



Re: June 30, 2003 Financial Statements

Find attached the June 30, 2003, Financial Statements. The following is a brief explanation of each major revenue and expenditure category

State Funds and Dedicated Funds – Both of theses revenues sources showed decreases (\$78,000) for fiscal year ended June 30, 2003. Dedicated Funds (Hotel Taxes) showed the largest decrease with more than \$75,000 less than budgeted.

Interim Income – This revenue category exceeded budget estimates by approximately \$25,000 despite the loss of the BINGO lease in December.

Fair Income – This revenue category exceeded budget estimates by approximately \$7,000.

Interim Shows - These revenues (loan proceeds) are related to the upcoming Frite Lites.

Total Personnel – This expenditure category was less than budgeted by approximately \$15,000. Saving were realized by full-time staff reductions.

Interim Operations – This expenditure category was less than budgeted by approximately \$26,000 although some individual expenditure categories exceeded budget estimates.

Fair Operations – This expenditure category exceeded the budget by approximately \$9,500 with much of the overage related to Corporate Picnic program which generated additional fairtime revenues.

Exhibits/Competitions – This expenditure category was less than budgeted by approximately \$13,000 due primarily with lower premium payouts in the open classes.

Rodeo – This expenditure category was less than budgeted by approximately \$5,000.

Shows & Entertainment – This expenditure category was slightly more than budget (\$151) with most of the overage related to the cost of adding a Friday night concert (Carrot Top).

Interim Shows – This expenditure category represents purchases related to the upcoming Frite Lite activities.

Capital Outlay – This expenditure category was less than budgeted by approximately \$4,000 despite the additional development costs (\$10,000) related to the November 2002 Ballot Measure.

Summary – The FYE 6/30/03 budget projected a net loss of \$50,809 and despite reductions in State Funds and Dedicated Funds of more than \$78,000 and a late adjustment by the County of more than \$36,000 in our Hotel Tax receipts, a net loss of \$49,763 was realized. This amount is less than the FYE 6/30/02 loss of \$81,094 and for FYE 6/30/04, a slight profit is projected.



Funding cuts, office closure result in changes

The projected cut in state funding for the OSU Extension Service and closure of the Multnomah County Extension office translate into some changes in staffing the Washington County Extension office. One of the changes is in the Staff Chair position. As of August 1, Chal Landgren Forestry faculty, will be serving as 40% Staff Chair, 30% Forestry in Washington County, and 30% Forestry in Columbia County. Other changes will be felt in the 4-H Youth Development and Family and Community Development programs. John Baggott, who was 40% administration and 60% 4-H, will be serving 4-H full time and Jeanne Brandt, who has been working 100% with John in 4-H, will leave 4-H and take on the Family and Community Development position October 1.

OSU Nutrition Program Staff Moving to Washington County

Janice Smiley, Extension faculty, Marina Boyko, Nutrition Education Assistant, and Lee IIa Lewis, program support, will be relocating to Washington County from the Multnomah County Extension Office due to their closure July 31, 2003. The decision was made in early July to move the federally funded Expanded Food and Nutrition Education (EFNEP) grant to Washington, Clackamas, and Marion counties. EFNEP funding is earmarked for low-income families with young children, and helps participants learn how to choose nutritious foods and eat a more nutritious diet when money is limited.

Janice has 25 years experience with OSU Extension Service. Marina, originally from Ukraine, has worked with Extension for three years, focusing her nutrition education programs to Russian-speaking families in Multnomah, Clackamas, and Marion counties. Lee Ila has 23 years extension experience, most recently as the 4-H secretary in Multnomah County.



Nutrition program staff will initially be spending time getting to know Washington County and meeting with agency partners currently working with limited-resource families. Program planning and plans of work will be designed based on needs identified in Washington County communities.

OSU Extension Agronomist for County Field Crops Programs

Susan Aldrich-Markham, Extension Agronomist in Yamhill and Polk counties, will add Washington County to her area of responsibility. She will work primarily with the commercial producers of the field crops – grass and clover seeds, grains and forages. Her work includes conducting on-farm research with cooperating growers, writing publications, and delivering educational programs for growers on crop production, weed control, and pesticide applicator training.

Susan has been a faculty member of OSU Extension for 20 years, based in McMinnville the past 14 years. She was recently promoted to Professor of Crop and Soil Science. One of her research projects, ongoing for five years, is an effort to find management practices that growers can use to reduce soil erosion on newly planted grass seed fields.



Pat Whiting served as a State Representative in 1973 and was instrumental in creating SB 100. She is still a leader in the Metzger area CPO.



Liles Garcia received the Harold M. Haynes Citizen Involvement Award for complete dedication to involving citizens in his community. Liles is a resident of Aloha and has been a leader in CPO 6 for many years. He has a comprehensive command of land use regulation and process and shares his knowledge with community residents on a regular basis.

