CONSENT AGENDA

Wade reported that at this point the financial picture looks good.

Lintz asked about the cash position just prior to fair. Wade said it was a generally low reserve at fair time. Last year's cash reserve was approximately \$140,000 and it takes about \$130,000 to start the fair. Lintz said he was concerned that there would not be a cushion in case of disaster or three days of rain. Otten concurred.

Wade reminded the board that he has repeatedly told them that he has always wanted a \$300,000 cushion and \$400,000 is what the goal should ultimately be for a contingency. He asked to defer the discussion until the budget item in the agenda.

MOTION: MOVED BY KEN LEAHY, SECONDED BY GEORGE OTTEN, TO ACCEPT THE CONSENT AGENDA. MOTION PASSED.

RODEO BOARD

They have not had an official meeting since the Fair Board Executive meeting, January 17. They did meet as a group and explained what had transpired during the Executive Session.

A new national sponsor, Award Design, has been signed. Buckles will be donated for give away during rodeo performances. There is no cash sponsorship.

Williams is working with Tacoma and Longview on a joint sponsorship.

Williams submitted the rodeo budget to Wade and it has been included in the overall fair & rodeo budget as proposed, with some changes in line item totals to cover the items previously covered by the rodeo board checking account. The total rodeo budget is \$101,300. Williams is confident that half will be covered by sponsorships.

He has written the draft horse people, specifically George Horner, asking for another meeting to discuss details of the horse show and rodeo appearances.

Dick's Country Dodge has been signed as a \$5,000 cash sponsor plus radio and TV advertising. An additional \$850 will be given to the various rodeo contractors. The total package should reach approximately \$10,000.

Eleven members of the rodeo board and committee are traveling to Pocatello, ID for the Dodge Circuit Finals. The trip will be paid for from their own pockets.

The rodeo board has been in contact with someone about building a digital sign. This would be used in place of banners. A ready-made digital sign costs \$18,000.

BOOSTERS

Tom Gordon, Booster President, reported the first meeting of the year would be held following the fair board meeting.

4-H HORSE

Joanne Fisher reported the 4-H Horse Superintendent position was still vacant. She is 90% positive Ron Johnson will agree to assume the responsibility. She has promised him a lot of help from 4-H. The judges are booked and the box stalls reserved.

Horse Advisory will meet Tuesday evening. Oxendine said she would phone Bill Peterson to report on the status of the stall reservations.

MARKETING

Lamborn reported she has bid on two national dog shows; one in 1999 and a Basenji National Show in the year 2000. The dog shows are lucrative and have low maintenance associated with them.

Lamborn has been working on a new database computer program.

John Duvall, Glencoe Bingo, is encouraged with the Tuesday night attendance figures. Tonight is their first Wednesday night and Duvall is aware that he will have to do extra marketing for Wednesday nights.

Lamborn passed out a tally of the 4-H business for the month of January. \$808.50 was comped to 4-H for the month.

An inquiry was made regarding the new floor machine. It has been used and Lamborn assumes it is doing a good job since she has not been informed otherwise.

MAINTENANCE

Wold gave this month's report. He has been re-building the 28th St. reader board and has changed the lettering from "Fairgrounds" to "Fair Complex". He has also been refurbishing the Cloverleaf entrance and it will soon read "Fair Complex". Wold has also been repairing the gazebo fence, has re-rocked the RV park, and helped install lock boxes on the RV electrical boxes. He has also been assisting Jim Jordan with the renovation of the van donated by the Boosters. The van will be used as a mobile shop.

Jordan has primarily serviced vehicles and worked on the shop van. Earl Bemis is involved with building maintenance including painting and plumbing repairs. The Arts & Crafts bathroom ceilings caved in from a broken water pipe.

Jerry Wood and Albert Flanagan have kept busy with events. Water is being pumped out of and away from the ME building. Wold has located a source for sand bags should the need arise. Leahy suggested getting the bags and he would have a load of sand delivered.

The ME Building roof still leaks in one corner. Bemis is in contact with the contractor who is waiting for a dry stretch of weather as part of the roof may have to be replaced.

BONNIE HAYS

She attended the two-day special session in Salem. Because of a \$78 million shortage in lottery revenues, the short list of projects, including the Fair Complex, were not funded.

Hays met with the legislators just prior to the special session and reminded them of the project. House Majority Leader, Bev Clarno, and Representatives John Meek and Repine worked hard on the Fair Complex's behalf.

Representative Tom Brian is working with the Governor's office on a couple of special projects. He is trying to keep the special list together as the number one project on the list, a \$15 million tuition buy-down for the state universities, will not go away and he feels will eventually be funded. If the list is kept together there is a chance for the funding of all five projects. She is looking for more information from Brian as to the status of the "Package of 5".

Hays is continuing to work on the grant requests and with Senator Hatfield's office.

