Controlling erosion in newly-planted grass seed fields

Grass seed does a superb job of protecting the soil from erosion except during the first few months after a new field is planted in the fall. The erosion in some fields can be serious, putting them in conflict with Oregon's agricultural water quality law (Washington County's 1996 administrative rules). Washington County has nearly 20,000 acres of tall fescue and perennial ryegrass. About a quarter of this acreage is newly-planted in a given year.

Susan Aldrich-Markham is working with grass seed growers to find a solution to the erosion problem. She has set up research plots in cooperating growers' fields looking at nurse crops that can be planted in the field just prior to planting grass seed. The nurse crop plants must be able to: 1) grow more quickly than the grass to provide cover and root mass to hold the soil during the winter, 2) survive the diruon herbicide applied to grass seed fields at planting, and 3) be killed by a herbicide that doesn't damage the grass before the nurse crop gets so big that it competes with the grass seed crop. It hasn't been easy to find a plant that meets all these requirements.

So far in this research spring oats have always survived the diruon, and they reduced the amount of soil sediment collected at the bottom of the plots by almost half. However, they have proven difficult to kill without injuring the grass. Aldrich-Markham is also trying a new nurse crop, meadowfoam. Meadowfoam is a native

species to southern Oregon and northern California that grows well in the winter. A few growers in the Willamette Valley have produced the seed for oil, but the oil market has never taken off and seed is still languishing unsold. Meadowfoam can easily be removed from grass using herbicide. It would be a perfect nurse crop if it could pass all the tests.

Aldrich-Markham is collecting all the water and soil that runs off from nine plots in each of three H1221-03

fields in order to compare the amount of erosion with meadowfoam, with oats or without a nurse crop. Meadowfoam has also been planted at OSU, trying different seeding depths and different rates of diuron to see what it will take to get a good nurse crop stand. Finding the right recipe for the practice of using a nurse crop in newly-planted grass seed fields would not only benefit growers, but it would also benefit water quality in the Willamette Valley.

the new year brings forestland property tax changes

Forest landowners may want to review their options now that the property tax programs have changed. To assist forest landowners, OSU Extension is offering a number of Forestland Property Tax Workshops. These are listed on the events calendar.

Forestland owners have until April 1, 2004 to make changes for this year. It is not very often that tax options are simplified and streamlined, yet the changes to the forest property tax system seem to have accomplished that goal. The new programs are called the Small Tract Forestland (STF) Option and the Forestland Program. As of January 1 all forest deferral properties will be transferred into the Forestland Program. Landowners wishing to transfer into the STF option will need to match the qualification requirements and file an application with the County Assessor.

Older adult's learn about winter safety

Emergency rooms see an increase in numbers of patients from falls and burns at this time of year. To help prevent older adults from adding a trip to the hospital to their holiday travels, Jeanne Brandt, OSU Extension Family and Community Development faculty spoke at senior centers and senior events in December and distributed printed information to remind people to be prepared for the wet weather and darker days of the season. She also reminded people of safety products such as flashlights that plug into outlets and come on when the power goes out and gripper sheets to place under slippery rugs. Copies of "Winter Safety for Seniors," in English and Spanish are available from the Washington County Extension office.

Wood products connections being made

Extension Forestry and Wood Products faculty in Washington County are working on a project to establish better "connections" among small woodland owners, wood products manufacturers, and various sectors of the wood products industry itself. The project has two primary deliverables – a web-based directory of the Oregon forest (sector and a series of workshops around the state to bring together the resource owners (private woodland owners) and resource users (the wood products industry). One of the workshops is tentatively scheduled for April 10 in Washington County. The web-based directory is well underway and will have more advanced features than any other state's directory. It will allow users to search for resource suppliers or buyers by county, species, raw materials used, as well as a number of other criteria and will allow firms on the list to update their own information so that it is easy to keep the database up to date. The Oregon Forest Industry Directory will be ready for use in mid-March.

