

A Traveling Veteran Coordinator is a VA employee who is a Registered Nurse (RN), Physician Assistant or Nurse Practitioner who assists Veterans on extended travel. TVCs help coordinate medical needs and facilitate care.

What does a TVC do?

The TVC will help you arrange nonemergency outpatient care and appointments you may need at another VA while you are on extended travel.

Why is this important?

VA wants to make sure you are provided with same quality of care and high standards while you travel.

Who is the TVC?

There is a TVC at your assigned health care system (preferred) and visiting (alternate) site. They will communicate to coordinate your care.





Travel Information for Veterans

- Bring a copy of your health summary, medication list, and Primary Care team information.
- Sign up for MyHealtheVet
- Before you travel, see if you will need any lab testing, supplies, or medication while you are away.
- Refill your prescriptions using the method you would normally use.
- Refill your prescriptions 10-14 days before you run out.