CPO Program Honors Pioneers

In celebration of the 30th anniversary of Oregon's Land Use Program and Citizen Involvement, the Washington County Committee for Citizen Involvement (CCI) honored those pioneer folks who worked to establish the CPO structure. Senate Bill 100, passed in 1973, established the statewide land use goals and Goal 1, Citizen Involvement, was the instrument creating the structure that is part of the County's Comprehensive Plan. Pioneer citizen statesmen and women from all areas of the County remembered the challenges at rewards shared as they created the groundwork for citizen involvement. (see photos, left)

Staff who served the CPO program in the first and formative years were present to share their perspectives and be honored for providing dedication and direction to a program that currently serves over 10,000 Washington County residents.

Logs, Roads, Diseases in Forests Looked At

OSU faculty in Wood Science & Engineering and Washington County Extension recently completed the "Big Log Project." Funding was provided by the Northwest Oregon Economic Alliance. The project was motivated by declining markets for logs larger than approximately 30 inches in diameter. As Oregon's wood products industry has adapted to changes in sources and types of raw material, many mills able to process larger logs have either retooled or closed. As a result, small woodland owners are struggling to find buyers for what were, at one time, premium quality logs. The three primary objectives of the project were to develop a statewide log buyer database (so that buyers and sellers could more readily locate one another); assess the existing supply of large diameter logs from private woodlands; and conduct market research to identify markets for large logs. More detail on the project can be found at http://wood.oregonstate.edu/biglogs/summary.pdf In a nutshell, woodland owners and small-to mid-sized wood products entrepreneurs increasingly find themselves needing to join forces such that each is able to profitably sustain their end of the business.

Around 25 woodland owners recently attended a two-day roads conference in Forest Grove. Identifying problems before they become headaches, minimizing water flow along roads, better culvert sizing and placement, were a few of the topics considered at the Gales Creek field site.

Coming to the CAPITAL Center in September – Applied Forestry in Areas of Disease: Red Alder and Red Cedar Silviculture. This conference will attract forest managers around the Pacific Northwest. Diseases--past, current and coming, are playing a larger role in determining what trees should be planted in the forest. The conference will look at how, where, and what "alternative" species should be planted and managed.

Build Your Own Computer

4-H Mentors Pedro Estrada and Steve Kassel have agreed to offer an additional session of



"Build Your Own Computer" class for Latino parents of school-aged children. The seven-session series will start September 24. Class size will be limited to ten. Sessions will include an overview, assisted shopping trip, installation of OS/drivers, debugging and computer maintenance. Pedro was selected as a national winner of the AT&T Youth Leadership Program. As a part of the program, Pedro had to design and implement a leadership project having to do with technology.

4-H Tech Wizards Receive Grant for GIS

The Oregon 4-H Tech Wizards Club (formerly called the Web Wizards) will soon introduce geographic information systems (GIS) technology to club members following a \$20,000 grant from Intel Corporation in Hillsboro. The grant will support development of a GIS curriculum and pay for global positioning system units and other equipment that club members will use for GIS projects. Participating youth hope to use GIS technology and hand-held GPS units in several projects such as mapping affordable housing sites, tracking wildlife and mapping habitat areas, and mapping walking tours of local historic buildings in cooperation with county land use and sheriff's departments and local school districts.

The 4-H Tech Wizards club is part of the OSU Extension Service 4-H Youth Development Program in Washington County. The club is aimed at Latino youth and introduces members to information/computer technology and web page design, with the goal of helping them succeed in school and life.

Staff continues to provide overall clean up after the County Fair & Rodeo including spraying Virkon throughout the barns.

Staff has been experiencing more repairs and service related activities with their vehicles and motorized equipment. Most recently, this has included the 1994 Ford Pickup, 1967 Water Truck, 1991 Dodge Pickup, JD Utility Vehicle (Gator), Ford Riding Lawnmower, and John Deere Tractor.

Much of this equipment, critical to our day-to-day activities, will be assessed over the next few months to determine possible replacements or major overhauls. It is doubtful whether the 1967 Water Truck will be operable much longer necessitating a new strategy to support interim and fairtime uses. Serious thought is being given to replace on-grounds gasoline-powered transport vehicles (pickups) with battery-power vehicles due to the short distances traveled, excess wear-and-tear on combustible engines and the cost of fuel.

The Facilities Repair Worker position, vacant from the resignation of Kelly Goodin, should be filled soon. This position is being filled on a part-time basis for the time being.

Re: Update on Frite Lites

The light displays arrived in early August and were inventoried and unloaded by the staff from Lights for All Seasons with the assistance of our Maintenance Team members. Work is scheduled to begin on Wednesday, September 3, on the part of the project that involves "light lining" all of the buildings. That portion, alone, involves 110, 100-ft. strings of lights. The current schedule has the displays starting to go up the week of September 22nd.

A revised pro-forma has been prepared for the event (see attached.) With the acquisition of a title sponsor, we have seen an increase in our revenue projections beyond what we expected, but we've also seen some additional production costs that tie-in with having a title sponsor. Coupled with that is a clearer picture of some of the additional needs of the event beyond what we could predict back in April when we began the project. We are still being very conservative, trying to project our costs in a "worst-case" scenario to keep the event still showing a net profit in the end.

