Chair Kathy Christy called the meeting to order at 4:30pm. She welcomed everyone and called for additions to the agenda. There were none.

 Consent Agenda: The Board Chair requested a change in the agenda in order to accommodate Commissioner Brian and to add an additional item, Insurance letter under New Business

Report on Task Force Committee: Commissioner Brian thanked the Fair Board for the opportunity to update them on the progress of issues surrounding the redevelopment of the property and the Task Force's efforts. "With so many options it was decided to have a meeting with key players to identify issues, options and decide what kind of information was needed to take to the larger group. First, it's a great property with light rail; Cornell Road is in good shape. We all agreed the existing buildings need work and we want to retain a strong fair. It was agreed there should be an exhibition or conference building. Maintaining the ability to allow the community to use the facility at a reasonable price. An operating plan is also needed it does not end up like Dechutes County Fair. We want a project designed and built! The process has been ongoing and so long many of the people that have been working on this are impatient. We also want to

get it done right. Within the next few months we will decide what we want to do and the next few months after that we will get under way.

The information that was compiled in years past as well as by Dave Lentz and LRS has not been lost and we are working from that and not duplicating things that have already been done. Geoff Larkin is our consultant and will be assimilating data from those studies, particularly the market data. Dave Lentz, and MERC will be involved. Bringing their collective experience and relative information and studies concerning building research and costs. We need to know accurately and factually what a lodging tax generate; the lodging industry is open to the idea. We presently have a 4.5% tax they would consider a 2 per cent increase. (We are at 7% and Portland is at 11.5%.) We need to know what a property tax would generate (5 cents per 1,000)?

One of the leading considerations was the possibility of the leasing of part of the property to a commercial enterprise thereby receiving revenues to improve the rest of the property. We will try to pin down the values and what is feasible there. The consultants are trying to get that organized in the next 10 days. Another possibility for consideration is a base survey of the public covering everything from their knowledge of the fair grounds to attendance and their support for the money measures to gage the over all support. That suggestion did not receive a warm reception with the group, however, the consultants were advised to find out the cost of such a survey and outline the questions that should be asked.

There was not consensus on the commercial development, which would require the demolition of the present buildings and moving the site across 34th. There were clearly folks that don't like that idea including a couple of members of the Board of County Commissioners as well as members of the Fair Board as you know, it is not backed unanimously. It was discussed. It is good to identify those kinds of ideas and options so we know what will have to be addressed. We hope to have a meeting within 10 days or so to discuss the information that has been requested, and hear what the consultants have to say.

Ken Leahy confirmed the progress of the committee and stated it was important to hold to the time frame so the decision s would be made by the end of this year. He also agreed the information MERC had was very important. The Task force meeting calendar and time frame was discussed.

Rich stated it was unclear wither there was a need for a larger group involvement and the communications must be open. Tom advised the next meeting did include a larger group, the Rodeo, Boosters, Mayors of two cities, users, etc. The Fair Board agreed a large scope of people and areas of the County should be involved in this process. Rich warned the mission of the larger group must be clearly defined. Tom agreed information must be gathered and options listed so time may efficiently be used at the next level of meetings. Participants have been Two County Commissioners, two Fair Board members, and MERC, City of Hillsboro, Boosters, Hillsboro Chamber, County Manager and three members of the consulting team.

Kathy questioned when would the present site be analyzed and a decision made on upgrading some of the buildings? Tom advised the Task Force should narrow the options and plans and at that time studies and evaluations will be made on the present site and buildings and the upgrading or demolition and rebuilding.

Tom stated the new Corporation that has purchased Cavanaghs's had indicated interest in meeting with the committee to see how they would fit into the plans. Tom said, they had not been able to meet but were trying to set it up. The Armory's plans were questioned, and the information gathered confirmed they had no plans to either move or remodel within the next 10 years.

Kathy asked Tom about the budget for the Task Force. He replied \$112,000 plus was the budget submitted to the Regional Investment Board. \$50,000 was the Regional Investment Board grant, \$25,00 fair Board, \$9,000 County funds, \$8,500 City of Hillsboro and the in-kind and hard costs from the Commissioner's office make up the funding. "That is the phase one, to figure out what we want to do." There will be other costs beyond that, design costs, legal fees, etc.; if it goes to a vote there are additional costs. The County is continuing to pursue grants for this project. Discussion followed on other funds that may be available within the fair budget.

It was agreed the time frame of the end of the year worked our well. If the decision is for the commercial venue that will give the winter and spring to pursue opportunities and still have someone renting facilities. If the decision encompasses either of the election issues it should be on the November 02 ballot because of the need for a double majority in the May elections.

