal look good."

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😳 Yes, I've answered the phone and said

"I'll get him" when I am him.

"I'm grabbing snapdragons." says the 16-year-old. sharing strategies with his friend and fellow 4-H floralarranging contestant. Andrew Rice, 17.

"I'm getting those peach ones that look like daisies." says Rice, giving his clippers a practice squeeze. "I like that greenery stuff people throw on the ground. Seriously man, I'll pick that up."

And with a yell from the judge, they're arranging.

Sheely and Rice are members of the Brat Pack a six-member 4-H club out of Aloha that specializes in floral arrangements, art, cooking and horticulture. Most members are boys, although Sheely's 13-year-old sister, Courtney, joined a few years ago.

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
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"Sometimes I think they just do it to hang out at the fair," says Artis Rice, Andrew's mother and the club's leader.

She started the club when her daughter became interested. After watching his older sister show for years, Andrew began competing at 9 and slowly recruited his childhood buddies.

At this year's Washington County Fair & Rodeo, a year of work reaches its crescendo. The boys -- all high school seniors from Aloha and Sherwood -- enter potted vegetables, patio planter boxes, house plants, paintings, drawings, wood projects and cookies.

"I'd do cows if I lived in the country," says Rice, as Sheely interrupts to add that he would show draft horses.

"But we live in the city," Rice says, "so we do this."

These guys are 4-H officials' glowing example of how the 100-year-old organization caters to families from across Washington County. Most people think of 4-H and farming, says John Baggott, the 4-H extension agent for Oregon State University But kids in this year's fair competed with animals easily kept in the city, such as guinea pigs and dogs, as well as a range of projects and presentations that could be done in a tiny apartment.

No matter what classes the Brat Packers enter from year to year, they usually head over to the fair's popular 4-H floral arranging contest.

"James, you're filling out nice," says Rice, while another Brat-Packer, John Koski, works silently on his own pile of roses and purple irises. "But dude, you've got bunny ears."

Bunny ears are when a few flowers flail from a bouquet, the boys explain, it's unbalanced. It's also bad to let the green spongy thing that flowers stick into show. Flowers must be cut at a diagonal and bright colors are good — they get the judge's attention.

With five minutes to go in the contest, the boys are a little stressed.

"This is not working," says Koski, murmuring something not usually heard in flower-arranging circles. But it's understandable, he snipped his iris too short and there are still some holes.

"See that?" Rice mutters, pointing to a raggedy rose leaf. "That's tight."

After this year's four-day fair wrapped up Sunday, the Brat Pack has one more to look forward to as 4-H'ers. That means one more year of hanging out each day from opening day -- when they get in about 7 a.m. because Artis Rice has volunteered them for set-up -- to closing time at 11 p.m.

Buddies since kindergarten, the boys roam the fairgrounds munching ice cream and cheeseburgers.

"We can't walk anywhere without seeing someone we know." says Sheely, who worried early this week he would miss the floral competition because his baseball team made the American Legion state

championships.

"Another bonus is we see a lot of girls." adds Rice with smile. And because of what they compete in. he says, "We have something to talk about. It breaks the ice."

But in the contest, girls are simply competition. Sometimes they get a little cocky, the boys grumble. And they always drain the rose and baby's breath supply.

As the judge works over the seniors' entries, Sheely racks up another blue, that on top of his ribbon for his molasses cookie entry. Koski gets one too, adding to his collection for his photography, watercolor painting and bird house — a wood creation that earned him a champion's prize.

Rice receives red. His arrangement was a little, well, little, the judge explains, and it could have done with a fewer flowers. But it is no big deal, Rice smiles, he is off to find a girl in one of the barns.

Shortened fair's attendance likely to top last year's

HILLSBORO -- A drab white ribbon usually means third-best, a not-sohot attempt at No. 1.

But the ribbon of white spewing from a calculator Monday brought bigger smiles to fair organizers than a grand champion blue.

Early counts show this year's shortened four-day Washington County Fair & Rodeo brought in about 1,100 more people than last summer's six-day event.

That is good news for organizers concerned that the change, intended to save money and boost attendance, had angered veteran fairgoers who would find something else to do.

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About 38,700 people bought

tickets for the fair, where the last pluish bloud of cotton candy was spunlate Sunday night. Preliminary counts den't include advanced sales of exhibitor bracelets or season passes

Last summer's preliminary count - without advanced sales or passes --

was 37,600, with a grand total of about 41.000 paid visitors during six days.

"But I'm sure that when all ticket sales are counted, we'll easily exceed 41,000," said Don Hillman, the fair's new executive director, who pitched the idea for a shorter schedule. "Our biggest success was that we had something for everyone this year, whether they are agriculture-based or from the suburbs."

Turning numbers around In Washington County, while the population increased by 43 percent in the past decade, paid attendance at the fair dropped by 29 percent. Even with this year's attendance increase, fair organizers said they would be wary of adding another day.

"The goal is to stabilize decreasing attendance, and based on this year's numbers, maybe we've done that." Hillman said. "We may look at adding a day or two, but we have to be careful because adding a day does not always impact attendance."

Not only did the fair bring in more visitors, but also more 4-H members, showing everything from squeaky short-haired guinea pigs to striking landscapes in oil.

This year saw 3,430 4-H entries 578 more than last summer, from members in kindergarten through the 12th grade.

The increase was echoed in non-livestock exhibits, where 122 youth showed, 25 more than last year. Although there were dips in participation of some livestock types, overall 491 youth showed animals, an increase of 66 from last year.

