MULTI-USE FACI-LITY UPDATE Gary Poole, Chairman of the Multi-Use Facility Project, presented a plan for the proposed multi-use facility. The plan included:

55,200 sq. ft.
230' x 240'
seating for 1,600
return shutes and
assembly area
south end wide entry
for RV shows and
livestock entry bldg.

150' clear span (with 40' wide each lean-to additions to house office, restrooms, downstairs and announcer booth upstairs) removable fences for chutes, holding pens, etc. complete with wiring, etc.

The multi-use facility committee feels, after compiling ideas from groups that will utilize the facility, it should be well received. It will be large enough to hold Class A Horse Shows.

The first phase will include a pole building, covered,  $60^{\circ}$  x  $150^{\circ}$ , no sides or utilities, built to public occupancy specifications. Poole hopes to have the building site surveyed February 24 and staked with flags.

Pflug suggested after the area is staked, a sign reading i.e., "Future site of the multi-use facility" could be erected. Pflug will sketch a draft of the sign.

A plan for the multi-use building will be on file at the fair office and distributed to 4-H, Livestock Association, etc., after Poole makes several minor changes.

The Fair Board feels the plan is well worth every effort.

#### RODEO EXPENSES

Fair office received invoices paid by Ken Lewis, Rodeo Board Chr., The Fair Board appreciates Lewis' effort for proper documentation of expenses and his prompt payment. The Fair Board feels that Mr. Lewis should not have to personally pay expenses incurred by the Rodeo Board. The Rodeo members should have invoices billed directly to the Fair office. All revenue received in conjunction with Rodeo should be made payable directly to the Fair Board. This would allow all paperwork to be handled and bills paid and credited to the proper account.

The Fair Board will reimburse Lewis for bills already paid by him. However, the Rodeo budget has not yet been approved for 1979. Hesse was instructed to draft a letter to clarify the procedure the Fair Board has established for Chr. Boyer's signature.

#### CORRESPONDENCE \*4-H POLTCY

Lyle Spiesschaert, 4-H & Youth Extension Agent, related his understanding of the philosophies and concerns about 4-H members exhibiting in both 4-H and open class divisions at the Fair. He feels there is a conflict if the same exhibit is allowed to enter both 4-H and open class.

MOTION: MOVED BY CHARLES COLEGROVE, SECONDED BY RALPH HOLLAND TO CONTINUE FAIR BOARD POLICY: THE SAME EXHIBIT SHALL NOT BE USED FOR 4-H, FFA AND OPEN CLASS. MOTION CARRIED.

\*COUNTY COUNSEL County Counsel responded to inquiry made re: proper procedure for handling of contributions. Hesse will meet with Fred Leutwyler, Department of Finance and Administration, for further information.

#### RODEO CONTRACT

DeLashmutt will attend the next Rodeo Board meeting at the invitation of Ken Lewis. Rodeo stock contract bids are being reveiwed.

### COUNTY COUNSEL MEETING

Boyer, Hesse, Commissioner Fisher, County Adm. Officer Potter and County Counsel Hathaway met February 20th to discuss contract bidding.

Commissioner Fisher had been contacted for information on bidding for a fairgrounds activity. Hesse was asked to provide records of the past bids to the bidding party.

County Counsel Hathaway advised that competitive bids are required for all activity requiring a \$5,000 and over expenditure. cludes construction, repairs, improvements, but not personal or professional service contracts) When purchasing service under \$5,000 it is prudent to solicit at least 2 oral quotes. When possible, this is the method used to do business at the fairgrounds

The bidding party should be considered not only for his dollar value, but for his services provided, quality of those services and working relations with past and present contractors.

# COUNTY COUNSEL AND BIDDING

Northwest Sports will be asked to comment on the admission adopted by the Fair Board and also advised that no glass or chrome will be allowed.

The rules adopted by the Fair Board must be followed to insure safety of the participants and livestock used for the horse shows and rodeo. The rules are part of the contract.

A & P Sports will be asked to comment on a guarantee and time and length of the derby. Both parties will be asked to submit a copy of the rules and a detailed schedule of events.

#### DAIRYWIVES MEETING

The Washington County Dairywives held their monthly meeting at the fair office per Hesse's invitation. There was a good attendance and concerns were expressed and answered or discussed. The Dairywives pledged their support of the Bossters Auction, July 21 and will help in the milk parlor planning.

#### DONATIONS REC'D

The Cedar Hills Kiwanis have pledged 2 days manual labor on the drainage project.

The Groner Women's Club Annual Rummage and Plant Sale (May 18 and 19) entire profit will be donated for shrubs and trees after drainage project is completed. (Usual revenue is between \$400 - \$600)

Beaverton Rotary is planning to cover the livestock showrings at the fairgrounds.

A new motor for the GMC Truck has been purchased and is presently being installed.

MOTION: MOVED BY RALPH HOLLAND, SECONDED BY CHARLES COLEGROVE TO DELETE SWINE AND COMMERCIAL WINES FROM THE PREMIUM BOOK FOR OPEN CLASS ENTRY. MOTION CARRIED.

#### BLUE GRASS CONCERT REQUEST JULY 21

In conjunction with Western Days, KUEK Radio Station (under new management) would like to hold a family blue grass concert at the fairgrounds. KUIK would like the event to be family oriented. Boosters and Fair Board could handle beer and food concessions. Boosters will also be holding their Auction along with 4-H Wet Mare Day.

KUIK would be charged a flat rental fee and asked to pay actual garbage cost. Security must be provided by the leasees and shall be satisfactory to Chief Herman Woll and Fair Board.

The Fair Board does not oppose the idea and encourages fairgrounds usage.

#### WORK SHEET

Pepsi Day ride coupons and information were reviewed with several changes noted on the coupons to clarify rate of exchange.

WORK SHEET (CONTINUED)

Adult daily single admission will be \$2.50; season pass admission will be \$6.00; 4-H and FFA parent passes will sell for half-price of \$3.00; Youth season pass admission (new for 1979) will be \$3.00.

Rodeo admission for Under 3 - Free will change to Under 6 - Free.

POLE STRUCTURE

The Friendship Square, entertainment tent (40' x 90'), was a tremendous success for the 1978 Fair. Because the tent rental is well over a \$1,000, Hesse suggested an alternative might be to construct a permanent pole structure.

Excellent pole building plans that meet public occupancy requirements are owned by the Fair. The plans were designed for the poultry-rabbit building constructed in 1976. The first phase would be 40' x 48'.

MOTION: MOVED BY RALPH HOLLAND, SECONDED BY AGNES DELASHMUTT TO INSTRUCT THE DIRECTOR TO SOLICIT QUOTATIONS FOR A 40' x 48' COVERED POLE STRUCTURE WITH NO SIDES TO MEET THE CURRENT PUBLIC OCCUPANCY STANDARDS. MOTION CARRIED.

RULES AND REGS CHANGE Hesse would like to standardize the rules and regulations for open class livestock entry. Now each department lists the rules and regulations. Consolidation of the rules and regulations at the beginning of the premium book under one heading was recommended.

Rule #4 states one exhibitor .....does not constitute competition. Rule #9 states NO 4-H or FFA members may enter the same animal in the open class division.