OSU Extension nutrition classes begin at Coffee Creek

Extension Nutrition program staff are partnering with Early Head Start at Coffee Creek Correctional Facility to teach mothers about feeding their young children. Maureen Quinn, Nutrition Education Coordinator, is offering a series of classes that mesh research-based information with interactive demonstrations and cooking experiences. Teaching sheets used in the series include food preparation ideas using in-season, Oregon agricultural products.

The Extension Nutrition Program finished moving staff to Washington County in December. Thanks to Washington County Administration, Commissioners, Public Health, and Facilities Management, two staff members are now housed at the Tongue Estate Addition in downtown Hillsboro. In addition, kitchen space in the Public Services Building cafeteria has been made available for staff to offer nutrition education classes and demonstrations. The Extension Nutrition Program in Washington County is designed to assist low-income families with food safety, food security, and nutrition education needs. Find attached three comparative FYE 2004/05 "summary-level" budgets.

Background – The January Board packet included a draft of the FYE 2004/05 budget. This budget was prepared embracing the traditional operating model and included a \$0.50 increase in the adult admission (non-youth) price. Accepting the fact that this traditional operating model has not resulted in any meaningful attendance increase over the last decade and that an increase in admission prices may further exacerbate this problem, staff suggested that they be allowed to research a new operating model. The fiscal impact (decrease in ending fund balance) between the models is estimated at \$20,744.

Three possible fairtime operating models are available for Board consideration. They are as follows:

<u>Model One – Traditional Format</u>: No significant change in the fairtime operational model. Gate admission remains the same as 2003. Free demo derby, truck pull and Sunday Hispanic concert. Continue to charge an additional fee for the Rodeo.

<u>Model Two - \$0.50 Admission Increase</u>: No significant change in fairtime operational model. See Model One. Non-Youth admissions would to increase \$0.50.

<u>Model Three – Free Gate</u>: No entrance fee to fairgrounds. Charge for demo derby, truck pull and Sunday Hispanic concert. Increase Rodeo admission. \$5.00 parking fee. Maintain Community Stage and Professional Stage (Local and regional Artists). Walk around entertainers. Seek new sponsors to provide additional activities.

Find attached a draft policy regarding fairtime and non-fairtime activities involving advertising, canvassing or soliciting on Washington County Fair Complex property.

Due to the nature of our fairtime and interim rental activities, it is appropriate to adopt policies regarding such matters to support citizens' first amendment rights as well as to protect the enjoyment of fairgoers and individuals renting facilities and their guests attend those non-fairtime events.

The attached draft policy is taken in part from the policy adopted by the Oregon State Fair & Exposition Center.

WASHINGTON COUNTY FAIR BOARD

Policy Resolution 208

Advertising, Canvassing or Soliciting Policy

RECITALS

- A. WHEREAS, the Washington County Fair Board has the exclusive authority to manage the grounds and all other property owned, leased, used or controlled by the County devoted to the use of the County Fair;
- B. WHEREAS, the Washington County Fair Board is entrusted and charged with the entire business management and financial and other affairs of the County Fair; and
- C. WHEREAS, the Washington County Fair Board is vested with the authority from the Washington County Board of Commissioners to administer the affairs and set policy for the Washington County Fair Complex;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

- (1) During activities associated with the annual County Fair & Rodeo, no advertising, canvassing or soliciting, and no dissemination of written materials is permitted within the fenced-in portions of the Washington County Fair Complex property, and the air space above, except by persons exhibiting as lessees under exhibit space or sponsorship agreements signed by the Washington County Fair Complex.
- (2) During activities not associated with the annual County Fair & Rodeo, no advertising, canvassing or soliciting, and no dissemination of written material is permitted within the fenced-in portions of the Washington County Fair Complex, except in areas under the control, and rented by, a permittee(s). All such activity must be approved by the permittee(s) and confined to the areas within and/or adjacent to the facilities under the permittee's control. These areas include, but are not limited to, exhibit halls, barns, entrances, walkways and areas adjacent to such areas, such as parking lots.
- (3) During activities not associated with the annual County Fair & Rodeo, persons or groups are not prohibited from renting space in available facilities, outside the control of other permittee(s), for the purpose of advertising, canvassing or soliciting. Available facilities do not include public parking lots used or available for use during other activities or events.
- (4) No person or group shall use the properties of the Washington County Fair Complex to advertise products, goods, or services of a commercial nature, or solicit funds without the expressed written consent of the Washington County Fair Complex.
- (5) Canvassing, soliciting, and dissemination of written materials of a non-commercial nature is permitted on the Complex parking lot, if not under license, and on other property of the Washington County Fair Complex outside the fenced-in portions of the Washington County