The finishing touches are being put on the website, www.fritelites.com, which will provide all of the details about the event and will be linked to our regular facility website. The Bi-Mart Frite Pass will be available at all area Bi-Mart stores within the next several weeks. For \$18.00, Bi-Mart cardholders can purchase the pass, which enables 2 adults and 2 youth ages 18 and under, to visit the event multiple times. We are confident that families will visit the event at least twice, coming the first time to initially see it, and then returning for the trick-or-treat activities on Halloween.

During the Oregon International Airshow, those who park at the Fair Complex will receive as their payment stub, a flyer advertising Frite Lites, that is also a "Buy One-Get One Free" admission coupon for the event. Our intention is to not only publicize Frite Lites to the Airshow crowd, but to also give them an incentive to attend the event.

The Hillsboro Argus has signed a one-year media trade sponsorship, providing \$4,000 worth of advertising space in exchange for sponsor benefits.




Re: Cottonwood Trees

Staff has provided commentary over the last year regarding four cottonwood trees lining the main walkways south of the Main Exhibit Hall; two cottonwood trees near the pony ride and petting farm; and eleven cottonwood trees adjacent to the amphitheatre and Floral Building.

The commentary included recent costs to have these trees trimmed and ongoing public safety concerns since the cottonwoods continue to shed large limbs. Case in point, during the month of July, two larges limbs were shed; one just off the walkway adjacent to the Main Exhibit Hall during the All Breed Dog Show; and one next to the petting farm during the 2003 Washington County Fair & Rodeo. As can be witnessed by the attached photos, limbs this large can be a hazard to public safety.

Accordingly, staff requested that the Washington County Facilities Division provide a preliminary report regarding these tree species and their characteristics, health and a hazard assessment. The attached report provides some commentary as to developing a yearly maintenance and replacement program.

Based upon this preliminary report, staff requests permission to develop a plan for the maintenance and systematic removal of the trees, concentrating any removal efforts for those cottonwood trees that present the highest hazard to public safety. It is obvious to staff that the most trees presenting the highest hazard to the public are the four cottonwood trees south of the Main Exhibit Hall and those adjacent to the pony rides and petting zoo.

Objectives/Scope of Work

It is the objective of this report to evaluate the current condition and future risk of the Black Cottonwoods (Populus trichocarpa) throughout the Washington County Fair Complex.

Method of Tree Assessment

Due to the time constraint placed on the production of this report, I will address general characteristics of the tree's species, community tree health and hazard target assessment.

This evaluation was conducted through Visual Tree Assessment technique. The evaluation was made at ground level without a canopy, root zone or tree core extraction examination. This assessment should be considered within the limits of those parameters.

I will address the Fair Complex Cottonwood population as a whole and not each tree on an individual basis. A more thorough examination can and should be conducted if it is decided that the trees are to remain.

Based on these factors, recommendations will be created that will focus on the current and anticipated health of the trees, the intrinsic value of the trees, possible liability concerns and future replacement or maintenance suggestions.

Recommendations

Through visual assessment the trees appear to be in normal or average condition for Cottonwoods at this stage of maturity.

Based on the current health and structural condition of the trees there is no justification for immediate and complete removal of the trees.

Unfortunately, this does not guarantee that the trees will not continue to shed limbs and present a potential liability. Limbs will continue to fall. The structure of Cottonwood trees allows a natural limb failure rate to occur even without defects and there can never be a guarantee of complete safety.

I feel the issue to be addressed is that Black Cottonwoods are not suited to the Fair Complex environment. The presence of high risk target zones involving Public safety and property damage will always present a potential liability.

My recommendations are as follows:

Institute a yearly tree maintenance program. This program should incorporate annual tree assessment and hazard reduction pruning.
 This risk management program establishes strategies for continuously evaluating and monitoring trees that pose a risk and defining what level of care is reasonable for a community.
 I would recommend that a private consultant develop and participate in the implementation of this plan.

The Fair Complex staff must demonstrate that "reasonable care" has been applied to tree risk management.

I would further suggest that Fair staff contact Washington County Counsel to determine a definition of "reasonable care" regarding tree maintenance.

2. Institute a yearly tree replacement program. This program should incorporate tree planting with tree removal and should be completed over an extended and predetermined time span. This program should be instituted incrementally to minimize the loss of the benefits these mature trees provide i.e. cooling shade, wildlife habitat, and the unique wooded environment valued by the Public.

A gradual, systematic tree replacement program could help to minimize the Public's reaction to the tree removal process but would eventually eliminate the problem prone Cottonwoods.

I feel that by following these recommendations the life span of the existing trees could be extended, the liability and risk could be reduced and more suitable trees could be integrated into the Fair Complex environment.