Discussion of the requirements for the lodging association to support a tax increase took place. Tom advised they (the association) would be interested if the money was spent on a convention center or exhibition center, the type that would attract overnight guests and secondly, they would want to make sure there was adequate money to spend on promotion. It was stated, "the building will do no one any good without the means to advertise and market". Thirdly, they would want to make sure there was a maintenance fund that would insure it could be properly maintained and operated.

Lyle commented, if at all possible we keep the citizens input in the planning, Possibly toward the end when we have a real good plan and we want to get reaction. Rich agreed.

Kathy thanked Tom for the report.

1.Consent Agenda: She ila questioned a line item and wanted to clarify a statement about the log house. She wanted to make sure she was not misquoted about the historical value of the log cabin. Although the structure is not on the historical register it is of significant historical importance and should be looked at by qualified restoration specialist. Line item #326 was questioned. Barbara explained it was a billing from last year's fair and was a legitimate cost although turned in very late did warrant a payment. (Food for the

Sunday performers.) Rich explained another charge attributed to the purchase of two ATM machines. He informed the Board they had been donated and the funds would be returned to the fair. The Board thanked Rich for his negotiation of that deal. Lyle questioned personnel charges. Barbara answered. He also questioned the loss of interim revenues. Barbara's response was the dip was projected in the mid year report and there were no surprises that developed. The budget had included at least two large events that anticipated returning from the previous year, one canceled and the scheduled RV rally did not take place because the business was sold. Those coupled with the loss of the Armory reflect the losses.

Kathy called for the adoption of the consent agenda: Lyle moved and Rich seconded to accept the consent agenda, the budget report and to pay the bills as submitted. Motion carried.

- 2.Rodeo report: Cody reported on the Poker Ride that was held at the Flying M Ranch. They raised \$1,402. The Rodeo Committee participated in the Starlight Parade. Rich asked if it would make a difference if Board members participated? Cody said not really. The time commitment would be about 2 hours. The queen will be in the Rose parade. He announced the next Rodeo meeting would be July 10th. He passed out a copy of a letter from Copenhagen Skoal about sponsorship of the rodeo. It was questioned whether it would be in conflict with other sponsorships. Barbara answered it did appear so but there was some confusion as Terry Amato has the sponsorship contracts and she could find no copies in the office. She had contacted Terry and requested copies of all contracts. She said the Smoke Free Coalition is on site at Fair and sponsoring the Friendship Stage again this year. The contract with them reads there can be no advertising of tobacco products. Before it had been understood it prohibited the sales of tobacco products. For one year (2001 fair) it appears the Fair Board is committed to the terms of that contract. Discussion followed on sponsorships and how they are handled and how the contracts are negotiated. It was a consensus the Board, Manager and Terry should meet after this Fair to establish a procedure. The Board will place the Copenhagen/Skoal sponsorship on next month's agenda.
- **2.** Fair Boosters: In Bill's absence Barbara reported he had advised her he was unable to attend and the Booster's club was just getting ready for fair.
- 3. 4-H Report: John Baggott reported on the leaders and superintendents' meeting that was attended by Barbara and Leah concerning fair and locations for exhibits. He said they would have a computer lab in the cloverleaf building this year. Rich asked if there had been any reaction to the increased cost of the bracelet. John said there were very little comments. For most people it wasn't a big deal and of course any change is a big deal to others.

4. Old Business:

<u>5. Board retreat:</u> Kathy reported on the information and agenda that Marv Himmel had sent to her concerning the proposed retreat/work session. Lyle questioned the purpose of the retreat. Kathy explained the need to be focused as a group and address their roles as board members and the relationship between the Board and staff as three of the topics that could be addressed. Rich felt the most important issue was the development. After discussion it was decided by consensus to wait until November to look at a retreat with the new CEO.

6. New Business:

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- 7. PGE, Bob Marell: Bob presented a proposed easement for the Boards consideration. He explained PGE felt is necessary to increase the available power in that area and the site was the most available. He was asked if it could serve the fair grounds with enough power for future development? He answered yes. Discussion took place on the placement and the amount of property that was needed for the easement and vault. This project involves larger square footage than the previous easement. The price was discussed. Rich moved to accept the payment of \$5,000.00 for the easement and Ken seconded the motion. Motion carried. Discussion followed concerning the verbiage of the contract. Rich moved to change the word from vault to easement area in paragraph # 8. Sheila seconded and the motion carried.
- **8.** CCIS Letter: Kathy shared a letter from CCIS advising "leaders of governing bodies" individual members may create personal exposure if there is a misuse of authority. Under certain instances will not be covered under the group policy.
- **9.CEO Job Description:** It was decided to meet Friday June 15th to go over other descriptions and outline the needs for Washington County Fair Complex.
- 10. General Correspondence: There were none.
- 11.Announcements: The next Board meeting will be July 10th because the 4th fall on the meeting date.
- 12. Board Communications: There were none.

