DEPARTMENT RULES & REGULATIONS:

- Competitions are open to all residents of Williamson and adjoining counties.
- Only one (1) entry per person in any one Class number is allowed.
- Produce exhibited in this department must be of the current year's crop and must be produced by the exhibitor. All eggs must be produced by exhibitor's home flock.
- Items must be fresh and free of molds and rots. Entries should be clean and as uniform as possible. This rule is important as exhibits must remain presentable for 10 days.
- All entries must be pre-entered online. No entries will be accepted that have not been pre-entered.
- All entries must be dropped off on Thursday, August 1st.
 No early entries will be accepted.
- The decision of the judges is final. The judges may withhold an award at their discretion if no items are deemed worthy of award. Where there is only one exhibitor in a Class, the judges may award first, second or no prize.
- Entries and/or ribbons must be picked up on the above referenced date or prior arrangements must be made with the Committee Chair, otherwise they will become the property of the Williamson County Fair.
- Unless prior arrangements have been made with the Committee Chairman, any entries and/or ribbons not picked up on the fair pick-up date/time listed above will become the property of the fair and disposal of all entries will be made at the fair's discretion.
- · Ribbons will not be mailed.

ADDITIONAL RULES:

- Any entry that qualifies as Organic must be entered under the rules for Organic and may not be entered as Conventional.
- No individual, group or entity may enter fruits or vegetables into both the Organic and Conventional Divisions or Classes.
- For those entering fruits and vegetables in the Organic Classes 101-176: All Organic Vegetables and Fruits must be grown without the use of synthetic pesticides, herbicides, or fertilizers. Commercial fertilizers such as Miracle Grow, 6-12-12 and other blended synthetic fertilizers are not allowed. Insecticides such as Sevin, Diazinon, etc., herbicides such as Roundup and Treflan etc. are prohibited in Organic Production.
- Most Attractive Fruit and Vegetable Arrangement must contain a minimum of ten (10) varieties of fruits and vegetables.

*Judging will be based on:

- · Uniformity of size and color
- Freedom from defects due to insect, disease or harvesting injury
- · Proper stage of maturity for consumption

ADDITIONAL RULES:

- This is a non-sanctioned show.
- Plants and flowers must be free from disease, insects, and insect damage.
- Debris and dead plant material should be removed from blooms, stems, plants, and soil. Container-grown plants should be displayed in clean pots.
- Cut specimens should not have foliage below the water line.
- All specimens, whether cut or container-grown, must be all plant material grown by the exhibitor and cannot be dyed or otherwise treated by application of any substance.
- One (1) cut specimen per container, and should be appropriately sized to the cut specimen.
- Exhibitors must furnish their own clear, colorless glass containers for cut specimens, clean and free of labels or printing.
- No plastic bottles or "cut glass" bud vases will be allowed.
- Entries MUST BE prepared prior to arrival at the Fair.
 Entries will NOT be accepted otherwise. There will be no bottles, containers, access to water or staging area provided.
- Williamson County Fair and its employees/volunteers are not responsible for the loss or breakage of exhibitors' containers or accessories. All property should be marked in an inconspicuous manner with owner's name and telephone number or address.
- · Container grown entries are not eligible for Best of Show.





CONTAINER GROWN:

- All entries must have been grown by exhibitor or have been in their possession at least (90) days prior to the show.
- Only one plant per container is allowed, except for Combination Planting.
- Pots must not be any larger than 12". Double potting is permitted, if inner pot is not easily visible. If plants extend below pot, exhibitor must furnish an inverted container for elevation.
- Pots for combination planting may not exceed 12" in diameter. If plants extend below pot, exhibitor must furnish an inverted pot for elevation.
- Hanging containers (blooming and foliage) may be exhibited but must have the hanging apparatus removed for judging and display.