Re: 2003 Washington County Fair & Rodeo Wrap-up

A number of changes were implemented for the 2003 Washington County Fair & Rodeo and despite a soft economy and plethora of competing events in the area, this year's edition attracted approximately 44,000 fairgoers and 4,200 rodeo fans.

Despite the best efforts of staff and volunteers, developing programs that will attract a broad segment of Washington County residents continues to be a challenge. Here is the staff's assessment of this year's fair and some thoughts for 2004:

- 1. Rodeo The rodeo proved again to be a popular event. Challenged by a general admission charge for the first time in many years, crowds were strong for the two evening performances with the Saturday performance attracting more than 1,700 paid admissions.
- 2. Friendship Plaza Creating multiple family-type events in a central area seemed to be well received. This area was anchored by the alligator show and included the Jest-in-Time Circus, Fish Prints, Brad's Reptile World and gem club activities.
- 3. National Anthem Tryouts This first-time event to capture more pre-fair publicity was well received and was covered by *The Oregonian*.

4. FFA Landscape Gardens – Funded in part by a grant from the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce Air Show Funds, these gardens were a great addition to the Main Gate Plaza.

- 5. Static Exhibits Relocation Combining the arts, crafts and photos exhibits in the south end of the Main Exhibit Hall with the grange exhibits and textiles created a more interesting area.
- 6. Main Stage Relocation The presence of live music east of the Main Exhibit Hall helped bring a more festive atmosphere to the area and although sound levels did compete with other venues, these issues can be mediated with a different stage orientation and the downsizing of the PA system.
- 7. 34th Avenue Parking Moving cars quickly in to the parking lots off 34th Avenue continues to be an issue. A revised strategy must be considered for 2004.
- 8. 4H Horse Show Having this major event end five days before the opening of the County Fair & Rodeo puts an undue burden on pre-fair preparations. An additional week between the end of the 4H Horse Show and the County Fair should be considered.
- 9. Shavings Management This year saw a considerable increase in the amount of shavings used by exhibitors, which in turn results in increased disposal fees.
- 10. Pre-Fair Promotion Given the concerns from neighbors along Main Street, thought should be given to move the event to a different venue or develop another pre-fair promotion.

THOUGHTS FOR 2004:

- 1. Rodeo Efforts should continue to balance the cost of this event with the audience it serves. The current seating capacity of approximately 2,500 will continue to limit the events revenue potential.
- 2. Headliner Entertainment Continue to provide affordable 'free' entertainment. This will likely not include so called 'big-name' national acts unless the cost of such entertainment is offered at significant discounts, and with lower production costs.
- 3. Friendship Plaza Continue to program multiple events in this area that will entertain the entire family with segments or events programmed on the hour.
- 4. Evening Theming Create a nightly theme to enhance the overall visitor's experience such as a Hawaiian, Mardi Gras or carnival' theme.
- 5. Customer Comfort Issues Add more covered seating areas and establish diaper-changing areas to increase customer comforts while on-grounds.



Don't take my question wrong, great job on the Fair this year - we look forward to attending next year.





The changes continue at the ▼ From Our Advertiser Bi-Mart Washington County Fair and Rodeo, the newest installment of which runs July 24-27.

Visitors will see a few less structures at the fair complex this year, as well as a new main stage and restaurant. And rodeo fans will notice an added fee to see the Parr Lumber PRCA Rodeo on July 25-26.

The lineup will feature a few new attractions, like Swampmaster's Gator Show

and an antique tractor exhibit; and some familiar faces, like hypnotist Terry Stokes and Brad's World Reptiles. Evening concerts will include the Little River Band, Avalon, Johnny Limbo and the Lugnuts and Hit Explosion.

It's all part of rebuilding the fair into a diverse attraction in a competitive market, said Don Hillman, fair complex executive director. "The competition is so different than it was years ago," he said. "You've got

maybe 30 other events going on that weekend."

Several of the traditional events will be back, including the 4x4 truck pull on July 24, the draft horse plowing show on July 26 and the demolition derby on July 27. The Funtastic Carnival will operate throughout the fair, offering free rides on July 25.

Competition, costs and the structural health of the complex have led to some of the bigger changes. The PRCA Rodeo takes up a large part of the budget, so the Fair Board (at Hillman's recommendation) decided to charge an extra admission fee this year.

A grandstand ticket will cost \$7 this year, up from \$5. All other rodeo seating will cost \$4. That's in addition to the \$7 to get into the fair (\$4 for kids and seniors) and \$4 parking fee.

"To maintain the quality that PRCA requires -- the best cowboys, the best stock, we had to boost the cost," Hillman said, adding that the fair spends about \$120,000 on the rodeo alone. "That's still less than if you went to a stand-alone rodeo, like St. Paul or Mollala, where the cheapest ticket is \$12."

The complex has seen four buildings come down as well: the arts and crafts building, the "restaurant row" building where St. Matthews Catholic Church had its food operation, the old log cabin and the old county jail. All had structural problems, Hillman said.