Fair Complex. Such activities must be conducted in accordance with the following conditions:

- (a) Parking lot entrances, exits, and travel lanes must not be obstructed. Interference with traffic flow and with the duties of traffic attendants is prohibited.
- (b) The use of land vehicles, including but not limited to cars, trucks, and other motorized vehicles, bicycles, scooters, skateboards, and skates is prohibited. Use of air vehicles is prohibited. Use of land vehicles as platforms or other temporary or permanent structures or platforms is prohibited.
- (c) A person conducting such activity shall not place pamphlets, leaflets, or other material in or on any vehicles in the parking lots. Such activity must be conducted with pedestrians only, after their vehicles have been parked and they have exited.
- (d) Loudspeakers and other sound devices are prohibited.
- (e) Activity causing a crowd to gather is prohibited if pedestrian or vehicular traffic is obstructed or impeded.
- (f) Activity conducted within twenty feet of an admission gate or ticket booth is prohibited.
- (g) Activity conducted within five feet of an entrance or gate provided through fenced-in portions of the Washington County Fair Complex where access is provided to the general public is prohibited.
- (h) Active obstruction of a Complex employee, contractor, subcontractor, agent or visitor's line of travel or active detention of a Fair employee, contractor, subcontractor, agent or visitor against his will is prohibited.
- (i) Abusive language and actual or threatened physical harm directed against a Complex employee, contractor, subcontractor, agent or visitor is prohibited.
- (6) Any person or group canvassing, soliciting or disseminating materials covered by this policy must fill out a registration form and submit it along with a copy of each item to be distributed, petition to be signed, or any other materials to be used to the Washington County Fair Complex, 873 34th Avenue, Hillsboro, Oregon, 97124, at least 24 hours prior to such canvassing, soliciting or dissemination of material. Materials not submitted at least 24 hours in advance shall not be used.
- (7) Any person or group who places, or allows the placement of pamphlets, leaflets, or other material in or on vehicles or advertises or solicits funds without the expressed written consent of the Washington County Fair Complex, will be subject to a \$100 fine for each occurrence.

(8) Persons or groups are not prohibited from advertising, canvassing or soliciting on public sidewalks located on 34TH Avenue, Cornell Road or 28th Avenue, however, their activities may be restricted by city ordinance if such activities disturb the public peace, impede pedestrian or vehicular traffic, or create a public disturbance.

County fair might eliminate entry fee

Washington County Fair Board members wonder whether free admission would draw larger crowds and increase revenues

HILLSBORO -- Washington County Fair organizers shortened the event from six days to four.

They charged separate admission for the rodeo.

And they appealed to private developers in hopes of leasing or selling the fairgrounds in exchange for updated facilities.

But for the first time in years, organizers may have found an idea that won't anger fairgoers: Make it free.

Don Hillman, the fair's executive director, is asking Fair Board members to consider eliminating admission fees in hopes of boosting stagnant attendance. The board, which will make a decision on the plan Wednesday, could instead choose to hold admission steady or increase adult admission by 50 cents a ticket.

If the free admission plan is approved, a fair-going family would skip plunking down \$22 at the gate -- admission for two adults and two children -- and spend their dough instead on corn dogs, Ferris wheel rides and an evening at the rodeo.

It's yet another idea fair folks have pitched in hopes of attracting more people and more events, year-round, to the 101-acre fairgrounds in Hillsboro. The goal is to make a profit and wean the fair from a state tax on hotel and motel sales.

