FAIRGROUNDS

WALKING TOUR OF A walking tour of the fairgrounds began at 7:30 p.m. Fair Board was updated on current plans of the 4-H Leaders to upgrade and use the 4-H dorm building. Plans call for reroofing, regrouting, painting, and landscaping. The dorm will be used by 4-Hers during the 1980 Fair.

> Manure dump will be rebuilt with two extension wings running north and south from a back to back U shaped area.

> The loading shute can be used - the loading area is presently overrun with vehicular use creating congestion. An area needs to be established to restrict misuse, encourage prompt useage, and exit with minimal damage to the grassy areas.

Area around washrack needs to be raked smooth and graveled.

Swine loading ramp needs repair.

Rodeo Board work area shows construction in progress. Bleachers should have hand rail installed on lower portion outer sides.

Returned to office at 8:20 p.m.

ROOFING SSTIMATE

Per request from Hesse, John Book of Hillsboro Roofing made inspection of main exhibit building roof. Leaking occurs from south east valley over kitchen.

Inspection indicated improper installation with fastener positions too far from correct position, no double felting and inadequate rotted plywood replacement. With pitch of roof an acrylic with reflective cooling properties was suggested at a cost of \$1,500 per valley. Each valley would be covered with 3/32" or 30 mil of the material with a 2' section beginning at eave and widening to 20' by gutters' edge. The material is white. If pigment is added, it degenerates quality and guaranteed service is reduced.

For application surfaces must be very clean and dry. Application is made beginning at bottom working product into the roofing system using a 9" roller as someone pours product on roof. No bubbles or holes must remain with product drying in several hours. No rain or product washes away when wet.

Mr. Book was thanked for his presentation.

D.D. RECAP/

Congratulations and appreciation was extended to Joel Lewellen and his crew for the highly successful destruction derby event put on by volunteers. A fine profit was realized for fairgrounds capital improvements. Fourteen have already registered for the August 6 event. Fire department and rescue services have been secured.

A restricted area should be installed to contain pit crew observers; a speaker and better restrooms is needed in the pit area; several changes will be made in the rules and regulations. Concern was mentioned for event staging time. However, adjustment can be made race day to maintain control.

Pflug felt the organization and consistancy throughout were most satisfactory.

Trophies have been ordered and publicity will be sought.

Lewellen requested a letter be sent to drivers with new rules and regulations enclosed. Also an appreciation note to crew would be in order.

4-H CHUCKWAGON

Correspondence was received from Sheila Welton explaining, after last year's concern, her plans for security during the 1980 Pair. A new padlock will be put on the facility. Fair Board wondered if some of the 4-H Chuckwagon profit could be utilized to install lighting in front of the walk-in cooler. Hesse to drop Mrs. Welton a note.

MOTION: MOVED BY AGNES DELASHMUTT, SECONDED BY JERRY PFLUG TO MOVE \$1,925.00 FROM THE OFFICE EQUIPMENT BUDGET LINE ITEM TO EQUIPMENT (513) TO ALLOW PURCHASE OF THE RIDING LAWN MCWER.

Swan requested letters be sent to those participating dealers stating the decision of the Fair Board.

BOARD POLICY ON In a 4-H leader-gram mention was made of a parade featuring 4-Hers PARADES with their projects, clowns and perhaps a band would be held Saturday, August 9 at 7:00 p.m. The Fair Board was unaware of the event.

Because of continuing policy, the Fair Board will meet with Spiess-chaert, 4-H Extension Agent, July 22 at noon to draw a compromise. It is most important the youth in the community are not penalized because of First Amendment radicals.