St. Matthews will be relocated to the "chuck wagon" building, next to their old location. The trusses of the arts and crafts building will remain; a shade cloth will go over them and DeAngelo's Catering will set up a bar and grill-type restaurant in the space.

The main stage and 1,500 seats will be next to the restaurant. Evening concerts will be held there and local bands will perform on the stage in the afternoon. All concerts will be free with fair admission.

The DeMar Bachelor Amphitheater will still be used for street dances on Friday and Saturday, and a Hispanic concert on Sunday afternoon.

Arts and crafts will be located in the south half of the Main Exhibit Hall, along with the baked goods, said Fair Coordinator Leah Perkins.

Why should Washington County's citizenry come to the fair this year? "It's tradition," Hillman said. "There's everything for the family experience, from rides to animals to food it's a summertime tradition, part of Americana."

Is the Washington County Fair endangered?

Organizers of the Multnomah County Fair say the 97-year-old event may be canceled next year because of the closure of that county's Oregon State University Extension Office and 4-H Club program. Budget cuts have caused the curtailments.

In Washington County, the 78-year-old fair has been scaled back in the past few years to four days. Although the county's 4-H and Extension programs seem healthy, fair leaders have looked for ways to expand the event's appeal, including pushing for big-name entertainment and promotional tactics such as a cattle drive through Hillsboro.

The Fair Board also has eliminated free days for senior citizens and children, increased parking fees and increased admission to the rodeo while lowering prize money.

As the county becomes less rural and more urban, do you think the fair should shift its emphasis from agriculture to high-tech? Do you think Washington County's fair is in danger of dying out? Do you attend the fair? What things would you like to see change, or always remain the same?

The quilt was born April 10, the day Marge Bybee died.

It had to live for Mason, her 82-year-old husband. He missed his Margie dearly.

A niece, 52-year-old Debbie Gravley, knew this. A memory quilt, she thought, might salve his broken heart.

Gravley of Gaston paid \$100 for 20 yards of nautical red, white and blue fabric. Uncle Mason was a career U.S. Navy man.

Then she paid \$75 for ink to print 25 family pictures onto cream-colored fabric using a computer. Every memory counted, from the wedding portrait of Marge and Mason to pictures of their daughters and grandchildren.

Gravley fed what seemed like miles of fabric under the needle of her mother's sewing machine, then secured each square with tidy hand-sewn running stitches.

She finished just days before the queen-size quilt was due for judging at the fair.

Today Gravley will bring Uncle Mason to the fair, where he will first learn of the quilt's existence.

Blue ribbon or not, Gravley expects that moment to be the keeper.

THE CORN DOGS

%%bodybegins%%A hand-dipped hot dog on stick, not to be confused with the less prestigious frozen corn dog, begins in the grocery store.

Here, each morning for the four-day run of the fair, Lynne Johnson of Hillsboro will buy 20 boxes of beef hot dogs, each holding 100 wieners.

The dogs travel by truck to the fairgrounds. It's just a matter of time, maybe minutes, before each 2-ounce cylinder is poked with a sharp round stick.

After that, it's batter time, with every dog taking a rub-a-dub-dub in Johnson's secret family recipe batter, before being gently placed into blistering oil for a two-minute fry.

The \$2.25 dog then bids Johnson and her crew adieu, landing in the hands of some salivating customer.

A mustard or ketchup squirt later, that hot dog's history.



"I tell a lot of men they should order two, because they'll be back," says 55-year-old Johnson, whose grandparents and parents all sold hand-dipped hot dogs on a stick.

"And when the men come back for a second dog," Johnson says, "I tell them, 'I told you so.' "

seniors (children under 5 get in free). Admission today is \$5 with a Bi-Mart coupon. Bi-Mart also has \$10 season passes, which are good throughout the fair.

PRCA Rodeo times are 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday, with a Saturday afternoon show at 1:30 p.m. General admission tickets are \$4 and grandstand tickets are \$7, in addition to the \$7 gate fee.

Parking will cost \$4 per car, or \$3 for a car with four or more people in it. Those who would rather not drive can take Westside MAX to the Fair Complex/Airport station, and a shuttle will take them to the gate.

The Funtastic Carnival will greet kids with a slew of rides, all of which will be free from 10 a.m.-noon on Friday.

Fair-goers will notice some changes from last year. The arts and crafts building is gone; in its place is an outdoor bar-and-grill restaurant run by DeAngelo's Catering of Tigard. Nearby will be the new main stage.

The new main stage will replace the DeMar Bachelor Amphitheater as the evening concert venue. "Our idea was to get it in a more centralized area, so people are aware of the music as they come in," said Lisa DuPr, marketing director for the fair. "We wanted a more festive atmosphere as soon as they get in the gate."

The restaurant will feature beer and wine, burgers, sausages, ribs and pies, said owner Steve DeAngelo. "There will be preferential seating and great visibility of the entertainment," DeAngelo said. "We'll have umbrellas and a picket fence courtyard-type environment. With the proximity to the music, it'll be a nice setting."