Hillman tried to do that last year with Frite Lites, a new 17-night Halloween light show. But the \$135,000 event drew 5,005 people -- half as many as projected.

The next innovation might well be free admission, which is gaining support among board members. "At first, I thought it was foolish and crazy," said Cody Feinauer, chairman of the rodeo committee. "Now I actually think it's a really, really great deal."

Last summer, 43,508 people paid to get into the fair; the year before that, 44,136 paid admission. In 2002, the year before the fair was shortened, 41,600 showed up with tickets.

Hillman says a free fair could jump-start attendance by as much as 100 percent, but in a budget proposal he conservatively pitched an increase of 35 percent, or about 15,000. He points to fairs in Michigan and California that went free and found attendance nearly doubled.

"In general, anything that increases the growth of the Washington County Fair is a good thing,"



said Lori Morgon, who has been a 4-H leader for the past 10 years and hasn't missed a fair in 23 years.

Adult fairgoers paid \$7 to get in last year, with children and senior citizens paying \$4.

To make up lost ticket sales, Hillman proposes to charge as much as \$7 each for special events, such as the truck pull, demolition derby and big-name concerts. Parking fees would increase from \$4 a car and \$3 a carpool to \$5 for all. And the once-free Sunday night Latino concert would cost \$10 a ticket.

Organizers say more fairgoers would mean more money for them and concessionaires. Fair officials currently take a 20 percent cut from food sales. With the change, they could take as much as 22.5 percent. They take 35 percent from carnival rides, a figure that would remain the same.

"For those who have food stands, it's going to be a burden," said James Clute, a member of the Washington County Grange. "They're already having a tough time making a profit."

Rodeo fans paid \$7 last year to get into the fair and another \$4 for rodeo general admission or \$7 for the grandstand. New fees would total the same at the rodeo gate: \$11 for general admission and \$14 for the grandstand.

"It's still the cheapest PRCA rodeo in the state of Oregon," said Feinauer, whose committee would keep all proceeds. He said that would mean the rodeo could break even or make a profit for the first time in 50 years.

"And if we don't do something, we won't have a fair much longer."

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A crown for a queen

HILLSBORO K risten de Groen leans against a back wall, hands clenched in nervousness, but otherwise looking Dolly Parton gorgeous in her tight, white cowgirl frock.

It's 9 p.m. Saturday, hours after Washington County Rodeo supporters gathered for shredded roast pig and twice-baked potatoes. The beer's flowing like a rain-swollen creek, and peanut shells litter the blue plastic-covered tables.

The 200 or so here have come to watch de Groen -- a 19-year-old horseaholic who lives in Gaston with her folks, Richard and Rita -- be crowned Washington County Fair & Rodeo Queen 2004.

Most have known each other for years, so it's yakety-yak all over the fairground's Cloverleaf Building.

De Groen chats it up, too, especially with visiting rodeo queens.

Except now, moments before becoming queen of the cowboys, size 4 de Groen stands alone. Which makes her stand out even more. Especially her hair, a shellacked red mane that erupts beneath her white cowboy hat.

Solitude is fleeting. Soon de Groen's onstage, dipping her head as last year's queen, Kim Vanderzanden, slides on the tiara.

Then the evening's real fun begins.

For everyone else, that is. Queens can't have too much fun. Young men in Wranglers, for instance, can't buy the newly crowned a beer because it's not allowed.

And kissing's certainly a no-no, leaving de Groen's boyfriend, Mike Wormington, out of the lip-lock loop, like everybody else.

"My boyfriend's been pretty quiet about all of this," says de Groen, watching Wormington hang with a gaggle of guys across the room.

"But I think he's pretty supportive of it."

Perhaps. Or maybe he frets about the svelte de Groen presiding over this year's rodeo, scheduled for July 29-Aug. 1. Or her traveling this summer to 15 or so rodeos and parades across the



Northwest. Or the fact that she'll hang with spur-wearing studly guys who ride tailbone-jarring animals for a living.