Lintz asked if it would be helpful if all fair board members went to Salem and spoke on behalf of the project, or signed letters, prepared by Hays, and sent to Hatfield. He also suggested an educational tie-in where excess revenues go to education.

Hays replied that if there is any occasion when the fair board could be assured of a hearing then yes, a trip to Salem would be worthwhile, and yes, letters would be helpful. She has focused the funding package with tie-ins to transportation and education using Ed-Net and the facility as a hands-on laboratory for students of technology.

Lintz stated that if the new building could generate excess debt service the dollars could be rolled back into local schools if this would help to get funding.

Hays received a letter of refusal from Phil Knight of Nike. She is going back to him with clarification of the proposal since he apparently misunderstood what was asked. Intel is still waiting for the building shell and then they'll provide in-house assistance with designing telecommunications.

Lintz suggested getting a letter of use commitment from Intel and other high tech companies to take to possible lenders to show the financial potential of the facility. The new Dawson Creek businesses should also be solicited.

SPEEDWAY RACING

Lamborn was asked at the January meeting to get additional information from the group wanting to do speedway racing in the arena. The group is willing to put down a large damage deposit, but feel no damage will be done.

Sound checks of the motorcycles have been done and they are well within the decibel level regarded by the city. The racing is loud but due to the short duration of the races very few complaints have been received by the Auburn, CA fairgrounds where another group races.

The races would not begin until after fair as the group is very aware of the community usage of the arena.

Wold and Lamborn have discussed the equipment necessary to return the arena to a condition suitable for horses. A landscape rake has been purchased which will help with the arena maintenance.

Lamborn recommended trying the speedway racing since they have worked so hard to comply with the requirements as set down by the fair board. She has contacted Clark County where they currently race in an enclosed building.

Otten inquired if city or county permits will be needed. Wade responded that normally permits are not required, but if the surrounding community complains too much about the noise a permit may be required.

The net income from the races would be \$400 for each use plus the food and beer sales. All fairgrounds' hard costs would also be covered. Lintz did not feel that the income was worth the risk of a negative public.

Other fair board members and Wade agreed that noise and the public perception were key areas of concern. Wade stated that if the Fair Complex wished to go out on another bond issue the support of the neighbors was especially important. All surrounding precincts in the previous election had supported the Fair Complex.

MOTION: MOVED BY GEORGE OTTEN AND SECONDED BY LINDA GRAY, TO DENY THE REQUEST. MOTION PASSED.

RODEO BOARD REQUESTS AS DISCUSSED IN EXECUTIVE SESSION JANUARY 17, 1996

MOTION: MOVED BY DAVID LINTZ, SECONDED BY LINDA GRAY, TO ACCEPT AS DISCUSSED IN EXECUTIVE SESSION. MOTION PASSED.

APPROVAL OF LIGHT RAIL & PARK & RIDE

Tri-Met has requested the fair board approve the location of the park & ride station. The reason it was not signed earlier is because the letter also referenced the dirt.

In a meeting with Tri-Met February 6, John Baker said the fair board will be receiving an agreement to purchase the dog leg in two weeks.

Lintz recommended waiting to sign the approval request until the agreement arrives and there is a firm commitment to purchase the land.

Wade briefly discussed the drainage lines and the possible upgrade of them. He is paranoid that the City has to up size the drainage line near the light rail line and the City will expect the fairgrounds to pay the bill.

Leahy suggested continuing the discussion at the next meeting. By then there will a completed drainage system design for the park and ride and an overlay can be done on the as built.

Wade agreed, and asked if Leahy had gotten a hold of the people at OTAK. Leahy said the wrong person contacted him and he will pursue getting a hold of the proper contact.

Lintz asked Wade to send a letter to Tri-Met telling them the fair board wants a purchase offer for the property prior to a signing of the site agreement. Copies should be sent to Tom Walsh and Jeff Larkin, the county consultant.

1996-97 BUDGET APPROVAL

Wade presented the 1996-97 budget for approval. The proposed budget is almost in line with the 1995-96 budget. There are a few new line items to account for RV park rent, horse stall rentals, amphitheater concession sales, and petty cash.

Wade expects a 25% decrease in attendance at the 1996 Air Show and has reduced the budget line item accordingly. He also decreased the state revenue line item because of lottery revenue loss.

Board members, Leahy, Lintz, and Otten, expressed concern about the cash-on hand line item. They thought this was a "cushion" beyond the operating budget. To start-up fair the contingency funds are drawn on, but a good fair can cover the expenses early and also a large hotel/motel check is due to in August.

As far as a savings account over and above the contingency or cash carry forward that is simply not the case. Wade emphatically reminded the board that he has always been uncomfortable about having the line item around \$200,000 and has been actively working to increase the amount to between \$300,000 and \$400,000. He reminded the board that he has always expressed this when discussing major expenditures.

Otten asked what would be done if there was a bad fair and there is no cash to cover expenses. Wade replied that the fair would have to borrow from the county or a bank until the hotel/motel tax money was deposited. In years' past the fair board members borrowed the money and guaranteed the loan with their own money.