Also new to the fair will be Swampmaster's Gator Show, which will perform several times a day, as well as an antique tractor exhibit and judging.

Several familiar faces will be on hand as well. Brad's World Reptiles will make a return appearance, as well as the Jest In Time Circus of Fools and hypnotist Terry Stokes. All will perform multiple times each day.

The Friendship Square State presented by Bruce Chevrolet will feature local talent throughout the fair, and other bands will play on the Corona Blues and Brews stage all four days.

Evening concerts will include classic rockers The Little River Band at 8:30 p.m. Thursday, Christian group Avalon at 7:30 p.m. Friday, the familiar Johnny Limbo and the Lugnuts at 3:45 p.m. and 7:15 p.m. Saturday, and Hit Explosion at 3:45, 5:30 p.m. and 7:15 p.m. on Sunday.

The amphitheater won't go unused, though. Jammin 95.5 FM will host a Street Jam there at 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, and an afternoon of Hispanic music will begin at 2 p.m. Sunday.

Other crowd-pleasing events, like the 4x4 Truck Pull and the Demolition Derby, will be back as well. The truck pull will be held at 7 p.m. tonight in the rodeo arena, the draft horse driving show at 3:30 p.m. Saturday and the demolition derby at 2 p.m. Sunday.

All entertainment, except the rodeo, is free with fair admission.

More than anything else, fair-goers will find the same tradition at the four-day event, said Executive Director Don Hillman. "There's everything for the family experience, from rides to animals to food it's a summertime tradition, part of Americana."

Wading with gators Jeff Quattrocchi's one-man alligator show plays this weekend at the Washington County Fair & Rodeo in Hillsboro

HILLSBORO J eff Quattrocchi liked to do this show-stopper in his act, where he waved his hand quickly through an alligator's open mouth -- without getting chomped.

And he got pretty good at it, the 38-year-old says.

"I'd done it 3,000 times before, and never been bit," Quattrocchi says, "but this gator was fast. I was in front of an audience, when his jaws came down on my finger. I just turned to the audience, my finger bleeding, and said, 'Got me!' "

Quattrocchi lost a fingertip in that show, the second he's sacrificed to a gator. Altogether, he's been bitten 12 times, once for every year he's been in the business.

Nowadays, he saves the "show stopping" stunt for something special, such as David Letterman's stupid pet tricks.

Instead, he focuses his energies on his one-man Swampmaster's Alligator Show, which appears three times daily through Sunday at the 2003 Bi-Mart Washington County Fair & Rodeo.

Don't get all pumped up, thinking you're going to see gator wrestling. Quattrocchi gets in a shallow pool with a 7-foot alligator that hisses and snaps and thrashes about, trying to leave tooth marks on his leg.

And, yes, Quattrocchi grabs the gator's tail, and straddles its scaly back, before using his Tarzanlike muscles to clamp its snout shut.

But it's obvious Quattrocchi knows what he's doing. And his act's more about education than death-defying feats.

For instance, a few gator facts shared with the 300 or so who jammed the bleachers Thursday: Alligators grow about a foot a year until they're 7 feet long, then they grow an inch a year the rest of their lives. Their brains are the size of a quarter. They have 80 teeth and, as Quattrocchi puts it, "can crack a turtle shell like we eat popcorn."

It's not everybody that can be a gator guy. Besides the risk, Quattrocchi's on the road for weeks each year, away from Clearwater, Fla., where he lives with his wife, Andrea, and 7-year-old daughter, Charise.

It was in St. Petersburg, Fla., that he started his career, working the alligator show at a local theme park. Quattrocchi decided to take a similar show on the road, so more people could see it.



He buys alligators at a farm where they're otherwise raised for their hides and made into purses and boots. He captures 10 to 15, and chooses six to seven, wanting good-looking animals.

"Sometimes after I capture them, you see they're missing a leg or part of a tail that's been bit off in a fight," he says.

Quattrocchi replaces his big alligators every four or five weeks, after they figure out they're in an act and quit being aggressive.

"They'll literally shut their eyes and ignore me," he says, adding his retired gators live at a manmade pond in Florida. "And that's not very exciting for the audience."

Ten-year-old Taylor Bernard of Portland thought Thursday's show was plenty exciting -- so exciting he's contemplating a similar career.

"I want to be a crocodile hunter, just like Steve Irwin," the boy says, referring to the chatty Australian host on the Animal Planet cable network.

Quattrocchi wants to be Steve Irwin, too. A traveling alligator show can be wearing; he drove 22 hours straight from his last show in Bozeman, Mont., to Hillsboro.

Ideally, he says, he'd be permanently based, maybe in Las Vegas or Branson, Mo.

"Steve Irwin's done nothing but good for my show," he says. "He's every kid's hero. That sounds like a good life to me."



County fair: pig tales, big cookies, barbecue

HILLSBORO -- A lot of yarns got spun at this year's Bi-Mart Washington County Fair & Rodeo, which ended a people-packed four-day run Sunday.