And guys who might flirt with another fella's gal.

Vanderzanden certainly knows the perils of royalty. She started her 2003 reign with a steady boyfriend and ended it with a maybe boyfriend.

"We're talking," is how the Verboort woman -- who plans to be a veterinarian -- sums up their relationship.

Ah, but none of this breaking-up business tarnishes Saturday's coronation. De Groen's too busy, overseeing six tables loaded with silent auction items. Money raised pays for sequined outfits and travel.

Bidding's fierce over the cordless drill, the gas fireplace, the guided fishing trip for one.

Across the room, visiting queens sashay about in their fancy outfits. In calf-length purple dresses and matching boots, the Columbia County queen and her court seem more a shoe-in act for Nashville than rodeo royalty.

"My mom made these dresses," says 18-year-old queen Caylee Cooper, referring to her mother, Chris Cooper. "We wore them to our coronation last weekend."

Cooper, and her princesses, Rachel Swanson, 16, and Nichole Andrews, 17, attend Scappoose High School.

No, the girls say giggling, they wouldn't dream of wearing the purple dresses to school.

"People at school know about us," Caylee Cooper says, "but we don't make a big deal about it."

That's sort of how the new queen feels about her reign, de Groen says later, grabbing salami slices from the buffet table. Nerves, she admits, dimmed her appetite earlier. Now successfully crowned, she wants to eat -- and ponder the coming year.

She wonders whether her first reign ever will be a memorable success.

"I'm either going to like it or hate it," admits de Groen, a 2002 graduate of Gaston High School who started riding horses at age 8 and who intends to become a horse trainer.

"But I've always wanted to be queen, so I'm giving it a try," she says. "We'll see if it leads to other titles."

If not, she can always join the Washington County Rodeo Fly Girls. That's where Vanderzanden's headed. Five of the drill team's eight members are former rodeo queens.

"We call each other the 'has beens,' " says Vanderzanden, smiling.

At 10 p.m., the beer bar closes, so someone twists open a mason jar of homemade hooch called "apple pie," and the party continues. The more that's consumed, the livelier the action becomes in the women's bathroom, where one gal sits perched sink-side, loudly gathering gossip from everyone who stumbles inside.

An hour later, the apple pie's gone, so the drinkers start heaping shredded pig onto paper plates,



and into paper cups.

For the trip home.

A DJ plays the last country song of the night. De Groen slow dances with some kid, her already polished smile beaming across the room.

The lights flicker on, and de Groen heads for the bathroom. The white outfit comes off, the blue jeans go on. The Cloverleaf Building must be left in its pre-coronation condition.

Even queens have to clean.

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A free County Fair?

Rodeo buffs may have to fork out extra bucks to make up for a proposed free gate admission to this year's Washington County Fair and Rodeo, in an effort to raise fair attendance.

So might concert dwellers and Truck Pull and Demolition Derby goers.

Don Hillman. executive director of

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the Washington County Fair Complex, proposed free gate admission

last week to the Washington County Fair Board, and hopes for a decision by the Feb. 4 board meeting.

"We believe there's a financial barrier to getting people to come to our event," Hillman said. "We've just got to get them to come out and try it. I think they'll like it."

Fair admittance may cost up to \$7.50 per person if the fair board does not approve the free gate admission proposal.

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If free admission flies, rodeo ticket prices would increase to \$11 to \$14 per person.

Cody Feinauer, chairman of the Washington County Rodeo Committee, says those ticket prices are less than the costs for a PRCA, or Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association, rodeo -- \$17-\$27 per show at Portland's Rose Garden arena.

"If we don't see a major increase in people coming and spending money at the fairgrounds, it would be hard to recoup that," Feinauer said. "If it's promoted properly and the word is given to everybody I think it could be a great thing."

The Sunday Hispanic Concert and other musical acts would cost up to \$10. Arena events such as the Truck Pull and Demolition Derby would cost up to \$7.50 per person.

Hillman says the county's growing population and staggering fair attendance is good reason to attract more fairgoers with free admission.