Chair Kathy Christy adjourned the meeting at 7:22pm.

Dear Fair Board and Staff:

It has come to my attention that the Washington County Rodeo Committee is considering a proposed sponsorship by Copenhagen for this year's rodeo. I would like to remind the Fair Board that acceptance of such a sponsorship would constitute a breach of the contract the Tobacco-Free Coalition of Washington County entered into with the Washington County Fair & Rodeo on February 13, 2001. The contract clearly states that the Coalition "would receive the full impact of this sponsorship on all of its sponsorship objectives[,]" including, "[e]xclusion of tobacco advertising from the Fairplex."

If the Fair Board agrees to Copenhagen's sponsorship, the Tobacco-Free Coalition will seek legal recourse for breach of contract. The Coalition also intends to contact Attorney General Hardy Myers to assess whether Copenhagen's sponsorship of the rodeo would be a violation of the Master Settlement Agreement between the States' Attorneys General and tobacco manufacturers.

The Coalition has been pleased with its \$20,000 sponsorship of Friendship Square from 1998 through 2001and hopes to continue the partnership for years to come. We applied the Fair Board's policy to refuse any tobacco advertising, promotion or distribution on the Fair Complex and urge the Board to continue honoring this policy. The community supports this kind of protection. In a 1997 public opinion poll, 82% of Washington County residents agreed "billboards that advertise tobacco should not be allowed near places where children go," and 58% oppose sponsorship of sporting or cultural events by tobacco companies. In your role as a public community venue, providing protection of the public's health is no less important today. Make no mistake: chewing and spit tobacco, like cigarettes, are products that addict and kill when used as directed.

The Coalition expects that the Fair Board will respect the public's desire to protect children and their families from tobacco promotion.

Fairgrounds face-off over tobacco money

Copenhagen offers support in exchange for ads, and with the loss of two leading sponsors, the rodeo budget is hurting

HILLSBORO — The demographic group drawn to the Washington County Fair and Rodeo makes it about the best local gathering for teaching people the evils of tobacco. It also makes it the best place to advertise the stuff.

So in the classic western tradition, there's a show-down brewing between the Tobacco Prevention Program of Washington County and the Copenhagen chewing tobacco brand.

Trying to avoid the crossfire are members of the county Fair Board. They remember a dust-up last year that ended with the fair's managers banning an

anti-tobacco poster. At the same time, they are pinned between a 3-year-old ban on tobacco ads and the need to find sponsors for the fair and rodeo.

After learning the Fair Board was considering Copenhagen Pro Rodeo as a \$500 sponsor of the event, the tobacco prevention group, a three-year fair sponsor, sent a certified letter Friday to the Fair Board. They issued a challenge gussied up with legal lingo: "If the Fair Board agrees to Copenhagen's sponsorship, the Tobacco-Free Coalition will seek legal recourse for breach of contract."

The group's \$5,000 contract with the fair includes a provision banning tobacco advertising from the fair complex.

"I definitely consider this a breach of contract," said Diane Laughter, program manager. "This would be a big step backward, and I think this is something the public would not support."

gon Attorney General Hardy Myers whether the deal might violate the national tobacco settlement. But without a great deal of research, it would be difficult to determine whether the settlement, which has limitations on tobacco advertising, would prohibit the deal, said Kevin Neely, Myers' spokesman.

Fair Board members haven't made a decision and probably won't until they next meet in July, said chairwoman Kathy Christy. That probably will be too late to do anything for this year's fair, which starts July 24, even if it meant simply hanging two Copenhagen banners as proposed.

But a time limit won't protect the board from having to make a decision. The tobacco prevention group's contract expires this year. And Copenhagen has said it wants to pay \$2,500 for the right to set up

a booth and hand out free chewing charge extra for rodeo admission, tobacco samples at future fairs.

In April 1998, the Washington County board approved a policy of not accepting smoking sponsorships or advertising regarding tobacco after the anti-tobacco group lobbied the board. It was a decision that Laughter now calls "pretty heroic."

But Ken Leahy, the board member who made the motion three vears ago, now thinks it is time to go back. "With as tight as sponsors are and trying to get sponsors, I think we should reconsider that," he said.

