Fisher also reported that at the September 3 Board of Commissioners meeting, county counsel was instructed to write correspondence to the Fair Board and the Washington County Visitors Association concerning a readjustment to withhold funds. John Meek advised that Washington County would be contributing \$20,000 towards a regional study on convention, trade and spectator facilities and that county counsel will be soliciting a \$5,000 contribution from the Fair Board and Visitors Association. The contribution will have to be approved by the Fair Board.

CLOVERLEAF BUILDING UPGRADE

Board members discussed upgrading the Cloverleaf Community Building by putting a parking lot in and by installing dividing doors to the kitchen and storage area. Hesse provided preliminary criteria for applying for lottery funds. She suggested the Cloverleaf Community Building parking lot project may qualify for the grant. Homer Speer suggested applying and listing subprojects such as the dividing doors. Cloverleaf Building restrooms have been approved for funding by Community Development Block Grant. Hesse noted that Pendleton Round-Up and depressed counties will be first in line for funding for lottery money.

MOTION: MOVED BY JOHN MEEK, SECONDED BY LLOYD BARON TO POSTPONE ITEMS C AND I (CLOVERLEAF BUILDING PARKING LOT AND INSTALLATION OF DIVIDING DOORS) TO THE OCTOBER MEETING, OR NO LATER THAN NOVEMBER MEETING. MOTION CARRIED.

JAYCEES.

Jeff Schuh, Chairman of the Hillsboro Jaycees Happy Days, offered to split the cost of spoiled chicken stored in the walk-in cooler. This offer was rejected by Hesse wherein Schuh agreed to pay the rental fee in full.

SECURITY/BOAT STORAGE

Hesse met with a deputy from the County and Captain Bob Shook, of the Hillsboro Police Department, regarding security systems. Their recommendation was a Varda System. Hesse believes it was motion activated, portable, easy to set-up, and could be moved from building to building. The signal would be transmitted on the Hillsboro Police Department frequency. The cost of the system is \$2,129.75, with a life expectancy of approximately 10 years.

Cost of systems versus revenue generated by storage was also discussed. It was staff recommendation that 4-H Barn and Beef/Dairy Barn storage be eliminated due to inadequate security and past incidents of vandalism. Joyce Ashmanskas noted the City of Beaverton used a heat sensitive system which proved very effective.

MOTION: MOVED BY HOMER SPEER, SECONDED BY LLOYD BARON, TO INSTRUCT THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO PROCEED IN OBTAINING BIDS FOR SECURITY SYSTEMS, INVESTIGATING COST EFFECTIVENESS, AND TO IMPLEMENT A SYSTEM. MOTION CARRIED.

MOTION: MOVED BY HOMER SPEER, SECONDED BY JOHN MEEK, TO INCREASE BOAT STORAGE FEES TO \$1.25 PER FOOT PER MONTH, WITH A \$70 SEASON MINIMUM. MOTION CARRIED.

DESTRUCTION DERBY SAFETY

Frank Wallendar, of Metro-West Ambulance, spoke regarding his concern about safety at the destruction derbies. He showed pictures of damage to his ambulance at the county fair derby and stressed that it was lucky no one had been injured. Wallendar felt the speeds were too fast and that the arena logs were too small. He also felt there were too many people in the pit area during the derbies and rodeos. He suggested rather than eliminating the derby, organize an event with divisions for destruction only.

Board members agreed the event has become extremely dangerous and that safety factors will be the major issue in determing whether the derbies will continue as presently organized.

FLAG POLE

Hesse obtained two bids for cost and installation of a flag pole for the main entrance. E.M. Shea & Associates bid \$1,890.62 and W.H. Cress Co. bid \$1,759.00.

MOTION: MOVED BY JOHN MEEK, SECONDED BY LLOYD BARON TO INSTRUCT THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO ACCEPT THE LOW BID FOR COST AND INSTALLATION OF A FLAG POLE FOR THE MAIN ENTRANCE. MOTION CARRIED.

Hesse conveyed thanks to all Fair Board members and spouses, staff and volunteers for the time and energy spent during the County Fair.

BUDGET SUPPLEMENT

Hesse filed a budget supplement on August 13, 1985. The county budget committee will review in September. Income adjustments were made in the Hotel/Motel Tax and Fair Admissions accounts. Expense adjustments were made in Utilities, Repairs & Maintenance, and Land Improvement.

WESTERN FAIRS MANAGER'S CONFERENCE

MOTION: MOVED BY HOMER SPEER, SECONDED BY JOHN MEEK TO AUTHORIZE THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO ATTEND THE WESTERN FAIRS MANAGER'S CONFERENCE IN RENO, NEVADA, NOVEMBER 5-8. MOTION CARRIED.

OPERATIONS REPORT

August projects completed were: repaired water leak in front of live-stock barns, unclog drain line from livestock wash rack to septic tank, prepared sheriff's building for paint, cleaned up from fair and reorganized equipment. September projects include painting the sheriff's building, painting bleachers and building more storage shelves.

Upgrading electrical and plumbing on the fairgrounds was briefly discussed. Ron McAuley, Operations Superintendent, will be compiling a list of capital projects for future review.

COUNTY FAIR INPUT

Rocky Williams, Rodeo Board Chairman, brought up several ideas and concerns for the fair and fairgrounds which included headline entertainment in Friendship Square, destruction derby insurance and damage to arena, main entrance appearance, and fair board hiring policy. Williams also expressed an interest in a promotional or director capacity job with the fairgrounds.

Margaret Sprecher, Chairman, advised derby insurance coverage should be discussed with Hesse. Hesse advised she has recently been notified of a change in county insurance companies, therefore has not been updated on coverage and deductibles. The Fair Board indicated they had not adopted a Personnel Policy, therefore, do not have a specific policy regarding hiring family members. County counsel recently reviewed a draft of Fairground Personnel Policies which will be revised accordingly before submitted to the Fair Board for approval.

RODEO · ·

The rodeo was great. Clackamas County helped out by loaning their roping box. The Special Kids Rodeo was also complimented. There were about 1,000 in attendance and the audience seemed to enjoy it. Cowboys and the announcer for the event donated their time.

MOTION CARRIED.