Fair and Rodeo Board members agree that price increases for rodeo, concert and arena events will compensate for the loss of admission revenue, at no additional expense to fairgoers.

"If you get an increase in attendance, you get an increase in revenue through food stands and rides," Hillman said.

Hillman estimated last year's fair attendance at from 8,000 to 13,000 paying visitors. The popularity of the rodeo, arena events and the Hispanic concert would continue to draw as many visitors as previous years, even if they cost more, he added.

"Maybe by not having to pay at the gate they'll be able to enjoy a few more things," said Sheila Day, a fair board member. "It's worth looking into and getting more people to the fair, especially for educational things like animals for kids."

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


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Blue Angels will appear in Hillsboro air show

The event's organizers get a surprise call that the Navy flying team can perform in August

The Oregon International Airshow-Hillsboro has landed the U.S. Navy Blue Angels for its 2004 show -- bringing a big-name headliner to the salvaged show.

And the news, announced Wednesday, came out of the blue.

A representative from the military jet team called last week and said the aerobatics team could perform Aug. 14 and 15, the weekend after performing at Seafair in Seattle, said Don McCoun, an executive board member. Air show organizers were so excited to host the biggest name in jet teams that they changed the show's dates from Sept. 11 and 12.

"We are just thrilled," McCoun said. "The Blue Angels sell a lot of tickets. It's helpful in keeping the air show flying."

After getting approval from the Port of Portland, which operates the Hillsboro Airport, and support from the Oregon Air National Guard, organizers announced the news Wednesday.

The coup could ensure the stability of the air show, which faced a turbulent future a year ago.

The Portland Rose Festival Association and the Greater Hillsboro Area Chamber of Commerce dropped the air show in November 2002 because of concerns about faltering attendance and erratic schedules of popular acts such as the Blue Angels. But a core group of volunteer committee members remained and held a show at the Hillsboro Airport in September.

Despite having no military jet team, such as the Blue Angels or the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds, about 51,000 people attended. The air show had revenues of about \$450,000, said Miz Nakajima, an air show spokeswoman. The show donated \$23,000 to charities that participated in the show, including the Hillsboro Schools Foundation, she said.

The Blue Angels last visited the Portland area in 2000. As many as 80,000 attended that weekend, according to Rose Festival officials.

Organizers are hoping to draw at least that many this year, said Bob Henry, air show president.

In 1992, the show scored a record 122,000 fans with the Blue Angels and Russian MiGs performing.

Henry said he's not concerned about the possibility of hot weather keeping away crowds in mid-August. Heat is preferable to the rain of early summer.



Organizers are still considering whether to have a performance on Friday, Aug. 13, Henry said. Sponsors and disabled children could be invited to watch the acts rehearse, but the event would not be open to the public, he said.

The show had several civilian acts lined up for the September dates. But Henry said he doesn't expect organizers will have trouble getting those and other performers to switch to the August dates.

"They like to perform for big crowds," he said.

Some vendors, complaining of too much downtime pulled out early. But vendors aren't the only problem.


"Fiesta time has been a great value to the fair," says Almond.

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
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So, by slicing off three days the fair board has forever fixed the same number of problems.

Through this agenda item the Board of County Commissioners (the Board) will be able to make one or more of the three pending appointments to the Washington County Fair Board, which is comprised of five members. The Fair Board meets monthly, develops the Fair Complex's annual operating budget, and provides overall policy direction for management of Fair Complex activities and facilities. Fair Board terms are three years in duration.

Terms for two of the five Fair Board positions (the District 2 and At-Large positions) expired on December 31, 2003. In addition, Jane Willhoite, of the District 4 position, resigned in December 2003, leaving the remaining two years of that term vacant.

On September 2, 2003 the Board directed the County Administrative Office to announce the vacancies and invite applications for appointment to the Fair Board. A filing deadline of October 13, 2003, or until the vacancies were filled, was established. An announcement of the vacancies was sent to area newspapers, TV and radio stations; area chambers of commerce; and to the CPO coordinator for inclusion in the CPO newsletter. Staff provided the Board with a briefing on the recruitment process in the November 25, 2003, and subsequent, worksessions.