This year the fair has lost two rodeo sponsors who each paid \$15,000. United Rentals and Friberg Electric both changed owners. and the new companies didn't renew sponsorships. That represents nearly a quarter of the rodeo's \$132,000 cost.

The fair also sees the Copenhagen sponsorship as a foot in the door on the way to becoming one of the nationally televised rodeos on the Copenhagen Pro Rodeo Se-

Christy said she hasn't decided what position she'll take on the sponsorship question, but she would oppose allowing Copenhagen to distribute free samples. "I don't think we should encourage it for anyone who hasn't tried it," Christy said.

Copenhagen has had a booth and handed out samples for several years at the Clackamas County Fair, said fair manager Rayven Da-And the board rejected a plan to vis. The company paid the fair

\$3,000 last year.

Clackamas County tries not to have alcohol or tobacco sponsors. Davis said, but Copenhagen is a sponsor of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association, which counts both Washington and Clackamas county fairs as members.

This is the second time in as many years that the tobacco prevention group has tangled with the event's management. During last vear's fair, fair officials refused to hang an anti-tobacco banner paid for by the group. The banner depicted a cowboy with a limp cigarette dangling from his lips and the warning that smoking can cause impotence. Fair officials said the message inappropriate for a venue with children in the audience.

Now, the anti-tobacco group is arguing the same thing about the Copenhagen sponsorship, "It's a very dangerous product, and

they're trying to market to these little guys," Laughter said.

Those who use chewing tobacco are at increased risk of cancer of the mouth, larynx and esophagus.

But Cody Feinauer, rodeo committee chairman, who smokes and chews tobacco, said the Copenhagen banners aren't distasteful like the impotence banner.

"A banner with the word 'Copenhagen' and a cowboy on a bucking bronco is not offensive." he said.

Besides, he doesn't even consider the Copenhagen banners a tobacco advertisement.

"We're advertising a company named Copenhagen Pro Rodeo. he said. "It's money, and we need monev."

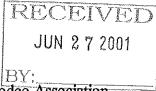

7.Maintenance Report: Earl Bemis gives report. Earl welcomes back seasonal workers. Mike is busy working the grounds and cutting grass. Jim has taken the lead in having the vehicles painted. He is doing the regular maintenance and repair on the equipment and vehicles. Albert Jr. and Sr. continue to oversee the event set-up and tear down with help of John from Green Thumb. Earl has been working on signage, repairing those signs that require work, and creating others. Also signing buildings including the main office. Been very busy especially with events like DJ's.

8.Old Business: Chairman Thomas refers to the appointment of three members to the CEO selection committee of last month referred by Cal. Cal recommends Lloyd Baron and Fred Scheller was appointed. Cal says that we now have approximately 40 applicants at this point. Ken Leahy mentions that Don McCoun was interested in being on the selection committee, also, Lenry Gratteri. <u>9.New Business:</u> Report on the fire in the grandstand. Earl and Cal do the report. Earl explains the circumstances surrounding the incident and what we know at this time. Mentions that just today the fire investigator came back out to do more investigatory work. Earl also mentioned we have an engineer working on the required drawings that the city requires for replacement. The city has agreed to expedite the review process rather than taking the usual 6 to 8 weeks in that process. Three contractors have looked at the project. Cal says we have a \$5,000 deductible insurance, but have no idea of what it will cost, just throwing out a 30K figure. The insurance company brought in two of the three contractors. The circumstances are extremely suspicious in terms of arson. Farl did pick up some evidence (beer cans). Cal says that we told them that we wanted to be back in operation by May 1., And we hear that it is doable. Cal mentions that he hired security all last week after the fire. Ken asked about some other fire incidents, Cal relates about incidents in the Main Exhibit, livestock, and Cloverleaf building.

Cal speaks to a memo on anti-smoking lobby group that visited the fairgrounds (related to measures for the fair). Suggests that we reiterate the policies adopted by a previous board. We have been following most of the things they call attention to for some time. Cal speaks to the difficulty of enforcing no smoking policies. The signage will be up for fair. The group possibly came with the intention of

Ken Leahy makes a motion that we reafirm the non-smoking policies for fair and also not to accept smoking sponsorships or advertising regarding tobacco, as advocated by the anti-smoking lobby, Shelia Day seconds, the motion passes.

Cal mentions that we are looking for an RV park host. Talks to the need for such a person in exchange or a free space. That person will collect fees and generally look after things for the 14 spaces available. Cal mentions that we may have a suitable candidate for the position. We plan to confer with State Industrial as to what conditions and arrangements need to be made to bring this person on. We will be working with county counsel on crafting a contract.