Best of all is the legend of Penny-Hern.

Leo Duyck tells the story standing in a pig stall at the Swine Barn. He's important, because he's the surgeon, the one who cut Penny-Hern in the barnyard.

The 5-month-old pig belongs to Duyck's 17-year-old daughter, Emily. She bought the Duroc straight from its mama's teat for \$250, a hefty price, given a decent 4-H pig can be bought for 75 bucks.

The Duycks, though, don't want decent. They want grand champions and big bucks in the auction ring.

So imagine that family's surprise watching a hernia pop out the bottom of Penny-Hern.

"She looked like she has an udder, only in the middle of her body," said Leo Duyck, 44, a meat man from Verboort.

Two months ago, Duyck decided to operate, though he'd never operated before. Fortunately his father, Vernon, who had experience, assisted.

They tranquilized Penny-Hern, who then weighed 125 pounds, and two of the four Duyck children held down her hooves. Father and son sliced, shoved the hernia in, stitched. And hoped for the best.

Penny-Hern recuperated quickly, but alas, the hernia returned. And by the first day of the fair, it had gained such proportions it again seemed worthy of milking.

"I'm hoping the judge sees the pig from the back, or from an angle, and doesn't notice," Duyck said.

But the judge had eyes. And a brain. She knew 237-pound Penny-Hern was headed to the slaughterhouse, where the hernia would be cut off and discarded. So she evaluated the rest of the animal, the part carnivores will eventually eat.

A delighted Emily Duyck left the show ring with a blue ribbon.

It's a crazy place, the fair, where it's possible to see anything. Like a large woman in a motorized cart posing for a picture beside a life-size cut-out of President Bush. The Washington County



Republican Party ran the booth where cardboard George stood.

"I'd say four out of five people who stop by want their pictures shot with G.W.," said Republican volunteer Delise Palumbo, who wore red, white and blue, and encouraged posers to hold G.W.'s hand.

Other sights beg stares. Like a chocolate chip cookie the size of a stop sign making its way through the horse barn, a 5-year-old leading the way. Melanie Trask of Aloha baked it from storebought dough for a junior cookie competition. She left gripping a blue ribbon, and \$5, for the largest-diameter cookie.

Tom Marguette also swiveled heads, And he knew it. The Hillsboro man looks like a Hatfield or a McCoy, from kin that feuded 100 years ago.

"I haven't shaved or cut my hair since 1996," said Marquette, 58, whose scruffy gray-brown beard juts lower than his scraggly gray-brown hair.

He stood in a stall between his Belgian mules, Leslie and Lizzie. He's training them to haul a wagon across the Oregon Trail, from Independence, Mo., in 2009, marking Oregon's sesquicentennial.

The unmarried man stores his six saddles in his living room and hides modern conveniences, such as his microwave, from sight.

But he's also a plumber with a cell phone, so make sense of that.

Mosey behind the rodeo arena and watch Pat Bauer, 38, sweat over a giant barbecue. The Aloha man is on the crew that cooks homemade chow for the cowboys -- some feat, since they fed 500 to 600 both Friday and Saturday night.

"It's probably 200 degrees right here," said Bauer Saturday afternoon, two hours into grilling 240 pounds of teriyaki chicken breasts. Gloves and open-toe tube socks sheathed his hands and arms, further enflaming his personal body heat index.

Bauer wouldn't say what deodorant he wears or whether it was working. But he did say he'd volunteered for this abuse for 10 years running.


"My reward is making the cowboys happy," he said, his red face bubbling.


"And I don't even like to sweat!"

Organizers created a family-oriented area in the Friendship Plaza with Quattrocchi's gator show, Brad's World Reptiles exhibit, a fish prints display and the Jest in Time Circus of Fools clown show. Families seemed to enjoy it.

"My favorite was the clown show," said Haley Heynderickx, 10, who went on Friday with her dad Nick and friend Elizabeth Kiefer, 10.

"I liked the dog at the clown show, and the alligator show," Elizabeth chimed in.

What about dad? "Dad just liked watching the kids have fun," Nick Heynderickx said with a smile.

Others weren't so happy about the new main stage near the carnival and main entrance. The evening concerts occurred on that stage, but the noise drowned out other activities -- including the rodeo.

Hillman said the rodeo issued 16 refunds, mainly because of concert noise "bleeding over" into the rodeo. "It's interesting, we're trying to create a fair and rodeo," he said. "To do that, you've got to have a lot of activities going on at the same time. My job is to mediate the noise levels between our partners."

This was the first year the fair had a separate fee for everyone to see the rodeo. Previously, grandstands seats cost \$5 on top of fair admission. This year, the fair charged \$7 for grandstands and \$4 for bleacher seats to cover rodeo-associated costs.

Some people probably weren't happy about that, Hillman said. But, he added, everyone who asked about it seemed satisfied with the explanation.