Leahy asked if the county had been contacted about a line of credit, and if not, recommended Wade to ask them.

On the expense side personnel/OPE costs are up due to salaries and SAIF.

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The rodeo budget reflects a new line item for petty cash. The \$9,000 petty cash request has been re-allocated into different line items where expenses occur.

Fair entertainment main stage is down to \$100,000 and bingo is a conservative projection.

The only item that must be paid out of the capital outlay line item is the \$56,000 land payment for Quadrant.

MOTION: MOVED BY DAVID LINTZ, SECONDED BY KEN LEAHY, TO ACCEPT THE BUDGE. MOTION PASSED.

Wade noted he will present a revised budget in September or October.

HORSE STALL CONSTRUCTION

Gray requested a budget line item for the portable horse stall construction in the east barn. She also asked that some of the revenue generated from storage in the barn be put into the fund.

Thomas reminded her that if this was done for the horse barns the same consideration would have to be given to the dairy, beef, poultry, and rabbit groups whose barns are used for storage during the winter.

Oxendine said that fifty-nine portable stalls have been rented for fair. All of them are rented plus the majority of the fairground's old box stalls. Rental monies from the old box stalls will go into a special fund for the stall construction. Also some revenue will be shifted from the Grounds Associated Costs line item because the stalls are used for the Showcase of Horses.

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Lintz suggested allocating certain fees toward the construction of the stalls and seeding the account with \$20,000. Wade replied that Lintz could find the money out of the budget.

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MOTION: MOVED BY DAVID LINTZ, SECONDED BY LINDA GRAY, TO CREATE A LINE ITEM FOR PORTABLE STALLS AND TO PLAN IN THAT DIRECTION. MOTION PASSED.

Wade inquired if this item should be added for the next year's budget. Lintz replied that the board is committed to do it and the line item could be re-visited when the budget is revised. The line item should reflect \$0 for start-up purposes. Lintz said that this at least shows the board is aware and concerned of the safety issues surrounding horse fair.

WFA AWARD

The 1995 fair was awarded an Honorable Mention Award for Creative Management from the Western Fairs Association.

RODEO BOARD APPOINTMENTS

At the previous meeting the recommendation was made to increase the board from five to nine directors. Lintz said he understands the need for additional directors to chair the various committees associated with the rodeo board.

The rodeo board submitted its recommendations for the vacancies on the board. They were Marlene Spadt and Fred Boyles re-appointed for three year terms, new director for a three year term, Claude Warner, John Robinson for a two year term, and Larry Gast and Cody Fienhaur for one year terms.

Leahy said he has looked at the applications and was not familiar with some who had applied. He recommended accepting the directors as submitted by the rodeo board and sending a letter to the other applicants inviting them to serve on the committee as associate members to better judge their interest level.

He further recommended letting the rodeo board choose their own chairman as the fair board does not know the rodeo board members as well.

Lintz stated the rodeo board should carefully consider who will be the person interfacing with the office staff or rotate the position. He does not want to see a repeat of last year and continued fighting between the two.

Williams guaranteed the communication from the rodeo board will be better.

MOTION: MOVED BY DAVID LINTZ TO ACCEPT THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE RODEO BOARD AND THE STRUCTURE. GRAY ADDED: AND LET THE RODEO BOARD ELECT THEIR CHAIRMAN. MOTION SECONDED BY GEORGE OTTEN.

DISCUSSION: Wade strongly reminded the fair board that in the case of Fred Boyles the fair board is going against the county harassment policy. The harassment issue has yet to be settled and by reappointing Boyles the fair board is in direct violation of the policy. He further stated he has asked Boyles to resolve the problem and Boyles has never gotten back to him. Wade said he (Wade) has the responsibility to make the fair board aware of this.

Lintz said he doesn't think this is accurate and asked Wade to speak with County Counsel.

Leahy said there should have been a letter from County Counsel in the board's packets if this was true. Wade replied that he thought the board understood. Thomas asked if Leahy wanted a letter from County Counsel.

Wade suggested appointing the eight members as recommended and getting a reaffirmation from County Counsel on the Boyles issue. If Wade has misunderstood the policy the fair board can then appoint Boyles at the next meeting.

Williams strongly suggested appointing Boyles now and then reaffirming with County Counsel or the rodeo board will cease all work on the rodeo.

Lintz said to get a simple statement from John Junkin, County Counsel, that Boyle's presence on the rodeo board is a problem due to the harassment policy.

QUESTION: MOTION AMENDED BY LINTZ TO APPROVE THE RECOMMENDATION SUBJECT TO JUNKIN'S OPINION THAT BOYLES CAN OR CAN NOT BE A MEMBER OF THE RODEO BOARD. SECONDED BY LEAHY. MOTION PASSED.

Wade's review was postponed until next month due to a conflict Leahy had.

Meeting adjourned at 7:15 p.m.