A summary of the applicants and current Fair Board membership is attached.

DEPARTMENT'S REQUESTED ACTION:

Make one or more of the three pending appointments to the Fair Board. Two of the vacant Fair Board positions (the District 2 and At-Large positions) have terms ending December 31, 2006. The third vacant position is the remainder of the District 4 term, which ends December 31, 2005.

Re: FYE 2004/05 Budget - Free County Fair

Background – The January Board packet included a draft of the FYE 2004/05 budget. This budget was prepared embracing the traditional operating model and included a \$0.50 increase in the adult admission price. Accepting the fact that this traditional operating model has not resulted in any meaningful attendance increase over the last decade and that an increase in admission prices may further exacerbate this problem, staff suggested that they be allowed to research a new operating model. This model would reverse the current operating model and recommend "free" gate admission to the fair, but implement a fee for the truck pull, demo derby, and big name concerts; and increase the fee to the rodeo.

Staff has completed its preliminary work with regards to investigating a "Free County Fair" operating model for the 2004 Washington County Fair & Rodeo. For comparison purposes, the attached comparative spreadsheet provides for three different operating models, i.e., current model; a model that includes a \$0.50 increase in adult tickets; and the "Free County Fair" model. Preliminary figures tend to indicate that a "Free County Fair" would not require significantly more reliance on TOT revenues than the current model and yet offer greater upside increases in attendance and non-admission revenues.

An explanation of each model is provided on the first page of the comparative spreadsheet document. Please note that this document only addresses the County Fair & Rodeo in that no changes are currently recommended in the facility rental operating model.

Discussion – There are at least three compelling reasons to support the "Free County Fair" recommendation. The first is a sincere desire to attract more County residents to this family-friendly event with the hopes of breaking the decade-long record of stagnate

attendance growth. Once introduced to the County Fair, there is a good chance that this event will enjoy repeated visits in future years.

The second is being able to introduce and expose more County residents to Washington County's agricultural products and traditions that represent the event's heart and soul.

The third is to be a good steward of the TOT revenues. The Fair Complex continues to rely upon this single largest revenue source to fund it year-round activities including the annual County Fair & Rodeo. Washington County Code provides that these revenues are to be used for "... promotion and maintenance (including operation) of the fairgrounds." What a good way to promote Washington County and the Fair Complex as well as allowing County residents the opportunity to benefit from a County-wide source of revenue.

Findings – Staff has contacted the Ionia 'Free' Fair, Ionia, Michigan; Yolo County Fair, Woodland, California; and the Sacramento County Fair, Sacramento, California.

The Ionia 'Free' Fair was a free county fair for many years. This fair went to a paid gate in 2002 and witnessed a 50% decrease in attendance. They witnessed another 50% decrease in attendance in 2003. They are reverting to a free fair in 2004.

The Yolo County Fair has been a free county fair for many years. The fair is located in Woodland, California, a city of 50,000 and a county of 200,000. Their annual county fair attendance is in excess of 100,000 per year. This fair receives approximately \$140,000 in state revenues to support its annual operations.

The Sacramento County Fair was a paid-gate fair until 1997 when they converted to a free county fair. The fair is located in a very urban area. Their attendance increased from 21,000 in 1996 to 38,000 in 1997. Their current attendance is approximately 70,000. This fair receives approximately \$140,000 in state revenues to support its annual operations.

These fairs each witnessed a similar increase/decrease in non-admission revenues (concessions, carnival and parking) after changing their operating model.

Other fairs that have change from a paid gate to a free gate (or visa versa) are still being researched/contacted.

Staff has also discussed this concept with other stakeholders such as members of the Rodeo Committee, carnival, concessionaires, exhibitors, etc. Each support changes that will help increase attendance and awareness for the County Fair.

Conclusion – Staff is excited about the possible change, but is also aware that such a change will create new opportunities for the Complex while at the same time, realize the challenge to adequately promote and advertise the new operating model.