"The fair is still in a cycle of rebuilding and reinventing itself," he said of the fair overall. "We don't want to go the way of Montgomery Ward or the Multnomah County Fair. We want to keep the traditional elements, but we need to increase interest from the people who don't ordinarily go to the fair."

Fair officials invite builders: Make offers

HILLSBORO --Washington County Fair officials want to make a deal.

They want to build more than 100,000 square feet of exhibition halls, spruce up the fairgrounds with a 2,500-seat arena and create a lush commons with a covered walkway to the nearby lightrail stop.

And they want it all for free.

Encouraging developers to get creative, Fair Board members will issue a call for proposals for the 101-acre fairgrounds as early as next week.

Board members are looking for a public-private partnership in which a developer will design and build the event center in exchange for space, probably on the fairgrounds, to build a business, such as a hotel, theater or shopping center. That business could potentially provide the county with cash flow for years to come.

The call for proposals, which could include selling a portion of the property, is one of few options left for fair officials, after voters turned down a bond measure to pay for the construction in November. Board members say they need better facilities to accommodate the growing fair and attract more money-making activities the rest of the year.

"If we are going to compete with Portland for real money when it comes to convention business, we are going to need a nice facility that can compete," said Rich Vial, a Fair Board member. "We can't compete with just a nice lawn and old cottonwood trees."

Some people have questioned whether builders will bite on the unusual offer during slow economic times. But local developers rave about the location, the high volume of people who already parade through the fairgrounds for a variety of events and the good loan deals that partnerships with government agencies provide.

"There aren't that many projects like this one left around here," said Roy Kim, general manager of Central Bethany Development, adding that a partnership with a government agency often means more time spent planning and designing.

"If I had a project I could start working on now, and know it was about two to three years out, I think this would be the perfect time to start."

Fair officials had hoped to pay for the improvements with a \$40 million bond measure they put before voters in November. They formed a committee to consider ways to expand or improve the 120,000 square feet of covered exposition space that attracts 200,000 people to the fairgrounds annually.



In hopes of bringing larger consumer shows, community events, entertainment, high school graduations and sports tournaments, the committee settled on an 86,000-square-foot main exposition hall with a 50,000-square-foot annex.

It also planned for an arena/amphitheater with seats for as many as 5,500 people, a 125,000square-foot outdoor commons, more parking and \$1 million in renovations to fair buildings.

But voters defeated the bond measure, and board members said they got the message. "People want this," Fair Board Chairwoman Kathy Christy said soon after the election, "They just don't want to pay for it."

Since fall, Fair Board members have worked with Washington County's legal counsel to craft a lengthy, yet vague, request for proposals.

"Proposers are encouraged to seek traditional and nontraditional financing for the proposed modern public exposition facilities," the document said. "The sale of parts or all of the Washington County property . . . is not considered the preferred method of financing," the document continues, "however, a long-term lease is acceptable."

"That's the flexibility we need to maintain," Vial said. "If we absolutely said we wouldn't consider selling, we may eliminate the financing that would otherwise be the key to making this thing work."

Fair officials will hold a meeting for those who have submitted proposals at the fairgrounds Friday, Sept. 5. The deadline for proposals is Oct. 31.

"This packet is very open-ended and that unnerves me," said Sheila Day, a Fair Board member who has watched fair officials try to sell or build on the fairgrounds twice before.

Day also is bothered by a line in the call for proposals that states: "The county and fair, however. are willing to consider proposals that require relocation to another site specified by the proposer."

Day thinks that possibility will upset fair supporters. "Some see this as the only way: to just go out and let private developers do whatever," she said. "I would hope that every opportunity is explored for not giving up land, but I'm worried that won't happen."

Fair Board members will help evaluate all proposals, but ultimately, Washington County Commissioners will decide what happens at the fairgrounds.

The idea of a partnership to build public facilities isn't new. In November, Washington County agreed to sell the old Durham Quarry to developer Opus Northwest for \$10 million in a deal that will bring a ritzy shopping mall and potentially, a steady stream of cash to the county in the future.

Hillsboro partnered with Greg Specht, president of Specht Development of Beaverton, to build the city's \$34 million Civic Center. The city will use as much as \$25 million in tax obligation bonds to pay for the construction, along with savings, money from city departments to be housed in the center and money from the Strategic Investment Program, which the city receives from Intel instead of property taxes.

"Governments nationwide are looking for the private sector to pay portions of projects, and that can work," said Jim Mark, CEO of Melvin Mark Properties, pointing out that governments are attractive to developers for their low bonding rates.

Mark said the fairgrounds could fit perfectly into a niche market, such as suburban hotels. Some top hotel chains have been building cheaper motels in the suburbs that they market as more affordable for family travel.



"It is difficult in this market. There's not a lot of development other than housing and retail that's been so amazing, so incredibly resilient," he said. "You hear real estate is bad and tend to think there isn't a good segment, but this is a unique proposal." Laura Gunderson: 503-294-5958; lauragunderson@news.oregonian.com


