

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show.h addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statues, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statues, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested (by the approved laboratory to which it is sent) is the one taken from the animal in question. Its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. h the furtherance of

their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including *Fairs and Expositions* and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the AFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

OSCEOLA COUNTY FAIR & LIVESTOCK SHOW GUIDELINES FOR EXHIBITION

- 1. The Osceola County Fair & Livestock Show does not take responsibility for lost, damaged or misdirected forms, entries or articles of exhibit.
- 2. All rules are subject to the interpretation of the Board of Directors of the Fair. All decisions made by the Board are final. This Board reserves the right to deny or allow any entry to the Fair and Fairgrounds.
- 3. All non-commercial exhibits must check in according to committee guidelines as published. No exhibit may leave the grounds prior to the scheduled release dates & times as indicated in the various calendars and/or individual department or section rules.
- 4. In all events and exhibits being judged, the judge's decision shall be final.
- 5. All entries, if not claimed by close of check out time shall become the property of the Fair. All premiums will be paid and checks mailed within 6 weeks after the fair ends. Premium checks MUST be cashed within 60 days of the issue date.
- 6. A \$30.00 fee or 5% of the face amount will be charged for any bad check received by the Fair for entries, animal sales, sponsorships, contracts, etc.
- 7. Any formal complaints shall be presented in writing within six (6) hours of the discrepancy to the Fair Office to be handled as they see fit.
- 8. Any exhibitor or vendor conducting or participating in any illegal or immoral activities on the Fairgrounds shall forfeit all rights to display at the Fair and will lose any monies owed or paid by/to the Fair for premiums, sales, privilege agreements, etc.
- 9. If these rules contradict any committee rule(s) the committee rule(s) shall prevail.
- 10. By signing any privilege agreement, license, entry form, etc., participant agrees to release and discharge the Kissimmee Valley Livestock Show & Fair, Inc. and the Board of Directors & staff thereof from all liabilities, claims, and demands of whatever kind or nature that may arise from or be connected with the participant's participation in any activity sponsored by Kissimmee Valley Livestock Show & Fair, Inc.

To 4-H/FFA Exhibitors, Open Show Exhibitors and Parents/Guardians for the 2021 Fair:

ELIGIBILITY:

- Exhibitor must be eight (8) years old by September 1, of the current 4-H year.
- Exhibitor must be a current member of Osceola County 4-H or FFA and may enter all open class shows.

GENERAL RULES:

- Registration is ONLINE only.
- All animals must have proof of vaccinations. Please bring this to the workshop you attend. (See Event Calendar for dates and times).
- Females in season will not be allowed to participate.
- All males must be neutered.
- KVLS show committee shall reserve the right to refuse entry to any aggressive people or animals.
 - MANDATORY PARTICIPATION IS REQUIRED AT A SCHEDULED WORKSHOP, DATE TO BE ANNOUNCED with your dog to participate in the show. This will be strictly enforced. This is for the safety of everyone involved. Please bring every dog that you intend to exhibit.
- All exhibitors will be responsible for cleaning up after their dog.
- Animals **MUST** be kept on a leash at all times.
- Talking to your dog is always encouraged and acceptable while exhibiting. No touching will be allowed.
- No pinch collars will be allowed.
- Treats may be given between exercises, but not during the exercise.
- Dogs must be clean, nails trimmed, coat brushed and parasite free.
- Dress required is white shirt or club t-shirt with dark pants.
- Limit of one dog per class. You may exhibit a different dog in each class as long as all dogs have attended the mandatory workshop.
- Dogs **MUST** remain in the show staging area and are not allowed to roam the exhibit hall or the fairgrounds.
- You are only allowed to walk in with the dog prior to the show and must exit immediately after the show with the dog.

SECTION 1 – Showmanship

CLASSES:

01. Novice

- a. Novice: As this is the first year it is offered, all exhibitors will be considered Novice.
 - All ages compete together unless the number of entries warrants splitting age divisions.

SECTION 2 - Skill-a-thon

CLASSES:

01. Junior (age 8-10)

02. Intermediate (age 11-13)

03. Senior (age 14-18)

SECTION 3 – Obedience

CLASSES:

- 01. Novice: For beginning handler and beginning dog in their first year of showing.
- 02. Advanced: For handlers who are in the second year (or greater) of showing.
 - All ages compete together unless the number of entries warrants splitting age divisions.

Obedience Test:

- Heel on leash as directed
- Sit and Down commands
- Recall
- Long sit (1 minute, done in a group)
- Long down (1 minute, done in a group)
- Stand for examination

SECTION 4 - Rally Obedience

CLASSES:

01. Novice: As this is the first year it is offered, all exhibitors will be considered Novice.

• All ages compete together unless the number of entries warrants splitting age divisions.

SECTION 5 – Poster Contest

CLASSES:

01. All Entries

- All ages compete together unless the number of entries warrants splitting age divisions.
- Posters must not exceed 22" x 14" in size and can depict any topic related to dogs: Example: care, history, training, psychology, breeds, or careers.

SECTION 6 - Costume Contest

CLASSES:

01. All Entries

- All ages compete together unless the number of entries warrants splitting age division.
- Costume Contest is open to all 4-H and FFA members.
- Dogs must be shown in at least one of the classes above in order to be shown in the costume contest and can only be shown by registered exhibitor.
- There will be a 15-minute break before the Costume Contest in order to get the dogs dressed.
 - \circ Participation Ribbons Only 1st-5th Place in each class
 - Premiums not paid in costume categories.
 - \circ Awards will be non-premium donation.

Dog Show Champion of Champions

The following classes will be used to tabulate this award:

- Showmanship
- Skillathon
- Informational Poster
- Rally Obedience
- Obedience

Showmanship is mandatory for consideration in this award. Each section gets a point value; all points will be added together with the highest score receiving:

• Champion of Champions - \$25