"There were a lot of questions going in," said John Baggott, a 4-H extension agent for Oregon State University, on how the fair's shorter run made livestock judging a nearly all-day, every-day process with back-to-back classes. "But on the whole, things worked out really well."

In the evenings, Baggott said he watched more people than in past years mosey through the Cloverleaf Building, where craft and food exhibits are shown. He also heard more families ask how to start clubs or join one.

Said Maryanne Andrews, president of the Washington County 4-H Executive Council, "For the most part, a lot of the kids had a really good time. But there are some details that need to be worked out."

Event complex issue Andrews and others heard some chatter about the fair board's proposed event complex, which could be built by a \$40 million bond that goes before voters this fall. Since the issue was raised, livestock supporters have worried a new concrete-floored facility would hurt animals' feet, be difficult to clean and break up the flow of the fair.

A fair board member, Rich Vial, said he found nothing but support for the idea.

"All I heard was from people who realized the fair was such an important part of their lives, that if we needed to add an events center to make it economically viable, they'd have to support that," said Vial, who was at



the fair until midnight Sunday

Although shorter, this year's fair packed in several new acts and events. Comedian Carrot Top drew a crowd of more than 3,000, Hillman estimated, and there was standing room only at the demolition derby, the tractor pull and the evening rodeo shows.


But for those unaware of complex controversies and schedule strife, the fair was fabulous.

"A lot of people don't go near the rides and all that hoopla. They come for this" said Brenda Beierle, pointing to her daughter. Courtney, 11, nervously leading the family's Australian shepherd on Friday in her first 4-H competition. "This is like the big game — it's what these kids have been working for all year."

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
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

## Turnstiles do well at County Fair

Free carnival rides, bucking bulls, racing ducks and a host of concerts drew more than 38,000 to the 2002 Bi-Mart Washington County Fair and Rodeo.

The fair was only four days this year, two days short of previous years. Organizers are pleased with the results.

Don Hillman, executive director, said preliminary paid attendance was around 38,700. That's up from the 37,600 who paid to come to the six-day fair last year, he said.

We had strong numbers every day, but Saturday was the biggest at almost 11,000. Hillman said. We were blessed with good weather. It was a little sticky in the afternoons, but that wore off.

The PRCA rodeo, demolition derby and tractor pull drew standing-roomonly crowds, while comedian Carrot Top packed 3,600 people into the amphitheater on Friday night. Some of the specialty animal shows, like Nancy Kobert's Amazing World of Birds and the Great American Duck

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Races, drew good crowds throughout the four-day run.

Those seemed to be the unique, novelty events that everyone wanted to see, Hillman remarked.

The fair didn't go without negative comments. Some attendees missed a few of the traditional fair staples

There was no Pioneer Village, said Nancy Upton of Hillsboro, who brought her four children Emily, Wendy, Leslie and Catherine. No teepees, people in outfits, no silk lady. That was always so comforting.

Upton did say, however, that she liked the sandbox at the Washington County Tobacco-Free Coalition booth in the Family Fun Center.

Some 4-H and Future Farmers of America members were unhappy with the way agriculture was treated. Stephanie Vandehey, a FFA member from Banks, said she didn't like the showings in the morning because few people could come to watch them.

Sawdust was provided in the barns this year, because it decomposes easier than the traditional straw. But sawdust gets caught in sheep's wool, which brings down the wool's quality, Vandehey said.

Those sheep are going to be marked down in shows for a long time, she remarked. Once it's in there two inches, it's really hard to get out.

Hillman said the sawdust was an economic move, because the fair has to pay to get rid of straw. That's a cost to us, and it would have to be passed on, he said. We'll talk to the exhibitors and see if there's a better alternative for the sheep, that doesn't impact the spin side of that program.

I want to thank the 4-H and FFA exhibitors for letting us test this model, he said.

Some vendors, like Bobbie Crandall at Style Awhile T-shirts, said they did all right. I think the buying power is down this year; people aren't spending money, she said.

Jason Robertson, owner of Headwaters Cafe, a first-time fair vendor, agreed. The economy is bad all over, he said. I was at a horse show in Bend, and even there people were holding onto their money.

Crandall also didn't have a problem with the shorter fair this year. I think four days is good enough, as long as you get good entertainment, she said.

Other vendors, like Beverly Duddy at Portland Watch Company, didn't do so well. Duddy, an eight-year fair veteran, said she'd spoken with other seasoned veterans, and we're all sad to see that the fair did not reach its expectations by cutting it to four days. It did injure vendors seriously.

Duddy also said she would not be back. The cost of the space doesn't justify what I made here.



Hillman said the rent was based on the attendance, not number of days. He also said the shorter time frame should have lessened the vendors' costs.

Some of the vendors told me they saved two days of labor, he said.

Overall, Hillman is happy with the fair. We had more stages, and there was something going on all the time, he said.

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part of the day was, son Michael said, the rides. His father, Mike, liked the bird

show.

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Kristi Holt, who grew up going to the fair. returned with her husband Don and kids Chris, Nick and Tory.

I've come since I was a tiny girl, so we had to bring the kids, said Holt, who now lives in Seattle. The kids are having a blast.

The fair provided the kids with their first-ever pony ride. It also gave Holt



a chance to survey the changes to the fair.

There seems to be more programs for kids, she remarked.

Another long-time fair attendee, Nika Nelson, brought her two sons on Saturday. They enjoyed the rides and exhibits, and they got to meet one of the ducks in the Great American Duck Races.

Lincoln, her 6-year-old son, liked the rides the best. Nika, however, liked the exhibits. I liked watching them assemble things.

They didn't notice much difference in the fair either, except that the parking is a lot smoother this year.