Mission Statement - The mission of the Washington County Fair Complex is to provide excellent facilities and services in a self-supporting a manner for the following purposes:

- 1. Preserve the annual County Fair & Rodeo and its' heritage.
- 3. Provide a welcoming environment for all volunteers.
- 5. Promote year-round facilities for consumer trade shows, public expositions, and special gatherings.
- 2. Promote the "World-Class" agriculture of the County.
- 4. Commitment to life-long learning with a special emphasis on youth.
- 6. Promote a sense of community among residents of Washington County.

Findings: The Washington County Fair & Rodeo continues to require an operating subsidy from the Fair Complex's share of TOT revenues. Attendance over the last decade has remained relatively flat despite substantial increases in the County's population. Based upon the event's traditional operating model, the 2004 event is estimated to require a TOT subsidy of approximately \$132,000.

Recommendation: Change the annual event's operating model to provide for a 'free' gate and charge for Arena events and concerts. This will permit **ALL** County residents the opportunity to see the traditional elements of the Washington County Fair without regards to financial consideration. These traditional events will include livestock, agricultural, arts & crafts, land products, floral, fiber, 4H and FFA exhibits. The Rodeo, Truck Pull, Demo Derby and Concerts will require an admission fee. Community and professional entertainment will be featured throughout the day.

Estimated Increase: Other events that have changed to a 'free' gated policy has realized a 50 - 100% increase in total attendance in the first year. In 2003, the County Fair & Rodeo had a paid gate of 43,500 with a total attendance estimated at 50,200. With a 'free' gated policy, total attendance could increase to 75,000 - 100,000 total visitors. For budget purposes, total attendance is estimated to increase by 35%.

- **Pro Forma Paid at \$7.00:** No significant change in operational model. Gate admission remains the same as 2003. Free Demo Derby and Truck Pull. Continue to charge an additional fee for Rodeo.
- **Pro Forma Paid at \$7.50:** No significant change in operational model. Adult admission increased \$0.50. Free Demo Derby and Truck Pull. Continue to charge an additional fee for Rodeo
- Pro Forma Free Gate w/Admission Fee to Truck Pull, Demo Derby and Rodeo: Eliminate Gate Fee. Charge for Truck Pull (\$7.00). Charge for Demo Derby (\$7.00). Charge for Rodeo (\$11 Bleachers/\$15 Covered Grandstand). \$5.00 parking fee. Maintain Community Stage and Professional Stage (Local and regional artists). Walk around entertainers. New sponsors to provide additional activities.

Re: Cottonwood Trees - Update

Staff continues to study the status of the four cottonwood trees lining the main walkways south of the Main Exhibit Hall; the two cottonwood trees near the pony ride and petting farm; and the fifteen cottonwood trees adjacent to the amphitheatre and Floral Building.

As reported at the September 2003 Board meeting, although these cottonwood trees have been recently thinned, there continues to be an ongoing public safety concern since the cottonwoods have been shedding large live limbs. Two recent incidents during the month of July included two larges live limbs being shed; one just off the walkway adjacent to the Main Exhibit Hall during the All Breed Dog Show; and one next to the petting farm during the 2003 Washington County Fair & Rodeo.

Based upon the preliminary report provided by the Washington County Facilities Division, staff has contacted a local tree maintenance company for an estimate to 'crown thin" the trees, or if so recommended, removal of suspect trees. A crown thinning involves reducing the density of the live branches to minimize breakage; however, such crown thinning does not guarantee the loss of live limbs, but does reduce the likelihood of such an event. So far the preliminary costs to have the six cottonwood trees adjacent to the Main Exhibit Hall, Pony Ride and Petting Farm removed and the remaining fifteen cottonwoods thinned, would be approximately \$16,680. If it were recommended to only thin all twenty-one trees, the cost would be approximately \$12,180.

Staff has also contacted another company regarding the removal of the six cottonwood trees for their salvage value for us in producing other wood products. More later.
